Study Paths A and B

Sydney College of Divinity courses and awards are organised in terms of the following two study paths.

PATH A: for those who begin their theological studies with an undergraduate theology award

Path A is structured around the *Bachelor of Theology* and the *Bachelor of Ministry* as the primary undergraduate awards in theology and ministry which serve as a basis for subsequent graduate study to the highest levels. The minimum entry requirement is tertiary matriculation. Students who complete the Bachelor of Theology or Bachelor of Ministry may move on to the Bachelor of Theology (Honours) or the Bachelor of Ministry (Honours) respectively, or the Master of Arts or the Master of Theology and hence to higher research degrees, the Master of Philosophy, the Doctor of Ministry, the Doctor of Philosophy and the Doctor of Theology.

a) Pre-degree Awards

Diploma of Ministry:

A 1 year full-time, 3 year part-time program of study in theology, biblical studies and Christian ministry and practice related disciplines. This award is available in distance education mode

Diploma of Theology:

A 1 year full-time, 3 year part-time program of study in theology, biblical studies and related disciplines. This award is available in distance education mode.

Diploma of Christian Studies:

A 1 year full-time, 3 year part-time program of study in theology, biblical studies and related disciplines. This is made up of Bachelor of Theology/Ministry degree level units. This award is available in distance education mode.

b) Undergraduate Degrees

Associate Degree of Christian Thought and Practice:

A 2 year full-time, 6 year part-time program of theological study with special focus on Christian Thought (biblical studies, theology, philosophy, church history) and/or on Christian Practice (pastoral counselling, worship and liturgy, mission, pastoral theology, Christian spirituality, Christian ethics). This award is available in distance education mode.

Bachelor of Ministry:

A 3 year full-time, 9 year part-time program leading to the primary undergraduate qualification in ministry. The Bachelor of Ministry is a primary undergraduate award which provides a broad and coherent study of Christian Life and Ministry and related studies in Biblical Studies and Theology through a structure of majors and sub-majors. This degree prepares candidates for professional and lay Christian ministry and for further learning beyond the degree.

In order to ensure coherence of structure and sequencing of units, a student can obtain the Bachelor of Ministry only by fulfilling the particular subject area and unit requirements of a Teaching Body authorised to offer the award and in which the student is enrolled. This award is available in distance education mode.

A 3 year full-time, 9 year part-time program leading to the primary undergraduate qualification in theology. The Bachelor of Theology provides a broad and coherent study of theology and related disciplines through a structure of majors and sub-majors. This degree prepares candidates for professional and lay Christian ministry and for further learning beyond the degree.

Bachelor of Theology:

In order to ensure coherence of structure and sequencing of units, a student can obtain the Bachelor of Theology only by fulfilling the particular subject area and unit requirements of a Teaching Body authorised to offer the award and in which the student is enrolled. This award is available in distance education mode.

c) Postgraduate Degrees

Bachelor of Ministry (Honours):

A 1 year full-time, 3 year part-time program for Sydney College of Divinity Bachelor of Ministry graduates (or equivalent). The award provides opportunity for preparatory research as a stepping stone to research in ministry at the highest level.

Bachelor of Theology (Honours):

A 1 year full-time, 3 year part-time program for Sydney College of Divinity Bachelor of Theology graduates (or equivalent). The award provides opportunity for preparatory research as a stepping stone to research in theology at the highest level.

Master of Arts:

A 1.5 year full-time, 4.5 year part-time program of studies taken from a designated list of both core and elective units, available to candidates who hold a bachelor degree in Theology or Ministry. This award is available in distance education mode.

Master of Theology:

A 1.5 full-time, 4.5 year part-time program of graduate study in theology and related disciplines for candidates with the Bachelor of Theology or equivalent, who wish to pursue theological studies in greater depth and with greater rigour. This award is available in distance education mode.

The research awards into which Path A articulates are Master of Philosophy, Doctor of Theology, Doctor of Philosophy and Doctor of Ministry.

PATH B – Graduate programs for those who have completed a three year undergraduate award

Path B provides programs in theology and related disciplines for students who have already gained a three-year undergraduate degree in another field. Students may

complete a variety of awards from Graduate Certificates up to the Master of Divinity, with various entry and exit points. Specialised awards are available in particular disciplines through the Master of Arts, which can also be taken as exit points from the Master of Divinity. The Graduate Certificate in Arts, the Graduate Diploma of Arts and the Master of Arts are “nested” in order to provide students with the opportunity to undertake theological subjects at graduate level with an option as to entry and exit points.

On completion of appropriate graduate studies a student may move on to either the research interdisciplinary awards, Master of Philosophy or Doctor of Philosophy, or in the case of the Master of Divinity on to the purely theological award Doctor of Theology. A specialised opportunity for advanced research is available with the Doctor of Ministry, which incorporates the pursuit of advanced study in Christian Life and Ministry by research at the highest academic level in the context of professional practice.

Graduate Certificate in Arts:

A 0.5 year full-time, 1.5 year part-time program of studies in which candidates apply a body of theological knowledge in a range of contexts relating to ministry and/or further learning. Successful completion of this award allows entry into the Master of Arts program. This award is available in distance education mode.

Graduate Diploma of Arts:

A 1 year full-time, 3 year part-time program of studies in which candidates apply a body of theological knowledge in a range of contexts relating to ministry and/or further learning. This award is available in distance education mode.

Master of Arts:

A 1- 1.5 year full-time, 3 – 4.5 year part-time program of studies taken from a designated list of both core and elective units. Entry into the 1 year stream of this award requires the prior completion of the SCD Graduate Certificate in Arts (or equivalent AQF Level 8 award in theological or ministerial studies). This award is available in distance education mode.

Master of Divinity:

A 3 year full-time, 9 year part-time graduate entry program for students undertaking initial theological studies. It provides a comprehensive education in theology comparable in breadth and depth to the Bachelor of Theology, including a deeper and theological understanding, spiritual formation, and cultural literacy that will prepare candidates for ordained or other professional ministry in church, parachurch or non-profit organizations, and other similar vocational settings. This award is available in distance education mode.

Master of Theological Studies:

A 1 year full-time, 3 year part-time graduate entry program for students undertaking initial theological studies. This award is available in distance education mode.

a) Postgraduate Research Awards

Master of Philosophy:

A 1 year full-time, 2 year part-time program of graduate study in theology and related disciplines by research and the submission of a thesis for candidates with a Bachelor (Hons) degree or equivalent with results at Class

II, Division 1, from the Sydney College of Divinity or an equivalent institution.

Doctor of Ministry:

A 3-4 years full-time or 6-8 years part-time higher award by research (80%) and coursework (20%) for candidates who have obtained or are qualified to obtain a four-year Bachelor degree, or the equivalent, in an appropriate discipline, to at least a High Credit standard, **AND** have at least four years' full-time or equivalent part-time certified experience in ministry.

Doctor of Philosophy:

A 3-4 years full-time or 6-8 years part-time program of graduate study in theologically related disciplines by research and the submission of a thesis for candidates who have obtained or are qualified to obtain a four-year Bachelor degree, or the equivalent, in an appropriate discipline, to at least a Distinction standard.

Doctor of Theology:

A 3-4 years full-time or 6-8 years part-time program of graduate study in theology and related disciplines by research and the submission of a thesis for candidates who have obtained or are qualified to obtain a four-year Bachelor degree, or the equivalent, in an appropriate discipline, to at least a Distinction standard.

Australian College of Christian Studies Ltd (ACCS)

Australian College of Christian Studies Ltd (ACCS) is a Christian dual sector Education Provider offering government accredited courses from both the VET and higher education sectors.

ACCS's academic programs are designed for those who desire a biblical and theological foundation for personal growth and to equip them to be effective in the local church, broader community or mission field. The College aims to equip God's people to be agents of change in the world by providing quality Christian education, which is Christ-centred, biblically grounded, ministry-based, academically sound, and career orientated.

ACCS is the amalgamation of Emmaus Bible College and Tabor Bible College (NSW). Both institutions have a long and rich heritage of preparing their students for overseas or local ministry. Emmaus was established in 1957 and Tabor in 1992. Emmaus accepted responsibility for the operations of Tabor in December 2010. In late 2014, Tabor College NSW changed its name to the Australian College of Christian Studies. In December 2015, the Board commenced the strategic direction to merge the two colleges, with both colleges working toward operating as a single entity from January 2017.

Today ACCS provides a range of options for both full-time, part-time students and distance education through online learning. Many students at ACCS are seeking to improve their ability to serve God in local churches, youth ministry, missions, and para-church agencies.

Australian College of Ministries (ACOM)

The Australian College of Ministries (ACOM) is an international provider of life-changing, ministry training experiences. ACOM specialises in flexible delivery, with its hybrid of distance learning experience mixed with targeted face-to-face student support through Formation Groups and Subject Facilitations. ACOM has developed a national and international reputation for excellence and innovation. ACOM has produced thousands of graduates serving as ministers, evangelists, lay leaders, welfare workers, teachers, missionaries and church planters.

ACOM was originally birthed as a campus-based residential college over seventy-five years ago (1941) as the Churches of Christ in NSW Theological College (Woolwich, Sydney). The college merged with Kenmore Christian College (Queensland) in 1999 to form The Australian College of Ministries.

ACOM is currently Sponsored by Churches of Christ in NSW (CofCNSW) and the Christian and Missionary Alliance of Australia (C&MA). The sponsorship enables ACOM to pursue its mission and partner with initiatives such as The Tops Conference Centre, Navigate Programs, FreshHope Care, and the Alliance Institute for Mission who offer specific mission training courses; supporting the development and training for cross-cultural ministry.

Catholic Institute of Sydney (CIS)

The Catholic Institute of Sydney (CIS) is a community of faith and learning in which teachers and students seek to bring the Gospel into dialogue with Australian culture by drawing upon and developing the intellectual heritage of the Church. The Institute was established as an Ecclesiastical Faculty in 1954, empowered to award Roman ecclesiastical degrees. It has been committed to the education of Catholic priests since the late 1880s. In order to provide for the needs of people preparing for professional ministry in the Church, CIS offers studies leading to the nationally recognised awards of the Sydney College of Divinity. Part-time studies are available.

Nazarene Theological College (NTC)

Nazarene Theological College (NTC) was established in 1953 by the Church of the Nazarene, an evangelical denomination in the Wesleyan tradition. It is one of fifty-two tertiary-level institutions worldwide operated by the church, serving both its own denomination and students from other Christian traditions. Its major focus is to prepare men and women for the challenges of Christian ministry (both ordained and lay) in Australia, New Zealand, and throughout the world. Nazarene Theological College fosters within the students a passion to make a difference in the church and community through involvement in mission, discipleship, and pastoral care. Students are prepared for Christian service through accredited undergraduate and postgraduate awards in theology and ministry.

Nisibis Assyrian Theological College (Nisibis)

Nisibis Assyrian Theological College, established in 2020, is the official theological College of the Holy Apostolic Catholic Assyrian Church of the East – Archdiocese of Australia, New Zealand, and Lebanon.

The ancient theological school at Nisibis (in modern Turkey) was famed throughout the eastern churches but disappeared during the seventh century after a notable history of achievement in the face of various challenges. After many centuries, the church has now realised its vision of establishing its own theological college once more, here in Australia, from whence it serves the whole of its church in diaspora, as well as other interested people. Nisibis is committed to providing high-quality, innovative, accredited theological education that strengthens the preservation of its cultural, intellectual, and spiritual heritage in the context of modern Australia and the contemporary world.

NSW College of Clinical Pastoral Education (NSWCCPE) INC

The New South Wales College of Clinical Pastoral Education (NSWCCPE) was formed in 1963 by representatives of the Christian Churches with the vision of providing quality pastoral education and supervision for those attending to the spiritual needs of all members of our modern community. Since then the College has expanded its membership to include representatives from across Christian Denominations and other Faiths. The CPE movement in NSW has expanded to include CPE Centres at St Vincent's Hospital, Sydney Adventist Hospital, Westmead Hospital, The Mental Health CPE Centre at Hornsby, John Hunter Hospital, Gosford Hospital, The Southern Tablelands, and the NSW Far South Coast.

The College teaches the Masters of Arts, specialising in Chaplaincy and in Pastoral Supervision. These are an outworking of the history of the organisation.

Applicants for the Master of Arts with a specialisation in Pastoral Supervision will be required to have done Clinical Pastoral Education up to advanced level and meet the College's requirements for permission to act as a Level I Supervisor in Clinical Pastoral Education.

Saint Andrew's Greek Orthodox Theological College (SAGOTC)

St Andrew's Greek Orthodox Theological College (SAGOTC) was officially opened on 23 February 1986, and is an instrument of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of Australia Consolidated Trust.

St Andrew's was established in order to provide tertiary level education and training of Christian Orthodox clergy, theologians, lay teachers, and ministers in order to meet the catechetical and pastoral needs of the Orthodox Church in Australia. It is also intended to be a centre of ecumenical scholarship and learning.

Saint Cyril's Coptic Orthodox Theological College (SCTC)

St Cyril's Coptic Orthodox Theological College (SCTC) is a tertiary provider of leading-edge theological education in the tradition of the Orthodox Church. Since 1982 we have been educating men and women in the service of the Church, offering both undergraduate and postgraduate accredited degrees in Orthodox Theology in the Coptic tradition.

St Cyril's is an educational institution that is faithful to the Orthodox Christian faith as lived and experienced by the Coptic Orthodox Church throughout her history spanning two millennia. Witnessing to the Orthodox faith, St Cyril's aims to explore and present this faith within a rigorous educational framework, in harmony with our modern Australian context, without losing sight of the spiritual dimension of authentic Orthodox theology and education.

Sydney College of Divinity Korean School of Theology (KST)

SCD Korean School of Theology began in 2010, as a home for theological studies in the Korean language in Australia.

Our Korean program offers government-accredited, university-level awards directed

- to prepare future pastors and leaders for the Korean church in Australia,
- to educate Koreans who wish to understand the Christian faith better; and
- to train scholars who will be able to teach theological studies to future generations

The programs are suitable for Koreans who do not have the language qualification to undertake these studies in English and for other Koreans who could obtain this qualification but prefer to study in their first language. The program is approved for both local and overseas students.

The SCD Korean School of Theology operates on three campuses including Sydney, Melbourne, and Brisbane.

Sydney College of Divinity Graduate Research School (GRS)

SCD Graduate Research School delivers postgraduate research degrees (Higher Degree by Research). The Graduate Research School draws on and contributes to the research ethos of the Sydney College of Divinity. It is coordinated by the Sydney College of Divinity Research Director.

Dianne Feeney Memorial

A grant and medal have been established by the Council of the Sydney College of Divinity. It is to be awarded each year to the candidate of the college who has gained the highest level of achievement in the Bachelor of Theology and who is proceeding to further theological study as a graduate student in the college.

The grant and medal is a memorial to honour the life and work of Dianne Feeney, who was a member of the teaching faculty in the Churches of Christ in NSW Theological College as an anthropologist and missiologist. She played a constructive part in the development of the Sydney College of Divinity until her tragic death in New Guinea on 28 November 1985. The award will be paid from a fund that was set up in 1987 with donations from some of her colleagues and from Teaching Bodies of the Sydney College of Divinity.

Beth Blackall Memorial

Brian Murray Memorial

Through a generous donation received from the Marist Fathers a fund was established from which a grant and a medal would be awarded annually to the student with the highest level of achievement in the discipline of Theology who is graduating BTh.

The Prize marks the contribution of the Rev Dr Brian Murray SM to theological education generally and to the Sydney College of Divinity in particular. Dr Murray was principal and lecturer at the Catholic Theological Union from 1975 until the end of 1982. During that time he played a significant role in the establishment of the Sydney College of Divinity (being a member of the initial working party) and was involved in the early submissions to the Higher Education Board. He later served as Superior to the Marist Fathers' General House in Rome, as Vicar Provincial for the Australian Province, and in parish ministry in Brisbane until his death on 8 September 1994.

Student services

Student entitlements and services

Students should contact the Teaching Body where they are enrolled to see whether they are eligible for Austudy, FEE-HELP and other Government schemes that may be of benefit.

Austudy

Under the Commonwealth Government guidelines, Austudy is available for full-time theological students who are working towards accredited awards. Full-time is defined by the Government to involve at least $\frac{3}{4}$ of a maximum load. Enquiries about eligibility for Austudy and making application should be directed to the closest Centrelink Office. Please note that:

1. It is the student's responsibility to keep Centrelink informed of any program changes or changes of address during each year (if the loading falls below full-time, then Centrelink may require repayment of Austudy received).
2. The Teaching Body administration is required to complete regular reports for Centrelink on student progress and full-time/part-time status.
3. Centrelink requires a full-time load for each trimester, i.e. at least 18 credit points. Personal Formation 1 & 2 and Personal Formation 3 are divided across the number of trimesters appropriate for each of these subjects – they do not count as one full subject in a trimester for Centrelink calculations.

FEE-HELP

FEE-HELP is a Government financial loan scheme for students attending private colleges. All enrolled students who are Australian citizens (or on Humanitarian Visas) have access to government loans for both undergraduate and post-graduate study. The loan amount available is set by the government and indexed in January. It is available to be used and can be used over the lifetime of the student at all levels of higher education accredited training. All students accessing FEE-HELP for the first time in 2021 must register for a Unique Student Identifier (USI).

Transport concessions

Transport concessions are available to full time students, and are issued through the registry of the Teaching Body in which a student is enrolled.

Charter

Sydney College of Divinity Charter

Establishment

The Sydney College of Divinity was formed in 1983 when six theological Colleges in Sydney constituted themselves as a federation with a view to providing an accredited tertiary education award in theology. The SCD Bachelor of Theology was accredited by the New South Wales Higher Education Board in February 1984.

From its outset, the Sydney College of Divinity has been more than an arrangement for the purposes of accreditation. The founding Member Institutions were committed to a genuinely ecumenical endeavour in which, while retaining their autonomy and ecclesial traditions, they would collaborate with, and support each other, as a College. The Member Institutions have found that our mutual encouragement and accountability to one another as members of the College both enhances the academic standing of our learning and teaching, and strengthens our Christian ministry and witness.

In the years since 1983 the membership of the Sydney College of Divinity has changed. The Sydney College of Divinity welcomes the admission of new Member Institutions which embrace our aims, ethos, and educational philosophy.

Aims

In keeping with our origins, the aims of the Sydney College of Divinity are:

- to provide high quality, accredited theological education from undergraduate to graduate levels
- to prepare leaders and ministers, both ordained and non-ordained, who are well qualified to build the church of the future
- to encourage theological scholarship which is ecumenically sensitive and relevant to issues of culture and society
- to contribute to public discussion of issues of faith and culture
- to promote the growth of our individual member institutions
- to provide our faculty with the opportunity to develop their professional skills, supported by a community of Christian scholars
- to prepare the next generation of Christian teachers and scholars

Ethos

Because of our origins and our collegial aims, the Sydney College of Divinity has developed a distinctive ethos, whose features include:

- a commitment to the Gospel of Jesus Christ as it is preached and lived out within our Christian denominations
- a respect for the different theological standpoints of our member institutions

- a critical approach to theological reflection on our faith traditions and on the relationship between faith and culture
- a willingness to work together and to celebrate our shared enterprise in prayer and liturgy
- a readiness to contribute to College administration and its committee structures
- a balance between central administration and the autonomy of member institutions

Admission – Courses taught in English

Courses taught in English

Students who wish to be admitted to an undergraduate or postgraduate coursework program do so by application through one of the Teaching Bodies of the Sydney College of Divinity. Every admission application to these awards is forwarded by the Teaching Body to the Student Support and Administration Committee for approval under guidelines set down by the Academic Board.

Applications for admission to the research degree programs are submitted to the Director of Research in the Office of the Dean, and are assessed by the Research Committee under guidelines set down by the Academic Board.

For undergraduate courses, normal entry is determined on the basis of academic merit – a completed Higher School Certificate (HSC), or equivalent, and the Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) or equivalent (University Admission Index (UAI), Tertiary Entrance Rank (TER), Overall Position (OP), Grade Point Average (GPA)), as well as an appropriate IELTS score for overseas students.

For postgraduate courses, normal entry is determined on the basis of completed accredited undergraduate and/or postgraduate study and GPA, depending on the course being considered, as well as an appropriate IELTS score for overseas students.

The entry details for each of the SCD courses taught in English are set out in the following table.

The SCD may decline to accept a candidate if it cannot offer supervision in his or her proposed field of research.

Doctor of Ministry

- Qualification from another university or tertiary institution deemed to be equivalent to or higher than those above, with English Proficiency ¹; and

- Shall have at least four years full-time, or equivalent part-time, certified experience of ministry.
- In all cases, prior studies should include sufficient preparation to undertake the proposed coursework and research related to Christian Life and Ministry.
- In exceptional cases, candidates may be admitted on the grounds of academic and professional attainments, including publications, in the branch of theological study in which they wish to pursue research;
- Notwithstanding the provisions above, the College may require suitability for candidature to be by such examination or other work as determined by the College;
- In addition, Overseas students ³ must be at least 18 years of age, must have an IELTS (or equivalent) of 7.0 or greater in all bands of the test and may only enrol in a full time load.

The SCD may decline to accept a candidate if it cannot offer supervision in his or her proposed field of research.

Doctor of Philosophy

- Qualification from another university or tertiary institution deemed to be equivalent to or higher than those above, with English Proficiency ¹;
- In all cases, prior studies should include sufficient preparation to undertake the proposed research in a theologically related area.
- In exceptional cases, candidates may be admitted on the grounds of academic and professional attainments, including publications, in the branch of theological study in which they wish to pursue research;
- Notwithstanding the provisions above, the College may require suitability for candidature to be by such examination or other work as determined by the College;
- In addition, Overseas students ³ must be at least 18 years of age, must have an IELTS (or equivalent) of 7.0 or greater in all bands of the test and may only enrol in a full time load.

The SCD may decline to accept a candidate if it cannot offer supervision in his or her proposed field of research.

- Qualification from another university or tertiary institution deemed to be equivalent to or higher than those above, with English Proficiency ¹;
- In all cases, prior studies should include sufficient preparation to undertake the proposed research in a theologically related area.
- In exceptional cases, candidates may be admitted on the grounds of academic and professional attainments, including publications, in the branch of theology in which they wish to pursue doctoral work.
- Notwithstanding the provisions above, the Sydney College of Divinity may require suitability for candidature to be by such examination or other work as determined by the Sydney College of Divinity;
- In addition, Overseas students ³ must be at least 18 years of age, must have an IELTS (or equivalent) of 7.0 or greater in all bands of the test and may only enrol in a full time load.

The SCD may decline to accept a candidate if it cannot offer supervision in his or her proposed field of research.

¹ English Language Proficiency

This policy applies to all students, except those entering Australia to study on a student visa. These students are Overseas Students ³ and requirements are listed below.

If students have undertaken their previous studies in an overseas country, they may have to provide proof of proficiency in English to gain entry into a Sydney College of Divinity award.

Students **do not** have to provide proof of proficiency in English if they have:

- completed an accredited award in English at one AQF level below the award that they are seeking admission into; or
- have successfully completed senior secondary study in English; or
- have successfully completed at least one year of full-time university study in English in the field of Humanities.

Students **must** provide proof of proficiency in English if they have undertaken all their **qualifications in a language other than English.**

Those students who have not completed previous studies in English may demonstrate proficiency in English by completing an IELTS test (or equivalent). The test results required for admission are as follows:

² Special Entry

A student may be admitted to a course on the basis of Special Entry. Such students might be:

- a. persons who have not yet reached mature age and who did not do the HSC or failed to meet the UAI or ATAR level. For example, a person under 20 years of age who did not do the HSC but has completed a trade certificate or equivalent;
- b. persons who have been educationally disadvantaged due to:
 - i. socio-economic reasons such as low-family income or poor living conditions;
 - ii. language difficulties;
 - iii. learning difficulties;
 - iv. disrupted schooling;
 - v. physical disability;
 - vi. serious family illness;
 - vii. excessive family responsibility;
 - viii. geographical isolation of home and/or school and lack of support, time or facilities for study at home or school.
- c. persons of Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander descent who have not followed the normal HSC entry path;
- d. persons who were home schooled and show evidence of being able to manage tertiary study;
- e. students awaiting an IELTS result;
- f. persons who have completed a prescribed program of non-award study (4 units) and passed all units.

All Special Entry admissions are provisional.

Admission Procedures for Provisional Entry

Admission to any SCD undergraduate course on the basis of **Mature Age** or **Special Entry** or the entry into the Master of Arts by way of a **Vocational Graduate Certificate** is a provisional admission, and requires special procedures:

- a. Students with provisional status shall be required to complete a 'Qualifying Period', whilst being permitted to enrol provisionally for the award.
- b. The 'Qualifying Period' may be undertaken full or part-time and the number of years spent in completing it shall be counted towards the maximum term for completion of the award.
- c. The 'Qualifying Period' shall consist of the successful completion of a 1/3 of the units that make up the award.
- d. The maximum time allowed for the completion of the 'Qualifying Period' shall be three years.
- e. Upon the successful completion of 1/3 of the units that make up the award, the provisional status of enrolment will be lifted.

³ Overseas Students (*Students who are entering Australia to study on a student visa. This does not include students who are residing outside of Australia during their course of study*)

- a. The SCD welcomes overseas students but admission to the SCD is governed by the requirements of the Australian Government, the SCD requirements (as set out above) and a Member Institution's own regulations.
- b. Once the overseas student makes application, the student's academic qualifications are matched against the entry criteria to confirm their potential admission. This is done by the Academic Committee within the Member Institution and then approved by the Student Administration Committee of the SCD. Students' previous academic qualifications are evaluated with details from the Commonwealth Department of Education Skills and Employment, Country Education Profiles (CEP) online data. The students English language proficiency is determined by an IELTS test (or equivalent).
- c. Overseas students must enrol in a fulltime load each study period and can complete up to one third of their entire course online or by distance. All courses available to overseas students have units available by distance and / or on-line learning.
- d. All relevant documents must be submitted with the application, as applications which are inadequately documented cannot be considered.
- e. When enrolling in SCD courses in English language:
 - i. students are expected to be proficient in English;
 - ii. assessment tasks shall be set and examined in that language unless special permission to do otherwise is granted by the Academic Board;
 - iii. students who gained their qualifications for admission to any of the SCD's awards up to the level of Master (coursework) in a language other than

- English, must accompany their application for admission with an IELTS (or equivalent) result normally of 6.0 or better for Diploma, 6.5 or better for Bachelor and 7.0 or better for coursework postgraduate courses – see the table presented in the English Proficiency¹ section for a more detailed explanation of the IELTS requirements including provisional admission;
- iv. students who gained their qualifications for admission to any of the SCD's postgraduate awards from the level of research Master in a language other than English, must accompany their application for admission with an IELTS (or equivalent) result of normally not less than 7.0 in all bands of the test;
 - v. applicants already in Australia who are required to take an English test shall be advised;
- f. All Member Institutions are required to observe the English language requirements as spelt out in sub-Rule (e) (iii) and (iv).
 - g. The information contained in this policy is communicated to the overseas student at the point of initial contact. Hard copy is included in the application package sent to the prospective student prior to them making application.

4 Professional Entry into Graduate Certificate in Arts with a professional concentration

a) Students not possessing an undergraduate degree meeting the normal entry requirements may seek provisional admission into a Graduate Certificate in Arts (with a professional concentration) via Professional Entry. Normally the professional experience and expertise of the potential student will align with the professional concentration in the prospective Graduate Certificate in Arts they are seeking to enter thus providing a rationale for approval but not without consideration of the level of experience required as set out in the requirements below.

This entry requires the student to:

- possess a minimum of 5 years relevant work experience in the **senior leadership role**, consistent with the *Typical Progression Pathways* outlines below or
- possess a minimum of 8 years relevant work experience in a range of leadership roles from **associate leader to senior team leader** or
- possess a minimum of 10 years relevant work experience in an **associate leader role** and be over the age of 30

All applications should be made on the Standard Admissions Form and include a current CV of the student and be supported by testimonials from the applicant's professional peers, demonstrating recognition of the applicant's senior leadership capacities and responsibilities. The application is then evaluated by both the Member Institution Registrar and Academic Dean before submitting it to the SSAC, via the Academic Registrar, for approval.

If entry is approved, the student then enrolls in a single 8500 (entry) level Graduate Certificate unit – either B85XX or T85XX or another 8500 level unit if the student has completed the equivalent to those introductions – and if this unit is completed successfully at a credit level or above may be granted normal entry into the Graduate Certificate in Arts (with a professional concentration) following an interview with the Dean of Graduate Studies or the College Registrar. The unit completed is part of the student's Graduate Certificate in Arts program. The remaining three units must all be completed successfully. To progress to the MA all units must be passed and the completed Graduate Certificate in Arts must have a GPA of at least 2.0.

b) A completed MA that was entered via a professional entry Graduate Certificate is not a pathway to the MTh.

c) Students not studying full-time will normally be required to maintain some concurrent, ongoing involvement in a leadership position.

Typical Progression Pathways: Relevant work experience in a senior leadership role will be determined by the Student Support and Administration Committee (SSAC) of the SCD, and (subject to the above requirements) will include:

- i. Full-time church or para-church ministry in the senior leadership position.
- ii. Senior leadership experience in non-government, not-for-profit, community-based and related organisations which act to further the social and/or cultural outworkings of the gospel.
- iii. Christian business people who are fulfilling positions of responsibility including team and industry leadership
- iv. Other relevant senior leadership experience consistent with, and deemed by SSAC to be equivalent to, the above

Overseas University Qualifications

The equivalence of Overseas University and Tertiary Institution qualifications is determined by the Student Administration Committee and Research Committee using the AEI Country Education Profile (CEP) on-line data as provided by the Australian Government.

Course Quotas

Any Member Institution may impose a quota in a unit that it teaches on its own campus towards a SCD course, or in a course that is taught exclusively on that campus. Such a need, when it arises, would be due to restricted resources: e.g. classroom space, staff workload, avenues for field placement, etc. In such cases selection into the unit or course at a particular Member Institution would be determined on the basis of academic merit. However, students who do not gain entry to a particular Member Institution, would be advised by the Registrar of similar units of study or courses that were available at other SCD Member Institutions where quotas did not apply.

Restrictions on Admission

There are no quotas placed on entry into Postgraduate Research Degree candidature. However, students are only permitted to enrol formally once a thesis topic has been approved and appropriate Supervisors have been found.

The SCD is firmly committed to a strong research culture for both its staff and for its students. Currently there are 6 research awards – BMin(Hons), BTh(Hons), MPhil, DMin, PhD and ThD.

Admission Process

Undergraduate and coursework postgraduate students enrol directly with the SCD Member Institutions using the standard SCD Admission form. Research degree students enrol directly with the SCD using the standard SCD Admission form. Prior to enrolment and before tuition fees are paid, students are informed of their rights and obligations including –

- All changes and proposed changes to their course of study over the duration of their course
- Policies, arrangements and potential eligibility for credit for prior learning
- Policies on tuition protection and refund of charges

Admission – Courses taught in Korean

Courses taught in Korean

For undergraduate courses, normal entry is determined on the basis of academic merit measured by satisfactory graduation from High School in Korea at a level that would gain admission to a university, as well as Korean language proficiency.

For post graduate courses, normal entry is determined on the basis of completed accredited undergraduate and/or postgraduate study and GPA depending on the course being considered as well as Korean language proficiency.

This Enrolment Policy is implemented by the Student Administration Committee under these guidelines approved by the SCD Academic Board.

The entry requirements for each of the SCD courses in Korean are set out in the following table.

- Professional entry ⁴admission with Korean Proficiency¹.
- In addition, Overseas students ³ must be at least 18 years of age, and may only enrol in a full time load and complete only one third of their whole course by distance or online learning.

Graduate Diploma of Arts (Korean)

AQF level 8

- Satisfactory completion of an accredited three-year bachelor award or equivalent in any discipline, with Korean Proficiency¹.
- In addition, Overseas students ³ must be at least 18 years of age, and may only enrol in a full time load and complete only one third of their whole course by distance or online learning.

Master of Arts (Korean)

AQF level 9

- Category 1- 1 years MA : Satisfactory completion of an accredited AQF level 8 award in the discipline of theology from an Australian tertiary institution or equivalent, with Korean Proficiency ¹ or
- Category 2- 1.5 years MA : Satisfactory completion of an accredited 3 year AQF level 7 award in the discipline of theology from an Australian tertiary institution or equivalent, with Korean Proficiency ¹
- In addition, Overseas students ³ must be at least 18 years of age, and may only enrol in a full time load and complete only one third of their whole course by distance or online learning.

Master of Divinity (Korean)

AQF level 9

- Satisfactory completion of an accredited three-year bachelor award or equivalent in any discipline, with Korean Proficiency¹ or
- Hold an SCD Graduate Certificate in Arts (Korean): to receive the award the student is required to complete a further 180 credit points (20 units), and hand back the GradCertArts (Korean) upon graduation; or

Master of Theology (Korean)

AQF level 9

- Hold an SCD Graduate Diploma of Arts (Korean): to receive the award the student is required to complete a further 144 credit points (16 units), and hand back the GradDipArts (Korean) upon graduation; or
- Hold an SCD Master of Arts (Korean)(72 /108 credit point): to receive the award the student is required to complete a further 144 /108 credit points, and hand back the MA (Korean) upon graduation; or
- Hold an SCD BTh (Korean) and receive a credit of 54 credit points allocated to level 8500 units with a maximum of 18 credit points in any discipline.
- In addition, Overseas students ³ must be at least 18 years of age, and may only enrol in a full time load and complete only one third of their whole course by distance or online learning.

¹Korean Language Proficiency

Adequate Korean language proficiency is:

- a. Satisfactory graduation from High School in Korea at a level that would gain admission into a Korean university, or
- b. Successful completion of an award from an accredited Korean University in the Korean language, or
- c. Have proficiency in the Korean language equivalent to level 5, for entry into Undergraduate programs and level 6 for entry into Postgraduate programs, on the 6 level Yonsei University Korean language Test

²Special Entry

A student may be admitted to a course on the basis of Special Entry. Such students might be:

- a. persons who have not yet reached mature age and who did not complete a satisfactory graduation from High School in Korea at a level that would gain admission into a university but has completed a trade certificate or equivalent;
- b. persons who have been educationally disadvantaged due to:
 - i. socio-economic reasons such as low-family income or poor living conditions;
 - ii. language difficulties;

- iii. learning difficulties;
 - iv. disrupted schooling;
 - v. physical disability;
 - vi. serious family illness;
 - vii. excessive family responsibility;
 - viii. geographical isolation of home and/or school and lack of support, time or facilities for study at home or school.
- c. persons who have completed a prescribed program of non-award study (4 units) and passed all units.

All Special Entry admissions are provisional.

- **Admission Procedures for Provisional Entry**

Admission to any SCD undergraduate course on the basis of **Mature Age** or **Special Entry** is a provisional admission, and requires special procedures:

- a. Students with provisional status shall be required to complete a 'Qualifying Period', whilst being permitted to enrol provisionally for the award.
- b. The 'Qualifying Period' may be undertaken full or part-time and the number of years spent in completing it shall be counted towards the maximum term for completion of the award.
- c. The 'Qualifying Period' shall consist of the successful completion of a 1/3 of the units that make up the award.
- d. The maximum time allowed for the completion of the 'Qualifying Period' shall be three years.
- e. Upon the successful completion of 1/3 of the units that make up the award, the provisional status of enrolment will be lifted.

³ **Overseas Students** (*Students who are entering Australia to study on a student visa. This does not include students who are residing outside of Australia during their course of study*)

- a. The SCD welcomes overseas students but admission to the SCD is governed by the requirements of the Australian Government, the SCD requirements (as set out above).
- b. Once the overseas student makes application, the student's academic qualifications are matched against the entry criteria to confirm their potential admission. This is done by the Sydney College of Divinity Registrar of the Korean Program and then approved by the Student Administration Committee of the SCD. Student's previous academic qualifications are evaluated using the AEI Country Education Profiles (CEP) online data.
- c. Overseas students may only enrol in full time courses and cannot complete such courses by more than 33.3% distance or online learning. All courses available to overseas students have units available by distance and / or on-line learning.
- d. All relevant documents must be submitted with the application, as applications which are inadequately documented cannot be considered.

- e. When enrolling in SCD courses in Korean language:
 - i. students are expected to be proficient in Korean;
 - ii. assessment tasks shall be set and examined in that language unless special permission to do otherwise is granted by the Academic Board;
- f. The information contained in this policy is communicated to the overseas student at the point of initial contact. Hard copy is included in the application package sent to the prospective student prior to them making application.

4 Professional Entry into Graduate Certificate in Arts with a professional concentration

a) Students not possessing an undergraduate degree meeting the normal entry requirements may seek provisional admission into a Graduate Certificate in Arts (with a professional concentration) via Professional Entry. This entry requires the student to:

Admission Process

Undergraduate and coursework postgraduate students enroll directly with the SCD Member Institutions using the standard SCD Admission form. Research degree students enroll directly with the SCD using the standard SCD Admission form. Prior to enrolment and before tuition fees are paid, students are informed of their rights and obligations including –

- All changes and proposed changes to their course of study over the duration of their course
- Policies, arrangements and potential eligibility for credit for prior learning
- Policies on tuition protection and refund of charges

Study

SCHEDULE OF UNITS OF STUDY

The Academic Board prescribes a Schedule of Units of Study approved as qualifying units for each program. The Schedule of Units of Study specifies for each unit details of the level, the number of credit points, the duration and the conditions which a candidate must satisfy to be eligible to enrol.

PROGRAM OF STUDY

A student's program of study in each year is subject to the approval of the Academic Board of the Teaching Body in which she or he is registered for that year. A program of study consists of units selected from the Schedule of Units of Study. A candidate may be permitted to change the program of study during the year, subject to the approval of the Academic Board of the Teaching Body in which the candidate is registered.

PREREQUISITE STUDIES

A candidate may not enrol in a unit offered by a Teaching Body unless the conditions for enrolment specified in the Schedule of Units of Study are satisfied or the Academic Board of the Teaching Body providing the unit has granted permission for enrolment.

ENROLMENT

This is completed each year with the understanding that the student's enrolment is continuous unless there is a written request for a deferment or leave of absence.

The Sydney College of Divinity does not discriminate on the grounds of race, age, gender, or denomination. Nevertheless, Teaching Bodies have the right to set legitimate prerequisites for particular courses. (For example, within the traditions represented in the Sydney College of Divinity some courses might demand candidacy for ordination as a prerequisite.) Teaching Bodies have the right to maintain their cultural and theological stance as part of the ethos of the Sydney College of Divinity.

A student may appeal through the Dean of the Sydney College of Divinity. For procedures see the Grievance Procedures.

No student may be enrolled concurrently in any other award within the College or that of any other tertiary institution, unless approval has been granted by the Academic Board. Students may take a limited number of units concurrently in another tertiary institution with the approval of the Academic Board of the Sydney College of Divinity. Approval will only normally be given where there is no similar unit available within the College and the unit is seen to be a desirable extension of the student's program of studies.

EXCLUSION FROM ENROLMENT

A Student may only attempt any unit twice.

ATTENDANCE

To complete a unit, a student must have been present for at least 80% of all prescribed activities, regardless of the mode of delivery.

Overseas students must satisfy Australian government progress requirements.

WITHDRAWAL & REFUND POLICY

[↳ Refund and Withdrawal Policy](#)

A student may withdraw from a unit or course at any time in a semester during their course of study, however, the student needs to be aware of the consequences of such an action.

Students may withdraw from units without academic penalty only if notice of withdrawal is submitted in writing to the college Registrar by 4.00 pm on the Census Date applicable to the unit in question.

If a student withdraws after the Census Date of the unit in question, a Fail grade will be given and tuition fees will not be refunded. If there are exceptional circumstances around this withdrawal a written request needs to be sent to the Registrar seeking a refund and detailing the exceptional circumstances.

NON-COMPLIANCE WITH UNIT REQUIREMENTS

If a student has not fulfilled attendance requirements or completed assessment tasks the Academic Board of the Teaching Body may exclude the student from further participation in the unit and from attendance at any examination for the unit. Where the student is not excluded the Academic Board of the Sydney College of Divinity may take up a recommendation from the Academic Board of the Teaching Body to permit the student to meet the requirements for satisfactory completion of the unit by a specified date.

QUALIFICATION FOR GRADUATION

Students expecting to qualify for graduation by the end of a year should ensure that their complete program of study will satisfy the rules for the award they are undertaking.

Student Identity Card

All new students are to be issued with a photo-identity card, which is to be carried by the student and shown on request. The card should be presented when applying for transport concessions and borrowing books from a Teaching Body library of the College which is not the Teaching Body in which the candidate is enrolled.

A student who loses his or her identity card is required to contact the Teaching Body where he or she is enrolled, complete an application for a new card, and pay the replacement charge where applicable. The number on the card is the student's SCD student number and should be quoted on all correspondence with the Teaching Body and the College.

Types of course units

Definitions of SCD Modes of Study

While it is common for multiple (blended) methods of delivery and types of technology to be utilised in teaching a single unit, the following definitions are helpful in categorising units for the purpose of interpreting student feedback and analysing particular demographics.

Where multiple methods of teaching and learning are employed in a single unit, mode of delivery can be assigned according to the way in which ***the majority of teaching and learning is facilitated***.

1. Face-to-face

This applies when ***most of the teaching and learning occurs synchronously in real time***, in a physical teaching space. The lecturer may be either physically or virtually present. Students may be either physically or virtually present.

This may include weekly classes, extensive or intensive offerings and online live streaming. Teaching and learning resources may be delivered either electronically or printed.

2. Distance

This applies when ***most of the teaching and learning occurs asynchronously (independently)***. Students and lecturers may meet and interact at times, either in virtual spaces or face-to-face, formally or informally, as a part of the students' coursework.

This may include online courses involving periodical virtual classroom sessions or short residential intensives. Teaching and learning resources may be delivered either electronically or printed.

As required under the *ESOS Act*, the SCD will permit overseas students to be taught by distance mode only up to 25% of their total program with at least one face-to-face unit in each of the teaching periods.

Types of Units

Within these modes, there are various types of units:

- Regular
- Intensive
- Extensive
- Independent guided study
- Research Project
- Research Essay

Regular

Those units which are delivered face-to-face and require weekly attendance throughout a semester.

Intensive

The usual semester-length course unit is offered over a one or two week period, either during term or in the summer and/or winter academic breaks. It is still a semester course and the student has the same time-frame of a normal semester-long program to complete assessment tasks. Faculty are available for consultation following the intensive.

Extensive

The usual semester-length course unit is offered over a number of days spread across a semester, e.g. five individual days (say, Mondays) or two to three weekends. It is still a semester course and the student has the same time-frame of a normal semester-long program to complete assessment tasks. Faculty are available for consultation following the extensive.

Independent Study mode

When a unit, from the SCD Schedule of Units of Study, is not offered in the semester in which the candidate wishes to take it, the candidate, by arrangement with the lecturer, may study the unit in independent reading mode. It is essentially a reading course with some individual, face-to-face contact with the lecturer arranged for mutually convenient

times. Fewer students now pursue units by independent study mode because of the large number of units available by distance and online.

Independent Guided Study mode

This course unit enables students with initiative and creativity to pursue ideas and areas of interest in the subject area. It affords the student an opportunity to continue to develop independent research and study skills. The student, in consultation with the Teaching Body Registrar/Academic Dean, arranges with a suitably qualified supervisor/ lecturer a course unit outline including content, outcomes, assessment and reading list and completes the unit in the normal timeframe. The IGS should not be confused with units studied as *Independent Study mode* (see above). Up to 18 credit points may be taken in this mode.

Research Project

The Research Project builds on the theological background, capacity and interests of a student and enables her or him to pursue broad research, often of a survey nature, into an area or topic within a discipline or across disciplines. This research cannot usually be done within the structures of individual coursework units or the focused study of a particular topic.

Research Essay

The Research Essay is worth 18 credit points and is 10,000 – 12,000 words in length. The student is assisted in the preparation of the essay by a supervisor appointed by the Teaching Body in which the student is enrolled. Approval for the research long essay topic is obtained from the Research Committee and, where applicable, may require clearance by the Ethics Committee. The Research Essay is examined by two examiners one of whom is normally from outside the Teaching Body where the student is enrolled. The supervisor is not eligible to be an examiner.

Demand hours

DEMAND HOURS

Demand Hours are the time to which each student is notionally committed. In the case of full-time students this is 44 hours per week. For each 9 credit point unit a typical break down is:

- 3 timetabled hours/week (time spent at lecturers, tutorials, engaged with online or other learning package, clinical or other placements)
- 8 hours/week devoted to assessable (4 hours) & non-assessable (4 hours) tasks
- 11 hours total workload/week
- 143 hours per 13 week semester

Demand hours for assessment tasks in the undergraduate program are notionally allocated on the basis of

- 12 demand hours per 1000 words
- 6 demand hours per 1 hour examination
- 12 demand hours per 15 mins of oral exam/class presentation

Demand hours in graduate programs are notionally allocated on the basis of

- 8 demand hours per 1000 words
- 8 demand hours per 15 mins oral exam/class presentation

PROGRAM OF STUDY

Students choose their units from the SCD Schedule of Units of Study for the program in which they are enrolled, taking into account the required pre-requisites, the timetable and other circumstances. Students who do not meet the pre-requisites may apply to the Academic Board to have these waived.

To satisfactorily complete a unit and gain the credit points offered a student shall:

- a. attend at least 80% of classes;
- b. complete the required essays, exercises and practical work, and sit for any tests and examinations; and
- c. reach a satisfactory level of achievement in the required essays, exercises, practical work, tests and examinations as may be determined by the Academic Board of the Teaching Body in which the unit is provided.

In circumstance where a student is prevented by unavoidable disruption from satisfying the requirements of the unit, he or she can approach the Registrar of the Teaching Body to request that the Academic Board of the Teaching Body in which the unit is provided take into account such disruption when assessing the candidate's performance.

Assessment

ASSESSMENT

Assessment of student performance in any unit is continuous or progressive and is determined at the end of the semester in which the unit is completed. The grade for that unit is based on the total marks gained. A grade is final when it has been approved by the Academic Board of the Sydney College of Divinity.

Within the Sydney College of Divinity, the development of assessment packages is based on an understanding of demand hours derived from the following principles:

1. The educational model used is that of adult learning. Each class is a community of adult learners, lecturer and students together. The desired end is not simply to impart information to students but for them to develop into self-directed, self-motivated learners. Their own experience and learning is an essential ingredient in the learning process.
2. Students have only a limited amount of time that can be expended on a course unit. No course unit is entitled to more student time than any other unit for equivalent credit. (Clearly there is some latitude for units with a large praxis component.) Overall student loads per semester can make demands on only a set amount of time in a student's week.
3. Each course unit involves a range of educational tasks: lectures, reading, note taking, tutorials, presentations, essays etc. Assessment tasks make up only a percentage of learning tasks, and can therefore demand only a corresponding percentage of the time allocated to that unit.

EXTENSIONS OF TIME FOR COMPLETION OF ASSESSMENT TASKS

Students must submit all assignments by the due dates set by lecturers as published in the Course Unit Booklets.

Late Penalty

Late assignments without an approved extension will attract an automatic penalty deduction of 5% of the marks available for the item of assessment for every day (including weekends and holidays), or part thereof, beyond the date and time of submission (or any extension granted).

Assignments submitted without an approved extension beyond 10 days after the due date will receive a zero mark and NOT be annotated by the lecturer.

Example:

Student submits an assignment worth 50 marks 4 days late.

Total mark available=50

Penalty: 4 days late = 5% of 50×4 = 10 mark penalty

The student's original mark is 40.

Final mark =40-10=30

Grounds for Extension

An extension of an assignment's due date may be granted on the following grounds –

- Medical illness (certified by Medical Certificate)

- Extreme hardship
- Compassionate grounds

In such cases an extension of up to 28 days may be granted without penalty but only if requested before the assignment due date. The student should submit an “Application for Extension” including supporting documentation to the Teaching Body for authorising and signing by the Lecturer / Registrar /Academic Secretary prior to the due date. The student will then be informed of the result of the request.

In extreme cases, extensions beyond 28 days may be granted. Such extensions must be applied for in writing, including supporting documentation, to the Teaching Body setting out the extreme circumstances. The appropriate Teaching Body’s committee will consider such an unusual extension and notify the student of the outcome in writing.

If the unit assessment includes an examination and an extension is granted arrangements will be made for an alternative examination to be given to the student within the extension period.

This information is attached to all course unit guides given to SCD students

WEIGHTING OF ASSESSMENT TASKS

The overall length of assessment tasks are as follows for a 9 credit point unit:

- undergraduate programs (AQF Levels 5, 6, 7): 4,000 words or equivalent
- postgraduate programs (AQF Levels 8, 9): 5,000 words or equivalent

Assessment tasks, eg portfolios, that fall outside the items included in the grid require approval from the relevant Discipline Coordinator.

GRADING SYSTEM

PASS (P) 50-64%

The grade will be awarded where there is evidence that a student has undertaken the required core work for the topic and has demonstrated sound knowledge /understanding /competencies /skills required for meeting topic outcomes and satisfactorily completing essential assessment exercises.

The student would normally have attained a sound knowledge of matter contained in set texts or reading materials, and demonstrated a good general level of familiarity with major academic debates, approaches, methodologies and conceptual tools.

CREDIT (C) 65-74%

The grade will be awarded where there is evidence that a student has undertaken all of the required core work for the topic and additional work in wider areas relevant to the

topic, and has demonstrated a sound level of knowledge /understanding /competencies /skills required for meeting topic outcomes and completing assessment exercises at a proficient standard.

The student would normally have attained a sound knowledge of matter contained in set texts or reading materials and have done wider reading, and demonstrated familiarity with and the ability to apply a range of major academic debates, approaches, methodologies and conceptual tools.

Students should have a reasonable opportunity of reaching this grade provided they have completed all course requirements, demonstrated proficiency in the full range of course objectives and shown considerable evidence of a sound capacity to work with the range of relevant subject matter.

DISTINCTION (D) 75-84%

The grade will be awarded where there is evidence that a student has undertaken all of the required core work for the topic at a high level and considerable additional work in wider areas relevant to the topic, has demonstrated advanced knowledge /understanding /competencies /skills required for meeting topic outcomes and completing assessment exercises at a high standard.

The student would normally have attained an advanced knowledge of matter beyond that contained in set texts or reading materials and have done considerable wider reading, and have demonstrated a broad familiarity with and facility at applying a range of major academic debates, approaches, methodologies and conceptual tools.

The grade should reflect very high quality work which shows the student generally works at a level which is beyond the requirements of the assessment exercise and is developing a capacity for original and creative thinking.

HIGH DISTINCTION (H) 85-100%

The grade will be awarded where there is evidence that a student has undertaken the required core work for the topic at a high level and considerable additional work in wider areas relevant to the topic, has demonstrated the acquisition of an advanced level of knowledge/understanding/ competencies/skills required for meeting topic outcomes and passing the range of topic elements at the highest level.

The student would normally have attained an in-depth knowledge of matter contained in set texts or reading materials and undertaken extensive wider reading beyond that which is required or expected. The student would have consistently demonstrated a high level of proficiency at applying a range of major academic debates, approaches, methodologies and conceptual tools and combining a knowledge of the subject matter of the topic with original and creative thinking.

The grade is reserved for recognition of the highest level of academic achievement expected of a student at a given topic level.

SATISFACTORY (S)

The grade will be awarded in a topic that is assessed only on a pass or fail basis, where a satisfactory level of performance and participation has been achieved. The grade may be awarded to reflect:

- that the student has achieved mastery of the topic content; and
- that the student has satisfactorily completed topic requirements or contractual requirements where these form a prerequisite or condition of passing, or continuing with a program of study.

Satisfactory is awarded on a pass/fail basis and a score would not normally be assigned.

FAIL (N) 0-49%

The grade will be awarded if a student is unable to demonstrate satisfactory academic performance in the topic or has failed to complete essential topic elements or required assessment tasks at an acceptable level, in accordance with topic objectives.

This grade also applies where there is evidence of gross errors, plagiarism or negligence in regard to the course requirements.

EXTENSION (E)

This grade may be given under extenuating circumstances, such as illness, accident, misadventure or any other serious problem which make it impossible for the student to complete assignment(s) by the end of the semester. An overall extension for a unit may be given when the student has completed at least one of the prescribed assessment tasks. The fact that several pieces of written work for different units are due within a short period is not a valid excuse for the granting of an extension. Students are expected to plan their study, employment and extracurricular activities so that they are able to submit work by the due date. Upon completion of the work any grade can be given. The date of completion is determined by the relevant lecturer, in light of the relevant SCD policy, normally within a month of the commencement of the following semester. The revised final grade will be submitted to the Coursework Committee with the results for the following semester.

For the purposes of monitoring, an 'Explanation of Grades' ProForma should be submitted. A student's request for an extension, in writing, should be available to the monitor.

INCOMPLETE (I)

This grade is used when normally one of the assessment tasks for a unit is incomplete. The student will have previously provided an explanation to the Teaching Body Academic Board in writing clearly stating the reasons that extra time is being sought. It will lead to no grade higher than a pass upon the completion of the work by the student. The date of completion will be determined by the relevant lecturer, in light of the relevant SCD policy, normally within a month of the commencement of the following semester. The revised final grade will be submitted to the Academic Standards Committee with the results for the following semester.

For the purposes of monitoring, an 'Explanation of Grades' ProForma together with student's request in writing needs to be attached.

UNAVAILABLE RESULTS (U)

This grade is given where grades are unavailable at the time of monitoring of results through no fault of the student. A covering letter by the Teaching Body explaining the reasons for U results must be submitted during the Semester Monitoring of Results.

WITHDRAWAL (W)

The Withdrawal grade is awarded where the student withdraws from a unit in accordance with the rules governing withdrawal.

SATISFACTORY PROGRESS (SP)

The Satisfactory Progress grade is used where a unit of study, requiring one piece of assessment (eg. Research Essay, Research Project), extends across more than one semester. This will automatically flag that no final result is due until a later semester, which will be an amended grade. This grade is also used when a research essay or thesis has been submitted for examination and the final result is still to be resolved. Coursework units that extend across more than one semester will be required to submit a grade for monitoring at the completion of the unit.

UNSATISFACTORY PROGRESS (UP)

The Unsatisfactory progress grade is used where a unit of study continues into the following semester and a student is judged to not be progressing satisfactorily. If a student receives this grade, he or she, in consultation with his or her lecturer/supervisor, will be required to submit a plan to the Academic Dean detailing how the student intends to complete the unit on time. The study plan must be received by the Academic Dean before the commencement of the following semester.

Table of Grade descriptors

The general description of each of the grades in the table below is the overarching statement of the principles that discriminate between each of the grades.

The subsidiary descriptions (*Reading, Knowledge of topic, Articulation of argument, Analytical and evaluative skills, Problem solving, Expression and presentation appropriate to the discipline, Oral presentation skills, Tutorial preparation, Participation and interaction with others*) amplify the general description. The subsidiary descriptions are guides to the general description. Student work at any grade will satisfy some of the subsidiary descriptions without necessarily satisfying all subsidiary descriptions.

The grade point average is calculated as follows

$$\text{GPA} = (4H + 3D + 2C + 1P + 0N) \div E$$

where H is the number of credit points gained at H grade

D is the number of credit points gained at D grade

C is the number of credit points gained at C grade

P is the number of credit points gained at P grade

N is the number of credit points attempted but which earned an N grade

E is the total number of credit points attempted, excluding units with W and S.

Examinations

EXAMINATIONS

The conduct of examinations is determined by the Academic Board of the Teaching Body in which the unit is offered, which shall ensure that the time of the examination is notified in the calendar and adhered to.

Where a candidate

- a) is prevented by unavoidable disruption from attending an examination in a unit; or
- b) was affected immediately prior to such examination by unavoidable disruption which the candidate believes seriously prejudiced the performance of such examination; or
- c) is to a substantial degree affected by unavoidable disruption during the course of any such examination, and either during or immediately after such examination reports the facts to the supervisor in charge —

the candidate may as soon as practicable after such examination, and in any case not later than the day following the final day of the examination period, as notified in the examination timetable (or within such time as the Registrar of the Teaching Body may in special cases permit), report the circumstances in writing (supported by a medical certificate or other proper evidence) to the Registrar of the Teaching Body and request that they be taken into account when assessing the result of such examination. If a candidate is personally unable to take the action required in such case by this rule, some other person may take such action on the candidate's behalf.

The Teaching Body in which the unit was taught may apply to the Academic Board of the Sydney College of Divinity for permission for the student to sit a special examination conducted by that Teaching Body.

UNAVOIDABLE DISRUPTION

The Academic Board has adopted the following definition of unavoidable disruption, to be applied to the requirements to complete a unit, the provision of special examinations, the discontinuance of a unit and exclusion from a unit.

Unavoidable disruption to studies is defined as resulting from an event or set of circumstances which:

- a) could not have reasonably been anticipated, avoided or guarded against by the student and
- b) were beyond the student's control and
- c) caused substantial disruption to the student's capacity for effective study and/or the completion of required work and
- d) interfered with the otherwise satisfactory fulfilment of unit or program requirements.

Circumstances routinely encountered by students would not normally be acceptable grounds for claiming unavoidable disruption to studies. Such matters include:

- a) routine demands of employment;
- b) routine family problems such as domestic tension with or between parents, spouses, and other people closely involved with the student;
- c) difficulties adjusting to College life, to the self-discipline needed to study effectively, and the demands of academic work;
- d) stress or anxiety associated with examinations, required assignments or any aspect of academic work;
- e) routine need for financial support;
- f) demands of sport, clubs and social or extra-curricular activities.

Any claim based on these categories would need to show clearly, with appropriate documentation, that the student's particular circumstances were so extreme, individually or in combination, as to warrant consideration.

It must also be shown that the alleged disruption seriously interfered with the student's studies or exam performance to the extent that had it not occurred, he or she would in all likelihood have given a satisfactory performance.

The Academic Board will treat as unavoidable disruption cases where the student has been prevented from attending an examination for the following reasons:

- a) as a member of the armed forces involved in compulsory exercises;
- b) as a person in full-time employment required to be overseas by his or her employment;
- c) as a member of the emergency services including the medical profession;
- d) as a person representing Australia at an international sporting or cultural event.

Appeals

COURSEWORK STUDENTS

A student may appeal against the result given in any item of assessment when that student believes that some error in grading has been made or when there are concerns about the grade awarded.

In the first instance the student shall raise this matter with the lecturer concerned. After this informal dialogue, if the student still believes there are grounds to appeal, the student may formally appeal to the Academic Board of their .

Where a student believes that the review procedures in the Teaching body have not been followed with regard to an appeal against a failed final grade, the student may appeal to the Academic Board of the College;

- a. this is the only ground on which an appeal can be made to the Academic Board;

- b. the appeal must be submitted in writing to the Dean within ten working days of receipt of the determinative outcome of the appeal from the ;
- c. the student must provide the Dean with documented evidence that the regulations on Review and Appeals have not been complied with by the ;
- d. the Academic Board will deal with the appeal at its discretion;
- e. the decision of the Academic Board will be final.

RESEARCH DEGREE CANDIDATES

Research degree candidates may appeal against a decision of the Academic Board:

- a. to terminate candidature;
- b. not to award the degree;
- c. not to allow re-submission.

A candidate may appeal on the grounds of:

- a. procedural irregularities;
- b. evidence of prejudice or bias.

The research degree program appeals process shall operate according to the following rules:

- a. a candidate shall notify an appeal in writing to the Dean of the College within 30 days of notification of the decision which is the subject of the appeal;
- b. on receipt of an appeal the Dean shall refer the matter to the Standing Committee of Council;
- c. on receipt of a formal notification of an appeal, the Standing Committee of Council shall establish an *ad hoc* Research Postgraduate Appeals Committee which shall:
 - 1. be composed of:
 - i. an independent chairperson, being a member of the College Council;
 - ii. the chairperson of the Academic Board;
 - iii. the Dean of the College;
 - iv. a postgraduate candidate.
 - 2. determine and report to the College Council on appeals by research degree candidates against a decision of the Academic Board:
 - i. to terminate candidature;
 - ii. not to award the degree;
 - iii. not to allow re-submission.
- d. the Appeals Committee shall meet within 21 days of having been appointed;
- e. the appellant shall have the right to present to the Appeals Committee any material deemed relevant to the appeal;
- f. the appellant may also exercise an option to appear before the committee in which case

1. the appellant may be accompanied by an advisor whose function shall be to support the appellant;
 2. the advisor shall not be permitted to act as advocate or spokesman;
- g. the decision of the Appeals Committee shall be final and shall be reported to the next meeting of the College Council.

Credit & RPL

CREDIT FOR PREVIOUS STUDY OR CONCURRENT STUDY

Credit may be granted in units, for comparable work completed or concurrently being undertaken at an approved level at any recognised tertiary institution, according to the SCD Credit Policy.

Applications for credit are received by the Registrar of the in which a student is enrolled and processed by the Sydney College of Divinity Student Support and Administration Committee. Any documentation must include an authorised transcript of the studies undertaken and the official description of units completed at the other institutions.

A candidate may not count for credit towards any award a successfully completed unit which in the opinion of the Academic Board of the concerned, is a similar unit to one the student has already successfully completed for credit, whether at the College or any other tertiary provider

Students may also apply for credit under the principle of Recognition of Prior Learning.

RECOGNISED PRIOR LEARNING (RPL)

Recognition of prior learning is a form of assessment, which matches students' skills and knowledge with the outcomes of courses or units of courses in an accredited program. Applicants are responsible for demonstrating that the skills and knowledge they have obtained through work or life experience, match the outcomes of the units in the accredited program. An RPL application is made by following the SCD Application for Recognised Prior Learning process including completing the SCD RPL application form.

The Sydney College of Divinity Student Support and Administration Committee makes a judgment about the extent to which the applicant has demonstrated such a correlation.

Policy statement on lending from libraries

1. Circulating Library materials may be borrowed by faculty and students of Sydney College of Divinity from any member library in accordance with the borrowing regulations of the lending library.
2. Member Libraries will maintain a current written statement of their policies in the public service areas along with the current statement of Sydney College of Divinity

consortial policy. These policies apply equally to students and staff. The borrowing of material by a patron will be construed as accepting the policies of the libraries they use.

3. Borrowers will be notified of overdue material by the library from which material was borrowed. If a patron does not respond to the first overdue notice, the patron's library will be notified. Upon notification, the patron's library will take steps to assist the recovery of borrowed materials or collection of monies owed. However, the borrower owing money or holding overdue materials is expected to settle the matter with the library which is owed materials or money.

The lending library will notify the borrower's home library when the matter has been settled. Copies of further communications between borrower and lending library will be sent to the patron's home library.

The failure to pay fines or return recalled material will result in the loss of the individual's borrowing privileges at all Sydney College of Divinity libraries. Examination results will not be credited to a student unless all books are returned, the cost of replacement and/or all fines paid. Specific action to be taken against offenders will be discussed at meetings of the Libraries Committee. If materials cannot be recovered the shall pay for the replacement cost.

Ethics in Research

All research involving human subjects must be carried out according to the Ethical Research Policy and requires the approval of either the Ethics Committee or the equivalent body within each of the Teaching Bodies . This policy includes research by academic staff, research candidates and students.

Harassment

All students and staff of the Sydney College of Divinity are expected to respect the rights of all other people for freedom from any form of harassment. The Sydney College of Divinity is committed under the principles and requirements of the **NSW Anti-Discrimination Act 1977**, and the **Commonwealth Sex Discrimination Act 1984**, to ensuring that any and all matters relating to harassment are dealt with speedily, sensitively, equitably, confidentially and according to proper processes.

Academic misconduct

ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT: REGULATIONS FOR STUDENTS

The integrity of the academic processes of the Sydney College of Divinity requires that academic misconduct be identified, discouraged and disciplined when it occurs, because it interferes with the awarding of appropriate recognition of legitimate effort. This policy is concerned with academic misconduct on the part of current or previous students.

Alleged misconduct, academic or other, on the part of a faculty member or any other staff member may be addressed through the *Student Grievance Policy and Procedures*.

Academic misconduct includes, but is not limited to, the following:

- a. **PLAGIARISM:** Plagiarism is the representation of another's works or ideas as one's own; it includes the unacknowledged word for word use or paraphrasing of another person's work, and the inappropriate unacknowledged use of another person's ideas.
- b. **CHEATING:** Cheating is the providing or receiving of information during tests and examinations; or providing or using unauthorized assistance at the computer terminal, or on field work. Cheating would not usually include consultation with others or discussion amongst students about the preparation of assignments unless that was specifically forbidden. It includes unauthorised collusion.
- c. **FRAUD:** Academic fraud is the falsification and fabrication of, or dishonesty in reporting, research results.
- d. **IMPROPER BEHAVIOUR:** Improper behaviour is behaviour that interferes with students or staff in the pursuit of their academic endeavours. It includes disruptive behaviour in class or institutional facilities such as libraries.
- e. **MISREPRESENTATION:** Misrepresentation is the giving of false or misleading information in academic matters. It includes falsely claiming credit for past study and falsely stating that thesis material has not been used in another thesis.
- f. **UNETHICAL BEHAVIOUR:** Unethical behaviour is behaviour that breaches accepted ethical standards. It includes failing to observe the terms of an ethical approval to conduct research; misuse of confidential information obtained in field education.

The question to be asked in relation to demonstrated academic misconduct will be whether the student is to be excluded from the course, suspended from the course, or otherwise penalized in a lesser way, to be determined with regard to proportion, for example, loss or reduction of marks for an item of assessment or for a whole unit.

The procedures for addressing complaints of academic misconduct are set out below.

General Procedures

Complaints may be made against:

- any person enrolled or previously enrolled in any SCD course, whether or not proceeding to an award;
- any person holding an award conferred by the SCD.

Complaints may be made by any person who has direct knowledge of academic misconduct.

A complaint must:

- identify the person against whom it is made;
- identify the nature of the misconduct complained of;
- provide appropriate evidence of the alleged misconduct, including the names of witnesses where appropriate.

Specific Procedures

Addressing complaints of academic misconduct on the part of students enrolled as follows:

(i) For Coursework in Teaching Bodies

The complaint should be made to the Academic Dean (and advise the Principal), who will undertake a preliminary enquiry into the matter. Both the person complaining and the person against whom the complaint is brought will be invited to speak with the Academic Dean separately.

The person against whom the complaint is brought may at this or any stage be assisted by another person acting as advocate.

If the matter is not resolved at this stage to the satisfaction of all concerned, the Academic Dean will convene a panel of three people to consider the matter including the Academic Dean and two other persons of appropriate seniority and experience, one or both of whom may be SCD faculty members from other or external academics. If the matter is not resolved at this stage, unless the person bringing the complaint has preferred to go directly to the SCD Dean at an earlier stage, the Academic Dean will bring the matter to the SCD Dean.

Upon receiving the complaint the SCD Dean will:

- a. acknowledge receipt of the complaint within seven days;
- b. examine the complaint to establish whether a *prima facie* case is established; in making such a determination the Dean will consider:
 - whether the behaviour complained about would, if established, constitute academic misconduct under this policy;
 - whether the evidence provided is sufficient to support the allegation;
- c. inform the complainant and the person against whom the complaint has been brought that no further action is proposed if it is considered that a *prima facie* case has not been established;
- d. refer the complaint to an Academic Misconduct Committee if it is considered that a *prima facie* case has been established and notify the person bringing the complaint that this has been done;
- e. notify the person against whom the complaint has been brought that the matter has been referred to an Academic Misconduct Committee, ensuring that the person receives clear details of the allegation and clear information about the procedures of the Academic Misconduct Committee and their implications;

- f. appoint an Academic Misconduct Committee of three persons of appropriate seniority and experience, one or two of whom may be SCD faculty members from other and at least one of whom will be an external academic, and none of whom will be a staff member in the in which the student is enrolled.

The Academic Misconduct Committee thus appointed will:

- a. elect a Chair from amongst the members;
- b. receive summary information from the SCD Dean but otherwise inform itself about the alleged misconduct in any way it thinks fit;
- c. give the person against whom the misconduct is alleged sufficient notice of its deliberations to allow the person to present a defence in writing and in person;
- d. if the circumstances warrant it, conduct an interview of the person against whom the misconduct is alleged, allowing the person to be accompanied by another person to act as advocate;
- e. having considered the evidence before it, will make its findings on the balance of probabilities: where the complaint is a grave one or likely to be attended by serious consequences, the Committee should be more clearly convinced of the misconduct than would be required in less serious kinds of case.

The Academic Misconduct Committee may:

- a. dismiss a complaint;
- b. find a complaint established and impose no penalty;
- c. find a complaint established and admonish the person;
- d. find a complaint established and order that the person forfeit marks in an assignment, fail a course unit or all the units in which the person is enrolled in a semester;
- e. find the complaint established and suspend the person from enrolling in the SCD for a period not exceeding two semesters: a person who is suspended may not enrol in the SCD for anything from which the person is suspended while the suspension is in force; at the expiration of the suspension the person may re-enrol without further permission;
- f. find the complaint established and exclude the person from enrolment in the SCD for a period not less than four semesters: a person who is excluded may not enrol in the Sydney College of Divinity while the exclusion is in force; at the expiration of the period of exclusion the person may not re-enrol without the express permission of the Academic Board;
- g. find the complaint established and recommend to Council that a degree or other award conferred on the person be revoked and annulled;
- h. find the complaint established and impose a combination of the above penalties;
- i. notify the SCD Dean of the outcome.

The SCD Dean will then:

- a. if the complaint has been established, include a record of the incident in the person's file;
- b. if the Committee's order involves forfeiture of marks, failure in one or more course units, suspension of enrolment or exclusion from enrolment, ensure that the relevant results and/or bars to enrolment are enacted and inform Academic Board of the incident
- c. if the order involves a recommendation that a degree or other award conferred on the person be revoked and annulled, ensure that this recommendation is brought to Council for final determination, and enact Council's decision;
- d. ensure that the person is informed in writing of the final outcome.

(ii) For Coursework in the SCD Korean School of Theology

The complaint should be made to the Dean of Studies (Korean Program), who will undertake a preliminary enquiry into the matter. Both the person complaining and the person against whom the complaint is brought will be invited to speak with the Dean of Studies (Korean Program) separately.

The person against whom the complaint is brought may at this or any stage be assisted by another person acting as advocate.

If the matter is not resolved at this stage to the satisfaction of all concerned, the Dean of Studies (Korean Program) will convene a panel of three people to consider the matter including the Dean of Studies (Korean Program) and two other persons of appropriate seniority and experience, one or both of whom may be SCD faculty members from one of the SCD MIs or external academics. These two should include at least one person fluent in both Korean and English. If the matter is not resolved at this stage, or unless the person bringing the complaint has preferred to go directly to the SCD Dean at an earlier stage, the Dean of Studies (Korean Program) will bring the matter to the SCD Dean.

Procedure then follows as for (i) above, with the proviso that, if an Academic Misconduct Committee is appointed, its members will include at least one person fluent in both Korean and English.

(iii) For Research Degrees in the SCD

The complaint should be made to the SCD Director of Research, who will undertake a preliminary enquiry into the matter. Both the person complaining and the person against whom the complaint is brought will be invited to speak with the Director of Research separately.

The person against whom the complaint is brought may at this or any stage be assisted by another person acting as advocate.

If the matter is not resolved at this stage to the satisfaction of all concerned, the Director of Research will convene a panel of three people to consider the matter including the

Director of Research and two other persons of appropriate seniority and experience, one or both of whom may be SCD faculty members from one of the SCD MIs or external academics. If the matter is not resolved at this stage, or unless the person bringing the complaint has preferred to go directly to the SCD Dean at an earlier stage, the Director of Research will bring the matter to the SCD Dean.

Procedure then follows as for (i) above.

Appeals

A person against whom a complaint of misconduct has been established under these procedures or the procedures of a Teaching Body may appeal to the Academic Board within thirty days of receiving the decision of an Academic Misconduct Committee. If a person lodges an appeal, the implementation of any penalty will be stopped until the appeal is resolved.

The Chair of the Academic Board will, as required, appoint an Academic Misconduct Appeals Committee of three persons to hear appeals on matters of academic misconduct. The members of this Committee will be the Academic Board Chair and two other senior and experienced persons external to the SCD and its MIs.

The Academic Misconduct Appeals Committee thus appointed:

- a. may establish its own procedures, including the election of a Chair;
- b. must allow the appellant to present an appeal in writing and in person;
- c. must permit the person to be accompanied to any hearing by person acting as advocate;
- d. having considered the evidence before it, will make its findings on the balance of probabilities: where the complaint is a grave one or likely to be attended by serious consequences, the Committee should be more clearly convinced of the misconduct than would be required in less serious kinds of case;
- e. may affirm, vary or set aside the decision under appeal;
- f. will report its decision to:
 - a. the appellant;
 - b. the Chair of Academic Board, who will report the outcome of any misconduct appeal to the Academic Board and to Council; and
 - c. the Dean, who will be responsible for implementing the decision of the Committee.

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Records and Communication

Records of the making and resolution of a complaint about academic misconduct will be kept in a separate file for each complaint. When a complaint is established, a note recording the nature of the complaint and any penalty imposed will be placed on the

person's file. A person's academic transcript will not contain any reference to academic misconduct as the reason for a course result or other record.

In general, information about established complaints will be kept confidential.

The Dean is authorised to inform another educational institution of an established complaint of academic misconduct if the Dean considers it appropriate to do so. In the case of the revocation and annulment of a degree or other award, the Dean is authorised to make such public announcement as the Dean, on the advice of Council, may think appropriate in the circumstances of the case. Nothing in this paragraph prevents the transmission of information within the Sydney College of Divinity for the purpose of giving effect to these procedures.

Undergraduate Certificate

Graduate Profile and Rationale

The Undergraduate Certificate in Ministry provides students with the opportunity to undertake AQF Level 5 study in practical ministry-oriented disciplines, in order to enhance their prospects of employment in a ministry setting, within a church or para-church context.

The Undergraduate Certificate in Ministry provides an opportunity to gain knowledge and skills appropriate for engagement in practical Christian ministry within a limited scope of defined operation.

Outcomes

Graduates will have:

Knowledge

Introductory biblical and theological knowledge and knowledge of technical concepts and processes involved in a practical area of service as a basis for effective performance and for further learning

Skills

Cognitive, communication, and technical skills in a ministry-related body of knowledge, so that they are able to:

- express ideas and perspectives related to the Christian faith
- communicate ministry-related knowledge, skills, and ideas to others

ACADEMIC REGULATIONS for the Undergraduate Certificate in Ministry

1 Admission to Candidature

- 1.1 An applicant for admission to candidature for an Undergraduate Certificate in Ministry shall:
- 1.1.1 have satisfactorily completed Year 10 in the Australian school system, or its equivalent; and if still in secondary school have a written recommendation from the School Principal; OR
 - 1.1.2 have adequate grounds for Special Entry with evidence of capacity for successful study at this level.

A candidate for the Undergraduate Certificate in Ministry shall be designated as full-time or part-time.

- 1.2 A student is designated as full-time if enrolled in three units (27 credit points) in one semester or part-time if enrolled in less than three units (27 credit points) in one semester.

1.3 No candidate for the Undergraduate Certificate in Ministry may be concurrently enrolled in any other undergraduate or postgraduate course within the Sydney College of Divinity. Candidates may enrol in awards of other tertiary institutions with the approval of the Academic Board of the Member Institution.

1.4 Applicants whose entry qualifications were obtained in an institution where English is not the language of instruction normally will be required to demonstrate competency in English by an IELTS (or equivalent) result of 6.0 with no score below 5.5.

1.5 Application for enrolment in the Undergraduate Certificate in Ministry is made to the Registrar of the appropriate Teaching Body offering the program.

2 Course Structure

2.1 The Undergraduate Certificate in Ministry requires the completion of 36 credit points (4 units) which shall include:

2.1.1 9 credit points from the list of units in Part A of **Schedule 1 of units for the award;

2.1.2 18 credit points from the list of units in Part B of **Schedule 1 of units for the award;

2.1.3 9 credit points from any other units in **Schedule 1 of units for the award.

2.2 Where equivalent AQF 7 units are available, the above requirements may be met through the taking of AQF 7 units instead.

3 Period of Candidature

3.1 The period of candidature for the Undergraduate Certificate shall be 0.5 year (one semester) full-time or two years (four semesters) part-time.

3.2 In certain circumstances, the Student Support and Administration Committee may grant extensions.

4 Leave of Absence

4.1 The Student Support and Administration Committee may grant leave of absence from the Undergraduate Certificate in Ministry. The period of leave shall not be counted as part of the period of candidature for the Certificate.

4.2 The period of leave shall normally be one semester after which a candidate may apply for a further period of one semester or will be required to complete candidature.

5 Assessment

5.1 The assessment of subject units shall be in the manner approved by the Academic Board in line with the College's established guidelines for assessment packages.

5.2 Students may be required by the Academic Board to present themselves for oral examination.

5.3 Academic and non-academic misconduct will be penalised in accordance with the regulations of the Sydney College of Divinity, whose stipulations are severe.

6 Credit

6.1 A candidate may seek credit up to a maximum of 18 credit points in the Undergraduate Certificate in Ministry.

6.2 Credit will be granted for units that are from an equivalent award or institution and have outcomes, content, demand hours, and assessment equivalent to that of units in the Undergraduate Certificate in Ministry.

7 Progress to Further Awards

7.1 Students who complete the Undergraduate Certificate in Ministry will be eligible to proceed to the SCD Diploma of Ministry or Diploma of Theology with full credit of 36 credit points.

- 7.2 Students who complete the Undergraduate Certificate in Ministry with AQF 7 units in the award will be eligible to proceed to the Bachelor of Ministry or Bachelor of Theology with a maximum of 36 credit points according to the number of AQF 7 units taken (9 credit points each).

8 Saving Clause

- 8.1 Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained herein, the Academic Board of the Sydney College of Divinity may, in any case in which it may deem it appropriate to do so, vary, dispense with or suspend any requirement or prescription by these regulations, and report forthwith to the Council of the Sydney College of Divinity.

1.1 An applicant for admission to candidature for the Undergraduate Certificate in Theology shall:

1.1.1 have satisfactorily completed Year 12 in the Australian school system, or its equivalent; OR

1.1.2 have reached the age of 21 and so satisfy the requirements for Mature age entry with evidence of capacity for successful study at this level; OR

1.4 Applicants whose entry qualifications were obtained in an institution where English is not the language of instruction normally will be required to demonstrate competency in English by an IELTS (or equivalent) result of 6.5 with no score below 6.0.

1.5 Application for enrolment in the Undergraduate Certificate in Theology is made to the Registrar of the appropriate Teaching Body offering the program.

2 Course Structure

2.1 The Undergraduate Certificate in Theology requires the completion of 36 credit points (4 units) which shall include

2.1.1 9 credit points in Biblical Studies from the list of units in section A of **Schedule 1 of units for the award;

2.1.2 9 credit points in Systematic Theology from the list of units in section B of **Schedule 1 of units for the award;

2.1.3 18 credit points from any other units in section C of **Schedule 1 of units for the award.

3 Period of Candidature

3.1 The period of candidature for the Undergraduate Certificate shall be one semester full-time or two semesters part-time.

3.2 In certain circumstances, the Student Support and Administration Committee may grant extensions.

4 Leave of Absence

4.1 The Student Support and Administration Committee may grant leave of absence from the Undergraduate Certificate in Theology. The period of leave will not be counted as part of the period of candidature for the award.

Graduate Profile and Rationale

The Diploma of Ministry provides students with the opportunity to undertake AQF Level 5 study in practical ministry-oriented disciplines. It is designed for those who have a less formal educational background than those undertaking the BTh or BMin awards, or those who are seeking an award requiring less overall commitment than AQF Level 6 or 7 studies.

The Diploma of Ministry provides students with introductory study designed for Christians seeking a foundation for informed participation in the local church, para-church ministries, and in the wider community. It also provides some opportunity to gain

knowledge and skills appropriate for practical Christian ministry but not necessarily of the breadth or depth required for professional ministry. The award requires the completion of course units in Biblical Studies, Theology, and Christian Life and Ministry.

Outcomes

Knowledge

Graduates will have:

- technical and theoretical knowledge and concepts with introductory knowledge in Biblical Studies, Theology, and Christian Life and Ministry,
- wider experience of practical ministry generally that will form the basis for further learning.

Skills

Graduates will have cognitive, communication, and technical skills in a ministry-related body of knowledge so that they are able to:

- identify, analyse, and act on ministry-oriented information from a range of foundational sources,
- express ideas and perspectives related to Christian faith,
- communicate ministry-related knowledge, skills, and ideas to others.

Applications of Knowledge and Skills

Graduates will have the ability to:

- demonstrate an understanding of theological knowledge by applying it in Christian ministry,
- perform technical operations within Christian ministry that have some complexity, taking personal responsibility for them,
- organise, with initiative and judgment, the work of self and others, and plan, coordinate, and evaluate the work of teams (within broad but generally well-defined parameters).

1.2 A candidate for a Diploma of Ministry will be designated as full-time or part-time. A student is designated as full-time if enrolled in three units (27 credit points) or more in a semester or part-time if enrolled in less than three units (27 credit points) per semester.

1.3 No candidate for the DipMin may be concurrently enrolled in any other undergraduate or postgraduate course within the Sydney College of Divinity or any other tertiary institution unless approval has been granted by the Academic Board.

1.4 Applicants whose entry qualifications were obtained in an institution where English is not the language of instruction normally will be required to demonstrate competency in English by an IELTS (or equivalent) result of 6.0 with no score below 5.5.

1.5 Application for enrolment in the diploma program is made to the Registrar of the appropriate Teaching Body offering the program.

2 Course Structure

2.1 The Diploma of Ministry requires the completion of 72 credit points (8 units) which shall include:

2.1.1 at least 9 credit points in Biblical Studies;

2.1.2 at least 9 credit points in Theology;

2.1.3 at least 36 credit points in Christian Life and Ministry of which at least 18 credit points are Supervised Ministry (or units with the equivalent focus of hands-on ministry practice);

2.1.4 a further 18 credit points chosen from approved units.

2.2 All course units shall be taken from SCD units coded within the 5100 series.

3 Period of Candidature

3.1 The period of candidature for the Diploma shall normally be 1 year full-time and up to 3 years part-time.

3.2 In certain circumstances, the Student Support and Support and Administration Committee may grant extensions.

4 Leave of Absence

4.1 The Student Support and Administration Committee may grant leave of absence from the Diploma of Ministry. The period of leave shall not be counted as part of the period of candidature for the Diploma.

4.2 The period of leave shall normally be one semester after which a candidate may apply for a further period of one semester or will be required to complete candidature.

5 Assessment

5.1 The assessment of subject units shall be in the manner approved by the Academic Board in line with the College's established guidelines for assessment packages.

7.1 Students who complete the Diploma of Ministry and desire to undertake the Bachelor of Ministry or Bachelor of Theology will receive credit awarded to equivalent Bachelor units for Diploma units

completed with a grade of Credit or higher; or subject to additional assessment requirements set by the SCD Student Support and Administration Committee.

Graduate Profile and Rationale

The Diploma of Theology provides students with the opportunity to undertake AQF Level 5 study in theological disciplines. It is designed for those who have a less formal educational background than those undertaking the BTh or BMin awards, or those who are seeking an award requiring less overall commitment than AQF Level 6 or 7 studies.

The Diploma of Theology provides students with an introductory study across a range of theological disciplines. It is designed for Christians seeking a foundation for informed participation in the local church, para-church ministries, and the wider community. It also provides some opportunity to gain knowledge and skills appropriate for Christian ministry, but not necessarily of the breadth or depth required for professional ministry. The award requires the completion of course units in Biblical Studies, Theology, Church History, and Christian Life and Ministry.

Outcomes

Knowledge

Graduates will have

- technical and theoretical knowledge and concepts with introductory knowledge in Biblical Studies, Christian Life and Ministry, Humanities within the Christian Tradition, and Theology
- wider experience of theology generally that will form the basis for further learning.

Skills

Graduates will have cognitive, communication, and technical skills in a theology-related body of knowledge, so that they are able to:

- identify, analyse, synthesise, and act on theological information from a range of foundational sources
- express ideas and perspectives related to the Christian faith
- communicate theologically-related knowledge, skills, and ideas to others.

Applications of Knowledge and Skills

Graduates will have the ability to:

- demonstrate an understanding of theological knowledge by applying it in Christian ministry
- perform technical operations within Christian ministry that have some complexity, taking personal responsibility for them.
- organise, with initiative and judgment, the work of self and others, and plan, coordinate and evaluate the work of teams (within broad but generally well-defined parameters.)

Graduate Profile and Rationale

The Diploma of Christian Studies course is an undergraduate award that introduces students to Christian studies within higher education. Graduates will have acquired basic knowledge, skills, and values of Christian relevance to their professional, family, church, social, or personal lives, and have deepened their awareness of the nature and scope of theology and their affinity with it as a field of study within higher education.

It provides an opportunity to undertake some theological study with a special focus on Christian Thought (including Biblical Studies, Theology, and Humanities in the Christian Tradition) or on Christian Practice (Christian Life and Ministry). The special focus is achieved by completing a sub-major in the area of interest (see Academic Regulations section 2.1).

Outcomes

Knowledge

Graduates will have:

- technical and theoretical knowledge and concepts with introductory knowledge in Biblical Studies and Theology
- wider knowledge of the theological disciplines generally that will form the basis for further learning.

Skills

Graduates will have cognitive, communication, and technical skills in a theologically-related body of knowledge so that they are able to:

- identify, analyse, synthesise, and act on theological information from a range of foundational sources
- express ideas and perspectives in theology
- communicate theologically-related knowledge, skills, and ideas to others.

Applications of Knowledge and Skills

Graduates will have the ability to:

- perform technical operations of some complexity in relation to Christian living, taking personal responsibility for them.

The Associate Degree of Christian Thought and Practice course is an undergraduate award that provides an opportunity to undertake some theological study with special focus on Christian Thought (including Biblical Studies, Theology, and Humanities in the Christian Tradition) or on Christian Practice (including Christian Life and Ministry). All course units are undertaken at AQF Level 7. The special focus is achieved by completing a major in the area of interest (see academic Regulations section 2.1).

Outcomes

Graduates will have:

Knowledge

Graduates will have a broad theoretical and technical knowledge with depth in the underlying principles and concepts in Christian Thought or in Christian Practice, with basic knowledge in Theology and Biblical Studies forming the basis for further learning.

Skills

Graduates will have cognitive, thinking, and technical skills in a theologically-related body of knowledge, so that they are able independently to:

- identify, analyse, and evaluate theological information and concepts from a range of sources;
- identify and provide solutions to complex problems;
- interpret and transmit responses to sometimes complex problems in theology;
- demonstrate a broad understanding of knowledge and ideas, with some depth in theology;
- communicate clearly and coherently theologically-related knowledge, and ideas.

Applications of Knowledge and Skills

Graduates will have the ability to:

- use intuition and judgment to make plans, solve problems, and make decisions in para-professional ministry, demonstrating a broad understanding of knowledge by applying it creatively in ministry;

The Bachelor of Ministry course is a primary undergraduate award which provides a broad and coherent study of Christian Life and Ministry and related studies in Biblical Studies and Theology. This degree prepares candidates for professional and lay Christian ministry and for further learning beyond the degree.

2.5.1 If a student wishes to undertake a major in Biblical Studies, then 54 credit points in Biblical Studies plus 9 credit points in A7112 Introduction to Biblical Hebrew, A7122 Introduction to New Testament Greek, or A7111 Introduction to Biblical Languages must be taken before or concurrently with any post-7100 series Biblical Studies units.

The Bachelor of Ministry (Honours) award qualifies candidates who apply a body of theological knowledge in a specific context to undertake professional work and as a pathway for research and further learning in Christian ministry.

Outcomes

Graduates will have a coherent and advanced body of knowledge with depth in the underlying principles and concepts in one or more disciplines related to Christian ministry, and knowledge of research principles and methods.

Skills

Graduates will have cognitive and technical skills in a theologically-related body of knowledge so that they are able independently to:

- review, analyse, synthesise and transform theological information and identify and transmit solutions to complex ministry problems;
- think critically, evaluate and generate complex ideas in developing new strategies in the practice of Christian ministry;
- technical skills to design and use research in a project;
- communicate theologically-related knowledge, skills, and ideas clearly and coherently to a variety of audiences.

Applications of Knowledge and Skills

- 1.3 An applicant may not be admitted to candidature unless the Teaching Body in which he or she is enrolled can ensure that adequate supervision is available.
- 1.4 Applicants whose entry qualifications were obtained in an institution where English is not the language of instruction will be required to demonstrate competency in English by an IELTS result of 7.0 in all bands of the test and may be required to attend such English language courses as prescribed by the Sydney College of Divinity.
- 1.5 Applicants will be required to show evidence of competence in appropriate ancient and/or modern languages in order to access primary sources and significant secondary works relevant to their thesis topic. Language requirements will be determined at the time of application in consultation with the proposed supervisor.
- 1.6 Application for enrolment in the Bachelor of Ministry (Honours) is made to the Registrar of the appropriate Teaching Body offering the program.
- 1.7 No candidate for the BMin(Hons) may be concurrently enrolled in any other undergraduate or postgraduate course within the Sydney College of Divinity or any other tertiary institution unless the candidate is enrolled in an approved joint degree program unless approval has been granted by the Academic Board.

2 Course Structure

- 2.1 The Bachelor of Ministry (Honours) requires the completion of 72 credit points, comprising 36 credit points in coursework and a thesis for 36 credit points.
- 2.2 The award shall include:
- 2.2.1 an 8100-series Research Methodology Unit (9 credit points)
- 2.2.2 an 8100-series Honours Seminar Unit (9 credit points)
- 2.2.3 a further two units (18 credit points in total) in the area of specialisation from 9200-series units

2.2.4 a supervised research project of 20,000 words for 36 credit points in the area of specialisation.

2.3 A candidate may not submit as the main content of the project any work or material which has previously been submitted for a degree without major reworking.

2.4 The appropriate body of the Teaching Body in which the candidate is enrolled shall appoint a supervisor.

2.5 Within four weeks (FTE) of enrolling in the year in which the thesis is to be written the candidate's supervisor shall receive a thesis topic which is to be submitted by the appropriate body of the Member Institution for approval to the Research Committee of the Sydney College of Divinity.

2.6 All thesis proposals involving the gathering of personal information from people by surveys, interviews or case studies, etc must first be referred to the Research Committee for approval using the appropriate forms and will be dealt with according to the procedures and policies of the Ethics Review Committee.

3 Period of Candidature

3.1 The period of candidature for the degree shall normally be 1 year full-time study or up to 3 years part-time.

3.2 In certain circumstances, the Student Support and Administration Committee may grant extensions.

4 Monitoring of Candidature

4.1 Once each semester, and at any other time considered appropriate, the supervisor of the project shall report to the appropriate body of the Teaching Body on the progress of each candidate using the appropriate form.

5 Termination of Candidature

5.1 If for any reason the candidate's progress is deemed to be unsatisfactory, the Teaching Body in which the candidate is enrolled will ask the candidate to show cause why candidature should not be terminated.

5.2 Any show cause submission will be forwarded to the Research Committee and the Committee's recommendation will be forwarded to the Academic Board. The Committee may recommend the termination of candidature, continuation of enrolment, and imposition of conditions on the continuation of candidature.

5.3 If the candidate does not show cause, the Research Degree Committee will recommend termination of candidature to the Academic Board.

5.4 Persons whose candidature has been terminated may have recourse to the appeals procedures. The decision of the appeals committee is final.

6 Examination of Supervised Research Project

6.1 The candidate will submit to the Teaching Body in which she or he has enrolled three copies of a thesis embodying the results of the candidate's research. All copies of the thesis will be bound in temporary form. The thesis must be written and presented in accordance with the current guidelines for the preparation of a thesis within the Sydney College of Divinity

6.2 The thesis must be the candidate's own work, must be written in English, and reach a satisfactory standard of literary presentation.

6.3 Before a candidate may submit a thesis, the supervisor must certify in writing that the thesis conforms to the requirements of the regulations. A certificate to this effect will be supplied by the supervisor when the thesis is submitted. If the supervisor does not so certify, the appropriate body

of the Teaching Body in which the supervision took place will determine whether the thesis will be submitted after having considered written submissions from the supervisor and the candidate.

6.4 The Sydney College of Divinity Research Committee will appoint two examiners, at least one of whom shall be external to the Teaching Body of both the supervisor and the student. Examiners will report in writing three months from the receipt of the thesis. Examiners will be replaced if the report is not received within four months unless the examiner is given leave to report later.

6.5 The thesis will be graded by the examiners according to the standard grading practice within the College and a final grade achieved by averaging the grades awarded by the examiners; provided that where the examiners' marks differ by more than ten (10) marks a third examiner will be asked to grade the thesis and the final result will be based on consideration of the three grades.

6.6 The four coursework units will be graded according to standard grading practice within the Sydney College of Divinity.

6.7 The final grade of honours is calculated by taking into account the results of the Honours thesis (36 credit points) and the four coursework units (36 credit points). The Academic Board of the Teaching Body will then propose a final grade of First Class Honours, Second Class Honours Division One, Second Class Honours Division Two, or Third Class Honours, as deemed appropriate.

6.8 The classes of honours will be H = First Class; D = Second Class, Division One; C = Second Class, Division Two; P = Third Class.

6.9 If a candidate completes all the components of the honours course but fails to qualify for the award of any class of honours, his or her academic record will be endorsed with an academic comment "Failed to qualify for a class of honours in the BMin" and the honours course description against which the class of honours is normally recorded will be deleted.

7 Examiners' Reports

7.1 Candidates will be given a copy of the examiners' reports at the completion of the examination process. Examiners' names will be included unless a written request to the contrary has been received by the Office of the Dean.

8 Submission of the Completed Thesis

8.1 When any corrections as determined by the Research Committee in light of the examiners' reports have been completed, two bound copies of the thesis are to be submitted to the Office of the Dean. The bound copies are to conform to the guidelines for the presentation and binding of theses following examination

9.1 Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained herein, the Academic Board of the Sydney College of Divinity may, in any case in which it may deem it appropriate to do so, vary, dispense with or suspend any requirement or prescription by these regulations, and report forthwith to the Council of the Sydney College of Divinity.

Graduates will have a coherent and advanced body of knowledge with depth in the underlying principles and concepts in one or more theologically-related disciplines, and knowledge of research principles and methods.

Skills

Graduates will have cognitive and technical skills in a theologically-related body of knowledge, so that they are able independently to:

- review, analyse, synthesise and transform theological information and identify and transmit solutions to complex problems;

- think critically, evaluate and generate complex ideas;
- technical skills to design and use research in a project;
- communicate theologically-related knowledge, skills and ideas clearly and coherently to a variety of audiences.

Applications of Knowledge and Skills

Graduates will have the ability to demonstrate the application of knowledge and skills

- with initiative and judgment in professional practice and/or scholarship in one or more theologically-related disciplines;
- adapt knowledge and skills in diverse theologically-related contexts;
- with responsibility and accountability for own learning and practice and in collaboration with others;

1.3 An applicant may not be admitted to candidature unless the Teaching Body in which he or she is enrolled can ensure that adequate supervision is available.

1.4 Applicants whose entry qualifications were obtained in an institution where English is not the language of instruction will be required to demonstrate competency in English by an IELTS result of 7.0 in all bands of the test and may be required to attend such English language courses as prescribed by the Sydney College of Divinity.

1.5 Applicants will be required to show evidence of competence in appropriate ancient and/or modern languages in order to access primary sources and significant secondary works relevant to their thesis topic. Language requirements will be determined at the time of application in consultation with the proposed supervisor.

1.6 Application for enrolment in the Bachelor of Theology (Honours) is made to the Registrar of the appropriate Teaching Body offering the program.

1.7 No candidate for the BTh(Hons) may be concurrently enrolled in any other undergraduate or postgraduate course within the Sydney College of Divinity or any other tertiary institution unless the candidate is enrolled in an approved joint degree program, unless approval has been granted by the Academic Board.

2 Course Structure

2.1 The award shall include:

2.1.1 an 8100-series Research Methodology Unit (9 credit points)

2.1.2 an 8100 Honours Seminar Unit (9 credit points)

2.1.3 a further two units (18 credit points in total) in the area of specialisation from 9200-series units

2.1.4 a thesis of 20,000 words for 36 credit points in the area of specialisation.

2.2 A candidate may not submit as the main content of the thesis any work or material which has previously been submitted for a degree without major reworking.

2.3 The appropriate body of the Teaching Body in which the candidate is enrolled shall appoint a supervisor.

2.4 Within four weeks (FTE) of enrolling in the year in which the thesis is to be written the candidate's supervisor shall receive a thesis topic which is to be submitted by the appropriate body of the Member Institution for approval to the Research Committee of the Sydney College of Divinity.

2.5 All thesis proposals involving the gathering of personal information from people by surveys, interviews, or case studies, etc must first be referred to the Research Committee for approval using the appropriate forms and will be dealt with according to the procedures and policies of the Ethics Review Committee.

3 Period of Candidature

3.1 The period of candidature for the degree shall normally be 1 year full-time study or up to 3 years part-time.

3.2 In certain circumstances, the Student Support and Administration Committee may grant extensions.

4 Monitoring of Candidature

4.1 Once each semester, and at any other time considered appropriate, the supervisor of the project shall report to the appropriate body of the Teaching Body on the progress of each candidate using the appropriate form.

5 Termination of Candidature

- 5.1 If for any reason the candidate's progress is deemed to be unsatisfactory, the Teaching Body in which the candidate is enrolled shall ask the candidate to show cause why candidature should not be terminated.
- 5.2 Any show cause submission shall be forwarded to the Research Committee and the Committee's recommendation shall be forwarded to the Academic Board. The Committee may recommend the termination of candidature, continuation of enrolment and imposition of conditions on continuation of candidature.
- 5.3 If the candidate does not show cause, the Research Degree Committee shall recommend termination of candidature to the Academic Board.
- 5.4 Persons whose candidature has been terminated may have recourse to the appeals procedures. The decision of the appeals committee is final.

6 Examination of Thesis

- 6.1 The candidate shall submit to the Teaching Body in which she or he is enrolled three copies of a thesis embodying the results of the candidate's research. All copies of the thesis shall be bound in temporary form. The thesis must be written and presented in accordance with the current guidelines for the preparation of a thesis within the Sydney College of Divinity.
- 6.2 The thesis must be the candidate's own work, must be written in English and reach a satisfactory standard of literary presentation.
- 6.3 Before a candidate may submit a thesis, the supervisor must certify in writing that the thesis conforms to the requirements of the regulations. A certificate to this effect shall be supplied by the supervisor when the thesis is submitted. If the supervisor does not so certify, the appropriate body of the Teaching Body in which the supervision took place shall determine whether the thesis shall be submitted after having considered written submissions from the supervisor and the candidate.
- 6.4 The Sydney College of Divinity Research Committee shall appoint two examiners, at least one of whom shall be external to the Teaching Body of both the supervisor and the student. Examiners shall report in writing three months from the receipt of the thesis. Examiners will be replaced if the report is not received within four months unless the examiner is given leave to report later.
- 6.5 The thesis shall be graded by the examiners according to the standard grading practice within the College and a final grade achieved by averaging the grades awarded by the examiners; provided that where the examiners' marks differ by more than ten (10) marks a third examiner will be asked to grade the thesis and the final result will be based on consideration of the three grades.
- 6.6 The three coursework units shall be graded according to standard grading practice within the Sydney College of Divinity. The required Honours Seminar may be graded, but the results are not included in the final grade. The Research Methodology unit and two 'further units' are included and account for 3/8 of the final grade.
- 6.7 The final grade of honours is calculated by taking into account the results of the Honours thesis (5/8 of total grade) and the Research Methodology and two 'further' course work units (3/8 of total grade). The Academic Board of the Teaching Body shall then propose a final grade of First Class Honours, Second Class Honours Division One, Second Class Honours Division Two or Third Class Honours, to the Research Committee.
- 6.8 The classes of honours shall be H = First Class; D = Second Class, Division One; C = Second Class, Division Two; P = Third Class.
- 6.9 If a candidate completes all the components of the honours course but fails to qualify for the award of any class of honours, his or her academic record will be endorsed with an academic

comment “Failed to qualify for a class of honours in the BTh” and the honours course description against which the class of honours is normally recorded will be deleted.

7 Examiners’ Reports

- 7.1 Candidates will be given a copy of the examiners’ reports at the completion of the examination process. Examiners’ names will be included unless a written request to the contrary has been received by the Office of the Dean.

8 Submission of the Completed Thesis

- 8.1 When any corrections as determined by the Research Committee in light of the examiners’ reports have been completed, two bound copies of the thesis are to be submitted to the Office of the Dean. The bound copies are to conform to the guidelines for the presentation and binding of theses following examination.

9 Saving Clause

- 9.1 Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained herein, the Academic Board of the Sydney College of Divinity may, in any case in which it may deem it appropriate to do so, vary, dispense with or suspend any requirement or prescription by these regulations, and report forthwith to the Council of the Sydney College of Divinity.

Assessment

The Graduate Certificate in Chaplaincy is designed for those possessing a three-year undergraduate degree in any field, who wish to acquire transferable knowledge and skills in Chaplaincy as part of their continuing professional development for ministry employment and further learning.

The Graduate Certificate in Chaplaincy focuses on building capacity in Chaplaincy for people involved in a wide scope of religious, non-profit, community-focused enterprises. Students may be working for denominationally-based organisations in education, welfare, aged care, local church, or other ministries requiring specific leadership training for ministry or mission.

Outcomes

Knowledge

Graduates will have:

- specialised theoretical and technical knowledge related to the practice of Chaplaincy which is transferable to a variety of complex religious, not-for-profit, ministry enterprises;
- an understanding of the principles and methods of inquiry transferable to different contexts within real-world ministry practice.

Skills

Graduates will demonstrate specialised cognitive and technical skills in Chaplaincy within a ministry-related body of knowledge, so that they are able independently to:

- analyse critically, evaluate, and apply information to complete a range of activities associated with Chaplaincy in a ministry-related context;

- 1.1.1 hold a three-year AQF 7 award in the field of philosophy and religious studies (Australian Standard Classification of Education field 0917 – Philosophy and Religious Studies) from an accredited Australian tertiary institution; or
 - 1.1.2 hold a three-year AQF 7 award in the field of social work, social science, counselling or psychology; or
 - 1.1.3 hold, from a university or other tertiary institution, qualifications approved by the Student Support and Administration Committee as equivalent to such an award; and
 - 1.1.4 have at least 5 years of professional experience within a helping profession and a recommendation from their employer, professional association, or ordaining body.
- 1.2 Notwithstanding the provisions of this regulation, the Student Support and Administration Committee may require an applicant to demonstrate fitness for admission as a candidate for this award by carrying out such work and/or sitting for such examinations as the Student Support and Administration Committee may determine.
- 1.3 In exceptional cases, an applicant may be admitted as a candidate for a Graduate Certificate in Professional Supervision, if the applicant submits evidence of other academic and professional attainments to the Student Support and Administration Committee.

- 1.7 Application for admission to the Graduate Certificate in Professional Supervision program is made to the Registrar of the appropriate Teaching Body offering the program.

2 Course Structure

- 2.1 The Graduate Certificate in Professional Supervision requires the completion of the following four compulsory units.

Note: If compulsory units have been completed in the award used for admission into the Graduate Certificate in Professional Supervision, they are to be replaced with one or two appropriate electives.

2.2 The candidate will complete the necessary 18 credit points in the sub-discipline of Counselling to achieve a concentration in Counselling.

2.3 Units coded “A” are not counted towards a concentration or specialisation in any discipline or subdiscipline.

3 Period of Candidature

3.1 The period of candidature for the award will normally be 0.5 year full-time (1 semester) and up to 2 years (4 semesters) part-time.

3.2 In certain circumstances, the Student Support and Administration Committee may grant extensions to the period of candidature.

4 Leave of Absence

4.1 The Student Support and Administration Committee may grant leave of absence from the Graduate Certificate in Professional Supervision. The period of leave will not be counted as part of the period of candidature for the award.

6 Credit and Recognised Prior Learning

6.1 A candidate may seek credit for previous accredited study and/or Recognised Prior Learning up to a maximum of 9 cps in the Graduate Certificate of Professional Supervision.

- specialised theoretical and technical knowledge related to the delivery of Theological Education

Graduates will demonstrate specialised cognitive and technical skills in the design, development, and delivery of Theological Education, so that they are able independently to:

- evaluate current educational theory and practice from a theological perspective
- review and synthesize historical approaches to the theory and practice of Theological Education
- critically consider and evaluate a variety of approaches to Theological Education
- develop effective methods of learning and teaching in Theological Education.

Applications of Knowledge and Skills

Graduates will have the ability to:

- apply knowledge and skills in a way that demonstrates autonomy, well-developed judgment, adaptability, and responsibility as theological educators in the tertiary sector.

Assessment

Graduate students are expected to give evidence of a breadth and a depth of understanding beyond that of an undergraduate student. In particular, their work should manifest the higher order skills of:

- Analysis – the ability to recognise the distinctive aspects of a topic, and the inter-relationships between them.
- Synthesis – the ability to integrate the various aspects of a topic and see them in the light of the whole.

- an advanced understanding, within a coherent body of knowledge in Systematic Theology and Biblical Studies,
- potential for acquiring and applying knowledge and skills in a new or existing discipline or professional area.

Skills

Graduates will have cognitive and technical skills specifically in Theology and Biblical Studies, so as to be able independently to:

- review, reflect on, and synthesize theological information and identify and provide resources towards complex problems,
- think critically and evaluate complex ideas,
- apply specialised and creative skills for Christian living and ministry,
- research, analyse and communicate theologically-related ideas to a variety of audiences.

Applications of Knowledge and Skills

Graduates will have the ability to:

- make high level, independent and theologically informed judgements,
- plan and evaluate activities and projects within a particular ministry setting,

2 Course Structure

2.1 The Graduate Diploma of Theological Studies requires the completion of 72 credit points (8 units).

2.2 36 credit points of core units (4 units) will be taken from the discipline of Biblical Studies and the subdiscipline of Systematic Theology.

2.3 All course units shall be taken from the Schedule of Units of Study in the 8100 and 9200 series.

2.4 The course may be taken with a specialisation in the discipline of Biblical Studies or in the subdiscipline of Systematic Theology. A specialisation in the GradDipThSt comprises 36 credit points in the respective sub/discipline with at least one 9200-series unit.

2.5 Units coded "A" are not counted towards a specialisation in any discipline or subdiscipline.

Graduates will demonstrate advanced specialised cognitive and technical skills in leadership within a ministry-related body of knowledge, so that they are able independently to

- analyse critically, reflect on, and synthesise complex information, problems, concepts, and theories associated with leadership in a ministry-related context;
- implement with discrimination established leadership theories to provide solutions for the effective governance, management, and operations of a religious, non-profit, community organization;
- interpret and transmit knowledge, skills, and ideas through coherent and sustained leadership to specialist and non-specialist audiences.

Applications of Knowledge and Skills

Graduates will have the ability to:

- apply knowledge and skills in a way that demonstrates initiative, autonomy, expert judgment, adaptability, and accountability as leaders of religious, non-profit, community-focused enterprises;

ACADEMIC REGULATIONS for the Master of Leadership

2.6 Units from the entry Graduate Certificate (or Graduate Diploma) if equivalent, to units required for the award, may be considered for inclusion as core units and in the forming of any specialisation (54 cps, including at least 2×9200 level units) or sub-specialisation (36 cps) within the Master of Leadership.

2.7 Candidates who have previously studied a BTh/BMin or equivalent may not enrol in units with content similar to those covered in their previous studies.

3 Period of Candidature

3.1 The period of candidature for the award will normally be 1 year full-time (2 semesters), or up to 3 years (6 semesters) part-time.

3.2 In certain circumstances, the Student Support and Administration Committee may grant extensions to the period of candidature.

4 Leave of Absence

4.1 The Student Support and Administration Committee may grant leave of absence from the Graduate Diploma of Leadership. The period of leave will not be counted as part of the period of candidature for the award.

4.2 The period of leave will normally be one semester, after which a candidate may apply for a further period of one semester, or will be required to complete candidature.

5 Assessment

5.1 The assessment of subject units will be in the manner approved by the Academic Board, in line with the College’s established guidelines.

5.2 Academic Board may require students to present themselves for oral examination.

5.3 Academic and non-academic misconduct will be penalised in accordance with the regulations of the Sydney College of Divinity, whose stipulations are severe.

6 Credit and Recognised Prior Learning

6.1 A candidate may seek credit up to a maximum of 18 credit points in the Master of Leadership.

6.2 Credit can only be granted for units that are from an equivalent award or institution and have outcomes, content, demand hours, and assessment equivalent to that of units in the SCD award.

6.3 Credit for Recognised Prior Learning can be granted subject to a successful application.

- apply knowledge and skills in a way that demonstrates autonomy, expert judgment, adaptability, and accountability as a practitioner and/or learner in relation to the inter-dependent building up of the church and good of the wider community.
- plan and execute a research-based project, and/or piece of scholarship in an area of theology.

ACADEMIC REGULATIONS for the Master of Divinity

1 Admission to Candidature

1.1 An applicant for admission to candidature for the Master of Divinity will:

- 1.1.1 those who have completed an AQF Level 7 award from an accredited Australian tertiary institution; or
- 1.1.2 hold, from a university or other tertiary institution, qualifications approved by the Student Support and Administration Committee as equivalent to the requirements set out in the paragraph above; or
- 1.1.3 hold an SCD Graduate Certificate in Arts: to receive the award the student is required to complete a further 180 credit points (20 units), and surrender the GradCertArts upon graduation; or
- 1.1.4 hold an SCD Graduate Diploma of Arts: to receive the award the student is required to complete a further 144 credit points (16 units), and surrender the GradDipArts upon graduation; or
- 1.1.5 hold an SCD Master of Arts (72 / 108 credit points): to receive the award the student is required to complete a further 144 /108 credit points respectively, and surrender the MA upon graduation.

1.2 Notwithstanding the provisions of this regulation, the Student Support and Administration Committee may require an applicant to demonstrate fitness for admission as a candidate for this degree by carrying out such work and/or sitting for such examinations as the Student Support and Administration Committee may determine.

1.3 In exceptional cases, an applicant may be admitted as a candidate for a Master of Divinity, if the applicant submits evidence of other academic and professional attainments to the Student Support and Administration Committee.

1.4 A Candidate for the award will be designated as full-time or part-time. A student is designated as a full-time if enrolled in 27 credit points or more in a semester or part-time if enrolled in less than 27 credit points per semester.

1.5 No candidate for the award may be concurrently enrolled in any other undergraduate or postgraduate course within the Sydney College of Divinity or any other tertiary institution, unless approval has been granted by the Academic Board.

1.6 Applicants whose entry qualifications were obtained in an institution where English is not the language of instruction will normally be required to demonstrate competency in English by an IELTS (or equivalent) result of 7.0 in all bands of the test and may be required to attend such English language courses as prescribed by the Sydney College of Divinity.

1.7 Application for admission to the Master of Divinity program is made to the Registrar of the appropriate Teaching Body offering the program.

2 Course Structure

- 2.1 Every student program for the award will consist of no fewer than 216 credit points.
- 2.2 Every program will include either two specialisations and one subspecialisation, or one specialisation and two subspecialisations.
- 2.2.1 A specialisation in a requires 54 credit points from units assigned to the specialisation, with a minimum of 18 credit points from 9200 series units,
- 2.2.2 A specialisation in a subdiscipline requires 54 credit points from the subdiscipline, with a minimum of 18 credit points from 9200 series units.
- 2.2.3 A specialisation in a discipline requires 54 credit points from the discipline, with at least 27 credit points in one subdiscipline, with a minimum of 18 credit points from 9200 series units.
- 2.2.4 A subspecialisation in a discipline or subdiscipline requires 36 credit points from the units assigned to the discipline or subdiscipline, including no more than 18 credit points from 8100 series units or up to 36 credit points from 9200 series units.
- 2.2.5 Units coded “A” are not counted towards a specialisation in any discipline or subdiscipline.

- 2.4 All course units will be taken from 8100 and 9200 series units in the Schedule of Units of Study.
- 2.5 Every program will include
- 2.5.1 a minimum of 72 credit points in 9200 series units;
- 2.5.2 not more than 72 credit points from Philosophy;
- 2.5.3 at least a subspecialisation from Biblical Studies;
- 2.5.4 students completing a specialisation in Biblical Studies must also complete at least 18 cps (2 units) in Biblical languages which are in addition to the 54 cps (6 units) required for the specialisation;
- 2.5.5 at least a subspecialisation from Systematic Theology;
- 2.5.6 at least one unit in Church History;

- 2.5.7 at least a total of 36 credit points from the following subdisciplines: Christian Ethics, Christian Spirituality, Pastoral Counselling, Worship & Liturgy, Mission, Pastoral Theology;
- 2.5.8 not more than 108 credit points in Pastoral Theology;
- 2.5.9 at least one 9200 series Generic Research unit;
- 2.5.10 A candidate may take up to a maximum of 36 credit points in units listed as Generic (Research) units in the Schedule of Units of Study with a maximum of 18 credit points in Independent Guided Study units, 18 credit points in Research Project units, and 18 credit points as a Research Essay. Students who transfer from the MDiv to either the MA or the MTh cannot exceed this limit in total across both programs.

3 Period of Candidature

- 3.1 The period of candidature for the degree shall normally be 3 years full-time and up to 9 years part-time.
- 3.2 In certain circumstances, the Student Support and Administration Committee may grant extensions to the period of candidature.

4 Leave of Absence

- 4.1 The Student Support and Administration Committee may grant leave of absence from the Master of Divinity. The period of leave will not be counted as part of the period of candidature for the award.
- 4.2 The period of leave shall normally be one semester after which a candidate may apply for a further period of one semester or will be required to continue candidature.

5 Assessment

- 5.1 The assessment of subject units will be in the manner approved by the Academic Board, in line with the College's established guidelines.
- 5.2 Academic Board may require students to present themselves for oral examination.
- 5.3 Academic and non-academic misconduct will be penalised severely in accordance with the regulations of the Sydney College of Divinity.

6 Credits

- 6.1 A candidate may seek credit up to a maximum of 108 credit points in the Master of Divinity. Credit can only be granted for units at graduate level, that are from an equivalent award or institution and have outcomes, content, demand hours, and assessment equivalent to that of units in the SCD award.
- 6.2
- 6.3 Credit can be also granted when a candidate holds the SCD Bachelor of Theology or equivalent degree up to a maximum of 54 credit points for BTh or equivalent units (where the outcomes, content demand hours, and assessment are comparable to those of SCD BTh units) with a grade of at least 70%.

7 Exit Points

- A range of exit points are available from the Master of Divinity. These include the Graduate Certificate in
- 7.1 Arts, Graduate Diploma of Arts, Master of Arts, and Master of Theology. For these to be available, the student must complete units that met the requirements of the exiting award.

8 Articulation

- 8.1 Admission into the SCD Master of Philosophy award would require a completed Master of Divinity which included an 18 credit point Research Project or Essay with a GPA of 3.0 or higher.
- 8.2 Admission into the SCD Doctor of Ministry award would require a Master of Divinity with a GPA of 2.8 or higher including a Research Essay with a GPA of 2.8 or higher and the appropriate ministry experience.

8.3 Admission into the SCD Doctor of Philosophy or Theology would require a completed Master of Divinity with a GPA of 3.0 or higher including a Research Essay with a GPA of 3.0 or higher.

9 Saving Clause

9.1 Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained herein, the Academic Board of the Sydney College of Divinity may, in any case in which it may deem it appropriate to do so, vary, dispense with or suspend any requirement or prescription by these regulations, and report forthwith to the Council of the Sydney College of Divinity.

Graduate Profile and Rationale

The Master of Theology is a coursework program designed for those who hold at least a Bachelor of Theology (or equivalent) and who wish to pursue theological studies in greater depth and with greater rigour. It includes either a specialisation of 54 credit points

(6 units) in one discipline or subdiscipline, or at least 27 credit points (3 units) in two or more disciplines or subdisciplines (see Academic Regulations section 2.3.1), along with the opportunity for a focused research project.

Outcomes

Graduates will have advanced knowledge and skills in relation to theology and its related disciplines, enabling them to undertake research and/or to engage in professional practice, and/or to continue life-long learning.

Knowledge

Graduates will have

- A deep and integrated understanding of an advanced body of knowledge in one or more theologically related disciplines or areas of practice, with a solid grasp of recent developments in those subdisciplines and areas of practice;
- an understanding of research principles and methods applicable to theological investigation and practice.

1.4 A Candidate for the award will be designated as full-time or part-time. A student is designated as full-time if enrolled in 27 credit points or more in a semester or part-time if enrolled in less than 27 credit points per semester.

1.5 No candidate for the award may be concurrently enrolled in any other undergraduate or postgraduate course within the Sydney College of Divinity or any other tertiary institution, unless approval has been granted by the Academic Board.

Graduate Profile and Rationale 졸업 과정의 이념

The Diploma of Christian Studies (Korean) course is an undergraduate award that introduces students to Christian studies within higher education. Graduates will have acquired basic knowledge, skills, and values of Christian relevance to their professional, family, church, social, or personal lives and have deepened their awareness of the nature and scope of theology and their affinity with it as a field of study within higher education.

Enrolment 입학

The Diploma of Christian Studies (Korean) is offered through the SCD Korean Program. The Korean Program has its own campus, is led by the Academic Dean, and comes under the direct control of the SCD Office of the Dean. It is subject to monitoring, moderation and other academic quality control procedures that apply to all Teaching Bodies within the SCD. Details are available from the Registrar of the program.

Graduate Profile and Rationale 졸업생 과정의 이념

The Associate Degree of Christian Thought and Practice (Korean) course is an undergraduate award that provides an opportunity to undertake some theological study with special focus on Christian Thought (including Biblical Studies, Theology, and Humanities in the Christian Tradition) or on Christian Practice (including Christian Life and Ministry). All course units are undertaken at AQF Level 7. The special focus is achieved by completing a major in the area of interest. The organisation of the

disciplines / sub-disciplines / majors and the way they are linked is described in the following table.

5 Termination of Candidature **수학 종료**

5.1 If for any reason the candidate's progress is deemed to be unsatisfactory, the Teaching Body in which the candidate is enrolled shall ask the candidate to show cause why candidature should not be terminated.

6 Examination of Thesis **논문 검토방법**

- 6.1 The candidate shall submit to the Teaching Body in which she or he is enrolled three copies of a thesis embodying the results of the candidate's research. All copies of the thesis shall be bound in temporary form. The thesis must be written and presented in accordance with the current guidelines for the preparation of a thesis within the Sydney College of Divinity.

- 6.1 The thesis must be the candidate's own work, must be written in English and reach a satisfactory standard of literary presentation.

- 6.2 Before a candidate may submit a thesis, the supervisor must certify in writing that the thesis conforms to the requirements of the regulations. A certificate to this effect shall be supplied by the supervisor when the thesis is submitted. If the supervisor does not so certify, the appropriate body of the Teaching Body in which the supervision took place shall determine whether the thesis shall be submitted after having considered written submissions from the supervisor and the candidate.

- 6.3 The Sydney College of Divinity Research Committee shall appoint two examiners, at least one of whom shall be external to the Teaching Body of both the supervisor and the student. Examiners shall report in writing three months from the receipt of the thesis. Examiners will be replaced if the report is not received within four months unless the examiner is given leave to report late.

- 6.4 The thesis shall be graded by the examiners according to the standard grading practice within the College and a final grade achieved by averaging the grades awarded by the examiners; provided that where the examiners' marks differ by more than ten (10) marks a third examiner will be asked to grade the thesis and the final result will be based on consideration of the three grades.

The required Honours Seminar may be graded but the results are not included in the final mark. The Research Methodology unit and two 'further' units are included and account for 3/8 of the final grade.

The Academic Board of the Teaching Body shall then propose a final grade of First Class Honours, Second Class Honours Division One, Second Class Honours Division Two or Third Class Honours, as deemed appropriate.

- 6.8 If a candidate completes all the components of the honours course but fails to qualify for the award of any class of honours, his or her academic record will be endorsed with an academic comment "Failed to qualify for a class of honours in

the BTh” and the honours course description against which the class of honours is normally recorded will be deleted.

1 Admission to Candidature 입학허가

1.2 Notwithstanding the provisions of this regulation the Student Administration Committee may require an applicant to demonstrate fitness for admission as a

candidate for this degree by carrying out such work and/or sitting for such examinations as the Student Administration Committee may determine.

2 Course Structure 과정의 구조

- 2.1 The Graduate Certificate in Arts (Korean) requires the completion of 4 units (36 credit points).

2.2 All course units shall be taken from the Schedule of Units of Study in the 8500 and 9600 series.

2.3 The course may be taken with or without a concentration. A concentration in the Graduate Certificate comprises 18 credit points in a sub-discipline.

2.4 Every course unit requires students to demonstrate mastery of basic English-language vocabulary and comprehension of English-language passages related to that unit before enrolling in further units. All course units shall be taken from the Sydney College of Divinity Schedule of Units of Study.

ACADEMIC REGULATIONS for the Master of Arts (Korean)

1 Admission to Candidature 입학허가

- 1.1 Applicants for admission to candidature for a degree of Master of Arts will be classified into one of two categories:

1.1.2.1 Applicants in Category 1 will be required to complete 72 credit points (eight units).

1.1.2.2 Applicants in Category 2 will be required to complete 108 credit points (twelve units).

1.2 Applicants who hold a Vocational Graduate Diploma (VET accredited) or a hold a Vocational Graduate Certificate (VET accredited) may be granted provisional admission.

1.3 Notwithstanding the provisions of this regulation the Student Administration Committee may require an applicant to demonstrate fitness for admission as a candidate for a degree of Master by carrying out such work and/or sitting for such examinations as the Student Administration Committee may determine.

- 2.1 The Master of Arts (Korean) degree requires candidates to complete credit points as follows:**

A specialisation in the MA (Korean) (1.5 years) comprises 54 credit points in a Discipline or Sub-discipline with at least two 9600 series units. If an MA – 1 year, the Grad Cert entry award units could be used towards the 54credit points required for the specialisation.**

2.3 Every program for the award must contain at least 9 credit points in Theological English.

Postgraduate Profile and Rationale 대학원 과정의 이념

The Master of Theology (Korean) is a coursework program designed for those who hold at least a Bachelor of Theology (Korean) (or equivalent) and who wish to pursue theological studies in greater depth and with greater rigour. It includes either a specialisation of six units in one discipline or subdiscipline, or in-depth studies of three units in two or more disciplines or subdisciplines, along with the opportunity for a focused research project. The subdisciplines are:

1 Admission to Candidature 입학허가

1.1 An applicant for admission to candidature for a degree of Master of Theology (Korean):

ACADEMIC REGULATIONS for the Master of Divinity (Korean)

1 Admission to Candidature 입학허가

1.1 An applicant for admission to candidature for a degree of Master of Divinity (Korean) shall:

1.1.1 have completed a three-year degree from an accredited university in Korea. This graduation is considered evidence of Korean language literacy sufficient to undertake the course; or

- 1.2 Notwithstanding the provisions of this regulation the Student Administration Committee may require an applicant to demonstrate fitness for admission as a candidate for a degree of Master of Divinity (Korean) by carrying out such work and/or sitting for such examinations as the Student Administration Committee may determine.**

2 Course Structure 과정의 구조

2.1 Every program for the award shall consist of no fewer than 216 credit points.

2.2 Every program shall include either two specialisations and one sub-specialisation or one specialisation and two sub-specialisations. A specialisation requires 54 credit points from units assigned to the specialisation with a minimum of 18 credit points from 9600 series units. A sub-specialisation requires 36 credit points from the units assigned to the specialisation, including no more than 18 credit points from 8500 series units or, with the approval of the Academic Board, up to 36 credit points from 9600 level units.

Students who transfer from the MDiv (Korean Medium) to either the MA or the MTh cannot exceed this limit in total across both programs;**

- 2.4.12 The 18 credit points Research Essay is 10,000-12,000 words in length and written in an area of specialisation under supervision of a staff member of the Teaching Body. Each student enrolled in the Research Essay must complete a 8500-series Research Methodology Unit (9 cr pts) that can be completed before or concurrently with the Research Essay.**

2.5 Every course unit requires students to demonstrate mastery of basic English-language vocabulary and comprehension of English-language passages related to that unit before enrolling in further units. All course units shall be taken from the Sydney College of Divinity Schedule of Units of Study.

3 Period of Candidature 수학기간

3.1 The period of candidature for the degree shall normally be 3 years full-time and up to 9 years part-time.

3.2 In certain circumstances the Student Administration Committee may grant extensions to the period of candidature.

4.1 The Student Administration Committee may grant leave of absence from the MDiv (Korean). The period of leave shall not be counted as part of the period of candidature for the degree.

4.2 The period of leave shall normally be one semester after which a candidate may apply for a further period of one semester or will be required to complete candidature.

5 Assessment 평가

5.1 The assessment of course units shall be conducted in Korean in the manner approved by the Academic Board in line with the College's established guidelines for assessment packages.

5.2 Students may be required by the Academic Board to present themselves for oral examination.

5.3 Academic and non-academic misconduct will be penalised in accordance with the regulations of the Sydney College of Divinity, whose stipulations are severe.

6 Credit 학점인준

6.1 A candidate may seek credit up to a maximum of 108 credit points in the Master of Divinity (Korean). Credit can be granted from units at graduate level where the outcomes, content, demand hours and assessment are equivalent to that of units in the SCD award.

6.2 Credit can be also granted when a candidate holds the SCD Bachelor of Theology (Korean) and was admitted into the BTh(K) prior to 2014: up to a maximum of 54 credit points allocated at 8500 level units, with a maximum of 18 credit points in any one discipline area.

7 Exit Points 졸업 기점

7.1 A range of exit points are available from the Master of Divinity(Korean). These include the Graduate Certificate in Arts (Korean), Graduate Diploma of Arts (Korean), Master of Arts (Korean) and Master of Theology(Korean). For these to be available, the student must complete units that met the requirements of the exiting award.

8.1 Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained herein, the Academic Board of the Sydney College of Divinity may, in any case in which it may deem it appropriate to do so, vary, dispense with or suspend any requirement or prescription by these regulations, and report forthwith to the Council of the Sydney College of Divinity.

Common Elements in HDR

Common Elements in Higher Degrees by Research(HDR)

Master of Philosophy (MPhil), Doctor of Ministry (DMin), Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) and Doctor of Theology (ThD)

A.1 Overall Nature of Research Programs

All MPhil, PhD and ThD candidates proceed to the award by research and thesis alone. For DMin candidates 20% of the award is by coursework and 80% by research and thesis. In all research programs both full-time and part-time candidature are available. Typically, full-time candidature requires an average of thirty hours per week and part-time candidature requires an average of fifteen hours per week. These hours should preferably be achieved through regular weekly commitment, but they may be achieved through varying periods of more and less intensive work.

A.2 Oversight

Oversight of the MPhil, DMin, PhD and ThD falls to the Research Committee. Where relevant, ethics clearance is determined by the Research Ethics Committee. The Research Committee is a committee of the Academic Board and makes recommendations to it. This includes recommendations for award of degrees. The Academic Board in turn makes a recommendation to the Council, which resolves on award or non-award of the degree. The Research Ethics Committee is a committee of the Dean, who notifies significant matters to the Academic Board. The Research Ethics Committee may exchange information with the Research Committee.

The Research Committee has practical responsibility, with regard to the degrees listed above, for such matters as the admission of candidates, the approval of thesis topics, the appointment of supervisors and associate supervisors, the progress of candidates through the program, the provision of research seminars and workshops, the examination of completed theses, the implementation of any recommendations from the examiners, and the recommendation to the Academic Board that a candidate may proceed to graduation.

The Academic Board in turn makes a recommendation to the Council concerning the award of the degree.

The management of the programs is the responsibility of the Research Director, who is also a member of the Research Committee, and the Academic Board. The Research Director should be contacted by all intending candidates. The Research Director provides initial guidance in respect of the desired program, qualifications for admission, the DMin coursework if relevant, the intended research topic and supervision of the research, and remains the key contact for candidates in managing their progress.

A.3 Enrolment

Candidates enrol through the Office of the Dean following an interview with the Research Director. The Director receives and forwards the application for enrolment, together with the *Summary of Research Intentions*, to the Research Committee which grants acceptance into the program.

In the case of the MPhil, PhD and ThD, candidature is provisional until the acceptance of the *Thesis Proposal* by the Research Committee. In the case of the DMin, transition from coursework to thesis occurs following the achievement of commendable results in the two coursework units and acceptance of the *Thesis Proposal* by the Research Committee.

A.4 Thesis Proposal

In the case of the MPhil, PhD and ThD, a formal *Thesis Proposal* will be submitted to the Research Committee within one semester of admission for a full-time candidate and within two semesters of admission for a part-time candidate. In the case of the DMin, a formal *Thesis Proposal* will be submitted to the Research Committee no later than one semester after completion of the course units for a full-time candidate and no later than two semesters after completion of the course units for a part-time candidate. In all cases, the formal *Thesis Proposal* may not be substantially changed after acceptance without application to the committee.

A.5 Research Supervision

All candidates have two supervisors, a principal supervisor, who must hold a doctoral degree and be research active according to the *Research Active in the SCD Policy*, and an associate supervisor, who must hold a doctoral degree, carry out research and normally be research active according to the *Research Active in the SCD Policy*. These are formally appointed by the Research Committee. Normally, the principal supervisor will be a faculty member of the Sydney College of Divinity. In some cases the Sydney College of Divinity may appoint an external supervisor based in another reputable theological college, university, or comparable institution. The associate supervisor may likewise be internal or external to the Sydney College of Divinity. In the case of the DMin, the associate supervisor may be a relevant recognized expert professional in a relevant field of ministry.

As well as being research active, the principal supervisor should have experience in research supervision. College Faculty who may become research active and thus eligible to act as supervisors are expected to participate in scheduled supervision workshops provided by the Sydney College of Divinity. Especially in cases where a designated principal supervisor may not yet have overseen a research project through to a satisfactory conclusion, appropriate mentoring in this task will be provided by the Research Director.

Intending candidates may or may not have identified a specific topic within the intended area. Some may already have discussed the matter informally with a potential supervisor. In their *Summary of Research Intentions* accompanying the application to enrol candidates may request a particular person as supervisor, but the supervisor is appointed by the Research Committee and approached by the Research Director.

The associate supervisor may be asked to act as principal supervisor in the temporary absence of the principal supervisor, for example, on study leave. The associate supervisor may otherwise provide additional research support, for example, with regard to a particular aspect of the research in which he or she is a recognized expert. The *Code of Supervisory Practice*, appended to this section, informs the supervisory relationships.

Each semester the supervisors report to the Research Committee concerning the candidate's progress and any other related matter, using the *Research Degree Progress Report* form, which requires also candidate comment on the supervisor's comments. This enables the Committee to monitor progress, offer advice to supervisors and/or candidates, and make appropriate recommendations to the Academic Board. In the event of continued unsatisfactory progress termination of candidature may be recommended. Unsatisfactory progress occurs when there is no evidence that production of the thesis has been advanced by identifiable further research, constructive meetings of the candidate with the supervisor, or written drafts, and where there are insufficient grounds for special consideration. Typically, unsatisfactory progress in one semester will attract directions to achieve particular goals in the following semester, and unsatisfactory progress for a second semester will lead to a requirement that the candidate show cause why the candidature should not be terminated.

Candidates experiencing extended academic or personal difficulties should discuss their situation promptly with their supervisor and the Research Director in order to establish the most effective way for them to proceed to eventual completion. In some situations it may be appropriate to apply for an extension. The normal upper limits for extension are one semester for full-time candidates and two semesters for part-time candidates. In other situations it may be appropriate to apply for leave of absence for a semester. Such applications should be addressed to the Research Director and are considered by the Research Committee.

A.6 Compulsory Research Degree Workshops

These workshops are compulsory for all new thesis writers, including DMin candidates moving to the thesis stage of their candidature. Held annually, they are offered in intensive mode, early in first semester. They will also be offered early in the second semester for any new students in the MPhil, PhD or ThD, or any DMin students moving to the thesis stage of their degree. New thesis writers may be at slightly different stages of preparation for the research but all will find the matters covered wholly or largely relevant to their situation. Presented by various lecturers, they are designed to introduce candidates to practical matters affecting the production of a thesis such as:

- defining a thesis topic and planning chapters
- research methodologies
- bibliographical aids
- using the library to best effect in research
- writing a formal thesis proposal
- ethical considerations and ethics clearance procedures
- examiners' expectations
- guidelines for writing and documenting
- writing an abstract
- participating in the SCD research seminars and in conferences.

A.7 Compulsory Research Seminars

Several Research Seminars (about eight) are held in the evening at intervals throughout the year, coordinated by the Research Director. Ongoing enrolment in all research degrees is subject to completing attendance requirements and presenting a paper related to the research seminar at least once each year for full-time candidates and at least once every second year for part-time candidates. DMin candidates participate in these seminars once they have entered the thesis stage of their candidature. The seminars provide an informal testing ground for the reception of the research, opportunities for gaining awareness of broader research areas and research procedures potentially applicable to one's own research, and engagement with the overall cohort of research students in mitigation of any sense of isolation.

Where the candidate normally resides abroad or in an Australian location remote from the usual physical location of the seminars in Sydney, the Research Director will advise the candidate concerning minimum participation in the seminars. All such candidates are expected to attend at least one seminar in person in the course of the year in person and to present a paper at least once a year or at least once every two years, as above. The seminars will be located so as to allow for live-streaming of at least half of them and candidates will be expected to arrange to join such seminars using appropriate technology. Seminars begin again in March. Relevant advice is available from the Office of the Dean.

A.8 Research Ethics

Any research involving human subjects must have the approval of the Sydney College of Divinity Research Ethics Committee, which is a committee of the Dean.

All thesis proposals involving the gathering of personal information from people by surveys, interviews or case studies will be dealt with according to the procedures and policies of the Research Ethics Committee. The Research Ethics Committee makes recommendations to the Academic Board in consultation with the Research Committee.

Note that ethics clearance may also be pertinent if the research involves using such material collected by others. Note also that the recording of oral history may or may not include the gathering of personal information.

Information about obtaining ethics clearance to proceed with research involving human subjects is available on the [Sydney College of Divinity website](#), together with the *Application for Ethical Clearance of Research Involving Human Subjects*. Guidance may be sought from the supervisor and the Research Director, and the Research Ethics Committee may be consulted through the Dean.

Ethics clearance is normally sought at the same time as submission of the formal *Thesis Proposal*. If the need to seek ethics clearance arises subsequently, as the need to gather personal information emerges belatedly, the application for ethical clearance should be lodged promptly. Under no circumstances may those elements of the thesis relying on the gathering of personal information proceed before ethical clearance is granted.

Whether or not a candidate needs to obtain a specific ethics clearance, it is still obligatory to conduct ethical research. Ethical research includes avoidance of the following:

1. **Plagiarism:** Plagiarism is the representation of another's works or ideas as one's own; it includes the unacknowledged word for word use or paraphrasing of another person's work, and the inappropriate unacknowledged use of another person's ideas.
2. **Fraud:** Academic fraud is the falsification and fabrication of research results and dishonesty in reporting research results.
3. **Misrepresentation:** Misrepresentation is the giving of false or misleading information in academic matters. It includes falsely claiming credit for past study and falsely stating that thesis material has not been used in another thesis beyond the permitted scope.
4. **Unethical behaviour:** Unethical behaviour is behaviour that breaches accepted ethical standards. It includes failing to observe the terms of an ethical approval to conduct research and misuse of confidential information obtained in field education.

Failure to conduct ethical research may result in the candidate being charged with academic misconduct. Candidates should not assume that such misconduct will not be

detected. The Academic Misconduct Regulations can be found on the Sydney College of Divinity website.

A.9 Libraries

The Sydney College of Divinity Library is the sum total of all the individual libraries of the Member Institutions and the Korean School of Theology. All the Sydney College of Divinity's students have access to all these libraries on production of their Student Identity Card. They will be required to conform to the particular regulations pertaining in each library.

Each research degree candidate will be asked to nominate as a home library one of the Sydney College of Divinity libraries, typically but not necessarily the library of the Institution in which the supervisor is based. This enables the Sydney College of Divinity, in consultation with the supervisor and candidate, to build up research resources in the topic area of the candidate using a Research Degree Library Resources Grant to the library from the Sydney College of Divinity. The grant is made to the nominated library each semester in which the candidate is enrolled.

Where the candidate normally resides abroad or in an Australian location remote from the libraries of the Sydney College of Divinity, the candidate will nevertheless make use of the Sydney College of Divinity libraries through electronic access, interlibrary loans, and personal use during visits to Sydney or to the location of other Sydney College of Divinity libraries. The Sydney College of Divinity will assess such a candidate's probable library needs at the time of enrolment and periodically, and may advise or negotiate use of a suitable university or college library elsewhere on behalf of the candidate. The Sydney College of Divinity takes responsibility for ensuring adequate library access for all its students.

A.10 Presenting the Thesis for Examination

Approximately three months before the expected date of submission the candidate should notify the Office of the Dean that submission is expected at that time using the *Intention to Submit* form, unless this information has already been provided in the most recent semester report. If using the *Intention to Submit* form the candidate should ensure that the supervisor has provided comment.

TWO copies for MPhil thesis and THREE copies for either a DMin, PhD or ThD thesis must be submitted to the Office of the Dean for examination. Temporary binding and medium bond paper should be used. One copy in electronic form should be submitted to the Research Director, which will be placed in the SCD Institutional Repository.

The supervisor is required to sign a *Certification of Thesis* to be submitted with the thesis.

A.11 Guidelines for the Preparation of the Thesis

All copies of the thesis should be in good quality typescript on one side of the paper only. In the main body of the thesis double-spacing of typescript is preferred, but one-and-a-half-spacing is acceptable. Single-spacing may be used only for appendices and footnotes or endnotes. The paper should be good quality, medium weight white stock, sufficiently opaque for normal reading.

Gender-inclusive language should be used except in quotations, paraphrases, or recreations of the language used in a different culture. God may be referred to in the gender language appropriate to normal practice within a particular theological tradition.

The size of the paper should be A4 (297mm x 210mm) except for illustrative material such as drawings, maps and printouts, on which no restriction is placed.

The margins on each sheet should be not less than 40mm on the left-hand side, 20mm on the right-hand side, 30mm at the top, and 20mm at the bottom.

The recommended structural sequence of a thesis is as follows:

- Title Page
- Declaration of Originality
- Acknowledgements (if any)
- Preface (if any)
- Table of Contents
- List of illustrations and tables (if any)
- Abstract
- Introduction (if separate from Chapter 1)
- Chapters in sequence
- Conclusion
- Appendix or appendices (if any)
- Bibliography

The title page should contain the thesis title, author's name, degree and year of submission.

The Declaration of Originality should take the following form:

This thesis is based upon original work by the author and a study of the relevant published works as indicated and acknowledged in the text. No part of the thesis has been plagiarised.

Signed:.....

(Author's signature)

Date.....

The table of contents should be reasonably detailed in a thesis, since an index is not usually included.

Beginning with the first page of the first chapter (which may be headed either 'Introduction' or 'Chapter 1') pages should be numbered consecutively using Arabic numerals. Preceding pages, except the title page, should normally be given lower case Roman numerals, beginning with the page immediately after the title page.

Each copy of the thesis should have an abstract of 500-700 words bound in. The abstract should indicate the problem investigated, the procedure followed, the general results obtained and the major conclusions reached. It should not contain any illustrative material or tables. Note that it should not be replicated in the introductory paragraphs.

Appendices contain any supplementary material that the author considers necessary to the interpretation of the text itself. Appendices elaborate information or argument expressed within the body of the thesis; they do not introduce substantial new information or new argument. Materials that are generally more appropriately included in an appendix would include long tables, data that supports arguments contained in the thesis, detailed reports, detailed technical arguments and computer printouts.

Materials such as illustrations, charts or tables must not be submitted on the back of typed sheets. Except with the approval of the supervisor, these should be bound facing the text to which they refer, or if necessary, as right-hand pages, immediately after the first reference to them. The caption should be placed at the bottom of the page.

Materials such as diagrams, maps, and tables that exceed A4 size should be either:

- (i) folded so as to read as a right-hand page when opened; or
- (ii) clearly referred to in the text, numbered and folded for insertion in a pocket in the back inside cover of the thesis binding.

Footnotes at the bottom of each page are preferred but endnotes are permitted. It is normal to begin footnotes or endnotes at 1 for each chapter. Harvard-style notes included in the main body of the thesis are not generally appropriate for advancing theological argument but may be permitted if clearly appropriate to a particular thesis.

A.12 Bibliography and Referencing

No single method of referencing is prescribed, but candidates should use one or other of the generally recognized systems of referencing and do so consistently. Recommended Style Manuals:

That of the *Journal of Theological Studies*.

Patrick H. Alexander and others, *The SBL Handbook of Style: For Ancient Near Eastern, Biblical, and Early Christian Studies*, Peabody, MA: Hendrickson, 1999, and Student Supplement rev. 2009.

Lawrence D. McIntosh, compiler, *A Style Manual for the Presentation of Papers and Theses in Religion and Theology*, Wagga Wagga: Centre for Information Studies in Association with ANZTLA and ANZATS, 1994.

A.13 Criteria for Assessment

The thesis will be assessed, amongst other things, according to the following criteria:

- The clarity with which the research question/problem is stated and the scope of the study defined.
- The appropriateness of the theoretical or conceptual framework to the investigation.
- The appropriateness of the methodology to the research question/ problem.
- The precision and consistency with which key terminology is used.
- The depth of critical assessment of the relevant literature.
- The capacity to demonstrate a link between the literature review and the research question/problem.
- The degree of skill in constructing arguments and sustaining a position throughout the thesis.
- The level of competency in considering possible objections to the position advanced in the thesis.
- The degree of proficiency in using rigorous argument.
- The careful and accurate presentation of the scholarly apparatus.
- The originality (for doctorates) and the level of contribution made to the understanding of the subject.
- A clear statement of the conclusions reached.
- Justification of the conclusions reached in terms of the arguments presented.
- An ability to relate the conclusions of the study to the wider field.
- The suitability of a substantial amount of the material for publication.

A.14 Examination Process

Examiners should be suggested by the supervisor after discussion with the candidate but the candidate is not informed who is approached or appointed. When the examiners' reports are received, the names of the examiners will be made available to the candidate unless an examiner requests otherwise. At the request of a candidate the Sydney College of Divinity will agree that a certain person will not be appointed as an examiner if there is a reasonable expectation that the person would have a conflict of interest.

The thesis is submitted to the Office of the Dean and the supervisor conveys suggestions for examiners to the Research Director, who undertakes preliminary enquiries. The examiners are appointed by the Research Committee at its first meeting following receipt of the thesis. It would be unusual for the Committee to depart completely from the supervisor's suggestions.

Once the examiners have agreed to examine the thesis, they are normally expected to return their report within two months of having received the thesis.

For a DMin, PhD or ThD thesis three expert examiners are appointed, all external to the Sydney College of Divinity, at least two of international standing. For an MPhil thesis two expert examiners are appointed, both external to the Sydney College of Divinity.

Five categories of response are available:

- that the award be granted
- that minor amendments be made to the thesis to the satisfaction of the Research Committee
- that major amendments be made to the thesis to the satisfaction of the Research Committee
- that a significantly revised thesis be re-submitted for examination
- that the award not be granted.

The examiners' reports are addressed to the Research Director and received by the Research Committee. In the case of unanimous agreement on category (1), the Committee will normally resolve to recommend award of the degree outright and send the reports to both the candidate and the supervisor for their information. In all other cases, the reports will be sent together by the Research Director to the supervisor, who is invited to write a response addressed to the Committee concerned. In light of both the examiners' reports and the supervisor's response, the Committee determines what instructions are to be given to the candidate and the date for amendments to be completed in the case of (b) or (c) or for re-submission in the case of (d). The Research Director then advises the candidate and the supervisor accordingly. Where amendments under (b) or (c) are required, these should be made in consultation with supervisor. When they have been completed satisfactorily, the supervisor will inform the Research Director, and the Research Director will inform the Committee. When revision under (4) is invited, the supervisor will continue in the normal supervisory role until resubmission and re-examination.

In light of the examiners' reports and completion of any other required work, the Research Committee recommends accordingly to the Academic Board, which then sends its own recommendation on to Council for confirmation, and the candidate is invited to graduate.

A.15 Presentation and Binding of Thesis Following Examination

When the thesis has been examined and accepted, two copies bound in the manner described below should be sent to the Office of the Research Director, along with one copy in electronic form.

Each copy of the final version of the thesis should be bound in boards, covered with buckram or similar, and embossed on the spine as follows:

a) At the bottom and across, the words:

‘Sydney College of Divinity’

b) 90mm from the bottom and across, the degree and year of submission, for example:

PhD
2017

c) Evenly spaced between the statement in (b) and the top of the spine, the initials and surname of the author. No other lettering or decoration should appear on the spine.

d) Where the spine of the thesis is too thin to support lettering across, the wording should be printed along the spine reading from top to bottom.

A.16 Grievances

The Sydney College of Divinity has in place a set of grievance procedures which cover academic and non-academic aspects of candidature in the research programs of the Sydney College of Divinity. The [**grievance procedures**](#) can be accessed on the Sydney College of Divinity website.

Code of Supervisory Practice in HDR

A.17.1 Introduction

The research enterprise is one that involves the candidate, the supervisor and the Sydney College of Divinity. Each of the three has responsibilities and obligations to ensure that the enterprise is fruitful.

The Academic Board of the Sydney College of Divinity, through its Research Committee:

1. determines the eligibility of the candidate to undertake research at master's or doctoral level;
2. determines that the research project is appropriate for the degree;
3. ensures that proper supervision can be provided and maintained throughout the research period;
4. appoints supervisors expert in the areas of research and willing to undertake the obligations of supervision;
5. establishes and monitors mechanisms whereby conflict between the supervisor and the student may be resolved;
6. establishes procedures for all stages of the examination process;
7. establishes procedures whereby staff inexperienced in supervision are assisted with supervision;
8. establishes minimum reporting procedures;
9. establishes examination criteria for theses;
and, through its Research Ethics Committee:
10. determines ethics clearance for research involving human subjects.

A.17.2 Policy Determination

In the light of these responsibilities the following Code of Practice governing supervision of research for higher degrees is adopted.

A.17.2.1 *The Supervisor*

The supervisors are appointed by the Research Committee, after consultation with the candidate. See **A.5** in the Common Elements.

The Sydney College of Divinity expects that supervisors will:

- Assist the student to identify and refine a thesis topic suitable in scope and intellectual challenge for the particular degree.
- Advise the student on appropriate source material and its availability.
- Monitor the progress of the work by scheduling regular meetings with the student as mutually convenient. Some meetings should be in person but others may be by email or other means. The supervisor should normally expect to be in communication with the candidate about once a month and never less than once a semester. Frequency will probably vary according to stage of development of the thesis. It is the responsibility of the student to maintain appropriate communication with the supervisor, but the supervisor should contact the Research Director if an inexplicable silence occurs and continues to the extent that it is not possible to complete the semester report with input from both the supervisor and the student.
- With the candidate, provide a progress report on the candidature at the end of each semester, to be sent to the Research Director for consideration by the Research Committee.
- Record the outcomes or decisions taken at each meeting with the student and reflect such matters in the semester report.
- Report on issues concerning the student's progress to the Research Committee at other times should the supervisor deem it necessary.
- Provide advice to the student in relation to presentation of short papers at the Research Seminars.
- Provide critical comment on drafts of sections of the work.
- Read and critically comment on the final draft of the thesis.
- Certify that the thesis meets the requirements of the Sydney College of Divinity and is ready to be presented for examination, or advise the candidate and Research Committee otherwise, with reasons.
- Suggest the names of the requisite number of possible examiners plus at least one other.
- Encourage the student to become part of the wider academic community by participating in seminars and conferences.
- Advise the successful candidate on possible avenues of publication.
- Provide ongoing assistance to students who have been required to amend and/or re-submit their theses (see section on Rewriting below).

- Alert the Research Committee, through the Research Director, to any problems encountered in the supervisory relationship.
- Inform the student and the Research Committee, through the Research Director, of any planned extended leave so that arrangements may be made for the associate supervisor to take over the supervision.
- Ensure effective communication with the associate supervisor.

A.17.2.2 *The Associate Supervisor*

The associate supervisor will:

- Respond to requests from the student for occasional meetings, in person or by email or other means, as mutually convenient.
- Provide guidance in respect of research resources for particular purposes and read relevant sections of draft material as requested by the student.
- Take on the role of acting principal supervisor during any period of prolonged unavailability on the part of the principal supervisor.
- Inform the student and the Research Committee, through the Research Director, of any planned extended leave.

A.17.2.3 *The Student*

The student will:

- Submit to the Research Director in the Office of the Dean an application to enrol and a *Summary of Research Intentions*. Where candidates have already approached one or more potential supervisors to discuss the proposed area of research they should indicate this in their initial *Summary of Research Intentions*. The application and the *Summary of Research Intentions* are considered by the Research Committee, and the appointment of a supervisor and associate supervisor is included in the determinations of the Committee.
- Become familiar with the regulations governing the submission and examination of theses.
- Arrange with the principal supervisor for regular meetings at mutually convenient times. Some meetings should be in person but others may be by email or other means. The student will normally be in communication with the supervisor about once a month and never less than once a semester. It is the responsibility of the student to maintain appropriate communication with the supervisor.
- Arrange with the associate supervisor to meet as needed to assist progress.
- At the end of each meeting, have a clear idea of what work is to be done before the next scheduled meeting. Difficulties encountered in carrying out the work should be communicated to the supervisor (or associate supervisor) before the date of the scheduled meeting.
- Provide drafts of sections of work to the principal supervisor at agreed intervals.
- Alert the Research Committee, through the Research Director, to serious problems encountered in the supervisory relationship.

A.17.2.4 Supervision of Students Living Outside Sydney

In order to make advanced theological education available to those who wish to benefit from it, the Sydney College of Divinity permits some candidates living away from Sydney to pursue higher degrees by research. In order to carry out its responsibility to ensure adequate supervision the Sydney College of Divinity requires of such students that they:

1. Arrange for a substantive meeting with their supervisor twice per semester in person or by email or other means.
2. Communicate at least briefly with the supervisor at least once a month, irrespective of the progress that has been made in the month that has elapsed.

In addition, in some cases, the Research Committee may require students to devote some period to the writing of the thesis in ongoing close contact with the supervisor. This may entail residing for a time close to the supervisor's workplace. The associated costs will be met by the student.

A.17.2.5 Difficulties in Supervision

From time to time, students and supervisors may experience difficulties in the supervisory relationship. Disappointment at adverse comments on a draft, increased workload or personal circumstances may cause discouragement or disenchantment with the research task. In many cases, these setbacks are temporary, and either resolve themselves or are overcome through renegotiation of the thesis timetable by the student and supervisor, keeping in mind the due completion date. Advice may be sought by either party from the Research Director or the Dean.

If the difficulties prove to be of a more intractable nature, candidates may avail themselves of the informal and formal grievance procedures indicated in **A.17**.

A.17.2.6 Examination of Thesis: the Supervisor's Subsequent Role

When the Research Committee invites the candidate to carry out further work on the thesis, the Dean will forward the examiners' reports to the supervisor, who will be invited to write a response that will include a recommendation on how long the candidate might need to complete the re-writing.

The role of the supervisor will be to assist the candidate to appreciate shortcomings in the thesis and to implement the examiners' recommendations as affirmed by the Research Committee in the time allowed. See **A.15**.

A.17.2.7 Difficulties of Students from a Non-English-Speaking Background

The thesis submitted for examination must be clearly written in English and the expression should not hinder the reading and comprehension of the argument. For those candidates with a non-English background, proof-reading and advice on felicitous expression and correct English are particularly important. Such students may be

recommended to seek the assistance of persons competent in English. Any arrangements that may ensue are completely independent of the Sydney College of Divinity. In any modification of expression, the content of the thesis must remain the work of the candidate.

If there is any doubt, the Research Director should be consulted.

Qualifications for Admission to Candidature

A person may apply for admission to the MPhil if he or she has obtained or is qualified to obtain a four-year Bachelor degree, or the equivalent, in an appropriate discipline, to at least a Distinction standard. For details see Regulation B.4.1 below.

In all cases, prior studies should include sufficient preparation to undertake the proposed research in a theologically related area.

In exceptional cases, candidates may be admitted on the grounds of academic and/or professional attainments, including publications, in the theologically related area in which they wish to pursue research for the degree.

Notwithstanding the provisions above, the Sydney College of Divinity may require suitability for candidature to be demonstrated by such examination or other work as determined by the Sydney College of Divinity.

The Sydney College of Divinity will decline to accept an applicant if it cannot offer supervision in the proposed field of research.

Duration : 1 year full-time or 2 years part-time.

International students on an Australia Student Visa are required to study full-time.

Structure : Research and thesis of 30,000 words maximum, including footnotes/endnotes but excluding bibliography and appendices, under the direction of a supervisor; **AND** compulsory participation in the Research Degree Workshop and Research Seminars. Some thesis topics may require competence in ancient and/or modern foreign languages or other relevant areas of knowledge.

English Proficiency : Applicants whose entry qualifications were obtained in an institution where English is not the language of instruction require a minimum IELTS (or equivalent) score of 7.0 in all bands of the test.

B.1 RATIONALE

The Master of Philosophy meets the specifications for a Master's Degree (Research) set by the Australian Qualifications Framework. It provides men and women with the opportunity to pursue advanced study in a theologically related area by research at a high academic level. It is designed for those who seek to further their study in such an area, including interdisciplinary study, for academic, vocational, professional and/or personal reasons. It also offers research training that would support research at doctoral level.

The Master of Philosophy is undertaken by research and thesis alone. It provides the opportunity for candidates to embark on a significant piece of research, which investigates a theologically related topic in a systematic and comprehensive manner that is not available in coursework programs.

B.2 LEARNING OUTCOMES

Graduates will have specialized knowledge and skills for research and/or professional practice and/or further learning and the ability to apply such knowledge and skills in a theologically related area:

Knowledge

- an advanced and integrated understanding of a complex body of knowledge in one or more theologically related disciplines or areas of practice, including recent developments in the discipline or area of practice
- advanced knowledge of pertinent research principles and methods

Skills

- expert and specialized cognitive, technical and creative skills in the field of research, so that they are able independently to:
- analyse critically, reflect on and synthesize complex information, problems, abstract concepts and theories associated with the field of research
- research, evaluate and apply established theories to the focal areas of knowledge or practice, using the English language competently and effectively for the purpose
- design or adapt research methods appropriate to the field of research
- interpret and transmit knowledge, skills and ideas through coherent and sustained argument to specialist and non-specialist audiences in relation to the field of research
- make a fresh contribution to knowledge in the field of research

Applications of Knowledge and Skills

- the ability to:
- plan and execute a substantial piece of research with creativity and initiative
- apply knowledge and skills in a way that demonstrates autonomy, expert judgment, adaptability and accountability as a practitioner or learner in relation to the inter-dependent building up of the church and good of the wider community.

B.3 GRADUATE ATTRIBUTES

MPhil Graduates will:

- Be able to identify, analyse and articulate problems and issues in discourses current in their academic, professional and social communities
- Recognize the level of their own understanding
- Demonstrate creativity in solving problems and dealing with complex and abstract conceptual matters
- Be able to access information efficiently using the means most appropriate to purpose and context
- conduct themselves with academic integrity and rigour and exercise critical thinking in forming judgments
- Work autonomously and with an open mind
- Understand the distinction between information and argument and be able to marshal information as evidence in argument
- Adopt and practise responsible values and attitudes as members of academic, professional and social communities, based in part on their experience as SCD research candidates
- Be able to communicate their thinking coherently and effectively, with appropriate English proficiency, in public debate and printed word
- Have confidence to engage in public discussions of faith and ethics
- Appreciate and act on opportunities for further learning
- Be willing to assume leadership in their academic, professional and social communities as needed

B.4 ACADEMIC REGULATIONS

The Academic Regulations below must be read in conjunction with *Common Elements for Research Awards* .

B.4.1 Admission to Candidature

B.4.1.1 The Sydney College of Divinity may admit to candidature in the MPhil those persons who have attained:

(a) A Bachelor (Hons) degree or equivalent with results at Class II, Division 1, from the Sydney College of Divinity or an equivalent institution; **or**

(b) A Graduate Diploma with a GPA of 3+ and one 18 cpt research unit at Distinction level from the Sydney College of Divinity or an equivalent institution; **or**

(c) Qualifications deemed by the Sydney College of Divinity to be equivalent to those above.

In all cases, the prior studies should include sufficient preparation to undertake the proposed research in a theologically related area.

B.4.1.2 In exceptional cases, candidates may be admitted on the grounds of other academic and/or professional attainments, including publications, in the theologically related area in which they wish to pursue the research.

B.4.1.3 Notwithstanding the provisions above, the Sydney College of Divinity may require suitability for candidature to be demonstrated by such examination or other work as determined by the Sydney College of Divinity.

B.4.1.4 The Sydney College of Divinity will decline to accept an applicant if it cannot offer supervision in the proposed field of research.

B.4.1.5 Applicants must submit together with their application a *Summary of Research Intentions*, sufficient for the Research Committee to determine the general suitability of the topic and availability of appropriate resources and supervision.

B.4.1.6 Applicants whose entry qualifications were obtained in an institution where English is not the language of instruction will be required to demonstrate competency in English by an IELTS result of 7.0 in all bands of the test and may be required to attend such English language courses as prescribed by the Sydney College of Divinity.

B.4.1.7 Applicants will be required to show evidence of competence in ancient and/or modern languages, in order to access primary sources and/or significant secondary works relevant to their thesis topic, and competence in any other relevant area of knowledge. Any language or other requirements will be determined after advice from the Research Committee at the time of application and subsequently in consultation with the proposed supervisor.

B.4.1.8 Candidates for the MPhil are admitted provisionally on the basis of approval of the *Summary of Research Intentions*. Candidates must submit a formal *Thesis Proposal* within one semester of admission for a full-time candidate and within two semesters of admission for a part-time candidate for approval by the Research Committee in order to continue their candidature. This proposal may not be substantially changed after acceptance without application to the Research Committee.

B.4.1.9 No candidate for the MPhil may be concurrently enrolled in any other undergraduate or postgraduate course within the Sydney College of Divinity or any other tertiary institution, except in the case that, on the recommendation of the supervisor, a candidate may be directed to undertake one or more individual units of study on a non-award basis in order to attain a competence emerging as appropriate to the most effective pursuance of the MPhil research.

B.4.1.10 Candidates for the program are registered with the Sydney College of Divinity through the Office of the Dean.

B.4.1.11 A candidate for the degree will be designated as full-time or part-time based on time to be given to the research. Typically, full-time candidature requires an average of thirty hours per week and part-time candidature requires an average of fifteen hours per week. These hours should preferably be achieved through regular weekly commitment, but they may be achieved through varying periods of more and less intensive work. Clear progress is expected in each semester of enrolment.

B.4.1.12 A candidate enrolled in the MPhil may apply for transfer to PhD or ThD candidature, using the *Application to Transfer to a Different Research Degree*, following satisfactory completion of 20,000 words of the thesis under the direction of the approved principal supervisor and associate supervisor; a record of having met MPhil regulations; and demonstration that the research is of a sufficient scope and depth to sustain a doctoral thesis. The application should be accompanied by a letter of recommendation from the principal supervisor. A candidate wishing to transfer to the DMin should meet the conditions for transfer to PhD or ThD and also discuss the implications with the Research Director and his supervisors, actual or potential. Applications are determined by the Research Committee. In the event that an application is refused and the student wishes to appeal the decision, the appeal will be referred to the Dean. In the event that the student remains unsatisfied with the outcome, the student may have recourse to formal grievance procedures available through the Dean, as set out in the *Student Grievance Policy and Procedures*. Period of candidature provisions for the relevant doctoral degree apply from the time of transfer. Allowance for time already spent in MPhil candidature will be determined by the Committee in relation to the stage already reached in the research, but the remaining period of doctoral candidature will be at least two semesters for full-time candidates and at least four semesters for part-time candidates.

B.4.2 Course Structure

B.4.2.1 All MPhil candidates proceed to the award by research and thesis alone.

B.4.2.2 Candidates pursue a program of advanced study and research approved by the Research Committee and submit a thesis embodying the results of the research. The thesis will form a fresh contribution to research in the area. The thesis is to be 30,000 words maximum, including footnotes/endnotes but excluding bibliography and appendices.

B.4.2.3 A candidate may not submit as the main content of the thesis any material that has previously been submitted for a degree, unless that material has been significantly reworked in the context of the thesis being submitted.

B.4.2.4 Not later than one semester after admission to provisional candidature for full-time candidates and two semesters for part-time candidates, the candidate will submit a formal *Thesis Proposal* for approval by the Research Committee. Following approval, the

thesis topic may not be substantially varied except with the permission of the Research Committee.

B.4.2.5 The Research Committee appoints a principal supervisor and an associate supervisor to oversee the development of the thesis, and may determine any special arrangements for supervision. Normally, the principal supervisor will be a faculty member of the Sydney College of Divinity. In some cases the Sydney College of Divinity may appoint an external supervisor based in another reputable theological college or university. The associate supervisor may likewise be internal or external to the Sydney College of Divinity. In either case the principal supervisor must be research active according to the *Research Active in the SCD Policy* and the associate supervisor will normally be research active according to the *Research Active in the SCD Policy*.

B.4.2.6 As part of the program for the award of the MPhil the candidate is required to participate in the Research Seminars listed for each year of their candidature, and to present a paper at least once a year for full-time candidates and at least once every second year for part-time candidates. Ongoing enrolment in the award is subject to completing these requirements.

B.4.2.7 Candidates in their first year of enrolment must attend a Research Degree Workshop in addition to the Research Seminars.

B.4.2.8 All thesis proposals involving the gathering of personal information from people by surveys, interviews or case studies will be dealt with according to the policies and procedures of the Research Ethics Committee, which makes a recommendation to the Academic Board in consultation with the Research Committee. Ethics clearance is normally sought at the same time as submission of the formal *Thesis Proposal*. If the need to seek ethics clearance arises subsequently, as the need to gather personal information arises belatedly, the application for ethical clearance should be lodged promptly. Under no circumstances may those elements of the thesis relying on the gathering of personal information proceed before ethical clearance is granted.

B.4.2.9 All candidates are to nominate a 'home library' from amongst the libraries of the Member Institutions of the Sydney College of Divinity. The library will regularly receive a research grant to supplement its collection in the topic area of the candidate.

B.4.3 *Period of Candidature*

B.4.3.1 The period of candidature for the degree is one year full-time or two years part-time.

B.4.3.2 In certain circumstances the Research Committee may grant limited extensions of candidature upon application. The normal upper limits for extension are one semester for full-time candidates and two semesters for part-time candidates.

B.4.3.3 For serious reasons the Research Committee may grant a candidate leave of absence from the program. This leave will not normally exceed one semester. The period of leave is not counted in the period of candidature.

B.4.3.4 If the candidate discontinues or does not re-enrol, the candidate is required to apply for re-admission to the MPhil program. The Research Committee will process the application and may specify conditions for enrolment.

B.4.3.5 A candidate resuming after an absence must be enrolled for not less than one semester before being permitted to submit a thesis.

B.4.4 *Monitoring of Candidature*

B.4.4.1 Once a semester, and at any other time considered appropriate, the principal supervisor of the thesis will report to the Research Committee on the progress of the candidate using the *Research Degree Progress Reportform*.

B.4.5 *Termination of Candidature*

B.4.5.1 If the *Research Degree Progress Report* describes the candidate's progress as unsatisfactory and there is no advance within a semester, the Research Committee will ask the candidate to show cause why candidature should not be terminated. Unsatisfactory progress occurs when there is no evidence that production of the thesis has been advanced by identifiable further research, constructive meetings of the candidate with the supervisor, or written drafts, and where there are insufficient grounds for special consideration.

B.4.5.2 Any show-cause submission by the candidate will be considered by the Research Committee and the Committee's recommendation will be forwarded to the Academic Board. The Committee may recommend the termination of candidature, continuation of candidature, or imposition of conditions on continuation of candidature.

B.4.5.3 If the candidate does not show cause, the Research Committee will recommend termination of candidature to the Academic Board.

B.4.5.4 Persons whose candidature has been terminated may have recourse to the appeals procedures set out in the *Handbook* under *General Academic Regulations*. The decision of the Appeals Committee is final.

B.4.6 *Examination of Thesis*

B.4.6.1 The candidate will submit to the Office of the Dean two copies of a thesis embodying the results of the candidate's research. All copies of the thesis will be bound in temporary form. One copy in electronic form should be submitted to the Research Director, which will be placed in the SCD Institutional Repository. The length of the thesis will conform to the prescribed requirements. The thesis must be written and presented in accordance with the current guidelines for the preparation of a thesis.

B.4.6.2 The thesis must be the candidate's own work, with no hint of plagiarism, must be written in English, and must reach a satisfactory standard of literary presentation.

B.4.6.3 Before a candidate may submit a thesis, the principal supervisor must sign a *Certification of Thesis*, to be submitted with the thesis, stating that the thesis conforms to the requirements of the regulations. If the supervisor does not so certify, the Research Committee will determine whether the thesis is to be submitted after having considered written submissions from the principal supervisor, the associate supervisor and the candidate.

B.4.6.4 The Research Committee appoints two expert examiners, both external to the Sydney College of Divinity, and may appoint additional examiners. Examiners will be expected to report in writing two months from the receipt of the thesis. An examiner will normally be replaced if the report is not received within three months.

B.4.6.5 The examiners will report in writing and make a recommendation that the thesis be placed in one of five categories:

- a) that the award be granted
- b) that minor amendments be made to the thesis to the satisfaction of the Research Committee
- c) that major amendments be made to the thesis to the satisfaction of the Research Committee
- d) that a significantly revised thesis be re-submitted for examination
- e) that the award not be granted.

B.4.6.6 In the event of a disagreement arising between examiners, the Research Committee may appoint a third examiner or may make a recommendation to the Academic Board of the Sydney College of Divinity.

B.4.6.7 The Research Committee may recommend that the candidate undergo an oral or written examination requested by the examiners or initiated by the Research Committee.

B.4.6.8 In the case of **B.4.6.5** (b), (c) or (d), the Research Committee will determine the time to be allowed for completion or re-submission. In both cases, the candidate will re-enrol for the specified period.

B.4.6.9 In the event of a re-submission, the Research Committee may appoint the same examiners or may appoint one or more different examiners. The same examination process will apply except that examiners will be asked to make a recommendation in one of three categories:

- that the award be granted
- that minor amendments be made to the thesis to the satisfaction of the Research Committee

- that the award not be granted.

B.4.7 Examiners' Reports

B.4.7.1 Candidates will be given a copy of the examiners' reports at the completion of the examination process. Examiners' names will be included unless a written request to the contrary has been received by the Office of the Dean.

B.4.8 Submission of the Completed Thesis

B.4.8.1 When any corrections as determined by the Research Committee in light of the examiners' reports and the supervisor's comments have been completed, two bound copies of the thesis and one electronic copy are to be submitted to the Office of the Dean. The bound copies are to conform to the guidelines for the presentation and binding of theses following examination.

B.4.8.2 One copy of the bound thesis will be deposited in the Sydney College of Divinity library designated by the candidate; the other bound copy remains with the Office of the Dean; and the electronic copy in the SCD Institutional Repository. The copies will be available for consultation, loan, electronic distribution and photocopying forthwith. In exceptional cases the Research Committee, on application of the candidate, may determine that the thesis will not be available until after the expiry of a period, normally no longer than a year. The candidate holds copyright in the thesis and it is expected that any use made of it will be appropriately acknowledged by the user.

B.4.9 Saving Clause

B.9.9.1 Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained herein, the Academic Board of the Sydney College of Divinity may, in any case in which it may deem it appropriate to do so, vary, dispense with or suspend any requirement or prescription by these regulations, and report forthwith to the Council of the Sydney College of Divinity.

Qualifications for Admission to Candidature

A person may apply for admission to the DMin if he or she has obtained or is qualified to obtain a four-year Bachelor degree, or the equivalent, in an appropriate discipline, to at least a High Credit standard, **AND** has at least four years' full-time or equivalent part-time certified experience in ministry. For details see Regulation C.4.1 below.

In all cases, prior studies should include sufficient preparation to undertake the proposed research in an area of ministry.

In exceptional cases, candidates may be admitted on the grounds of academic and/or professional attainments, including publications, in the theologically related area in which they wish to pursue research for the degree.

Notwithstanding the provisions above, the Sydney College of Divinity may require suitability for candidature to be demonstrated by such examination or other work as determined by the Sydney College of Divinity.

The Sydney College of Divinity will decline to accept an applicant if it cannot offer supervision in the proposed field of research.

Duration : 3-4 years full-time or 6-8 years part-time.
Students on an Australian Student Visa are required to study full-time.

Structure : The award is by coursework (20%) and research (80%).

Coursework Component

Two core 18 cpt units each, to be completed with at least a High Credit average before proceeding to the research component.

Research Component

Research and thesis of 60,000 words maximum including footnotes/endnotes but excluding bibliography and appendices, under the direction of a supervisor; **and** compulsory participation in the Research Degree Workshop and the Research Seminars.

Some thesis topics may require competence in ancient and/or modern foreign languages or other relevant areas of knowledge such as statistics.

English Proficiency : Applicants whose entry qualifications were obtained in an institution where English is not the language of instruction require a minimum IELTS (or equivalent) score of 7.0 in all bands of the test.

C.1 RATIONALE

The Doctor of Ministry meets the specifications for a Doctoral Degree (Professional) set by the Australian Qualifications Framework. It provides men and women with the opportunity to pursue advanced study in Christian Life and Ministry by research at the

highest academic level in the context of professional practice, with supporting specialist coursework. It is designed for those who seek to expand their own understanding and develop new knowledge in professional ministry contexts, or for the personal transformation of the individual in academic and vocational areas.

The Doctor of Ministry is undertaken by a combination of specialist coursework (20%) and research and thesis (80%).

The specialist coursework component enhances the candidate's capacity for academic research in the context of professional practice and prepares the candidate to develop a specific *Thesis Proposal*. The research and thesis component provides the opportunity for the candidate to embark on a significant, extended piece of research, which investigates an area of Christian Life and Ministry in a systematic, creative and comprehensive manner. The research will contribute to knowledge in an original way.

Together, the specialist coursework and the research and thesis equip the person for advanced leadership in ministry and would also support an appropriate academic or professional career involving research.

C.2 LEARNING OUTCOMES

Graduates will have systematic and critical understanding of a complex field of learning in Christian Life and Ministry and specialized research skills for the advancement of learning in the field. They will have:

Knowledge

- systematic and critical understanding of the chosen area of Christian Life and Ministry
- mastery of a substantial body of knowledge at the frontier of knowledge in the field, including knowledge that constitutes an original contribution
- expert understanding of theories pertaining to the field
- substantial knowledge of research principles and methods applicable to the field

Skills

- expert and specialized cognitive, creative, and technical skills in the field of research, so that they are able independently and authoritatively to:
- critically evaluate existing knowledge and ideas pertaining to the field of research
- systematically investigate and integrate other information potentially relevant to that field including potentially relevant theories
- demonstrate and apply theoretical understanding of the field
- develop or adapt research methodologies to extend existing understanding of the field
- generate original knowledge in the field

- communicate results of research cogently and appropriately to specialist and non-specialist audiences, using the English language competently and effectively for the purpose

Applications of Knowledge and Skills

- as a practitioner or learner in relation to the inter-dependent building up of the church and good of the wider community, ongoing capacity to:
- plan and execute a coherent, significant and original piece of research with intellectual independence and authority
- generate significant and original knowledge in the field
- contribute expertise to academic discourses in the field
- take initiatives, think creatively and make innovations in new situations and/or undertake further learning
- assume full responsibility and accountability for personal outputs
- relate the skills gained to the professional practice of ministry
- engage in the formation of ministers
- contribute to the professional development of ministry leaders
- assist ministers, including ministry leaders, to relate their theological awareness to the practical needs of people in the contemporary world.

DMin Graduates will:

- Be able to access information efficiently using the means most appropriate to purpose and context
- Conduct themselves with academic integrity and rigour and exercise critical thinking in forming judgments
- Work autonomously and with an open mind
- Understand the distinction between information and argument and be adept in marshalling information as evidence in argument
- Adopt and practise responsible values and attitudes as members of academic, professional and social communities, based in part on their experience as SCD research candidates
- Be able to communicate their thinking coherently and effectively, with appropriate English proficiency, in public debate and printed word
- Have confidence to engage in public discussions of faith and ethics
- Appreciate and act on opportunities for lifelong learning and encourage others to recognize learning opportunities for themselves

- Be willing to assume high-level leadership in their academic, professional and social communities as needed

C.4 ACADEMIC REGULATIONS

The Academic Regulations below must be read in conjunction with *Common Elements for Research Awards*.

C.4.1 Admission to Candidature

C.4.1.1 The Sydney College of Divinity may admit to candidature in the DMin those persons who have attained:

- (a) A Bachelor (Hons) degree or equivalent with results at Class II from the Sydney College of Divinity or an equivalent institution; or
- (b) A Graduate Diploma with a GPA of 2.8+ and one 18 cpt research unit at High Credit level from the Sydney College of Divinity or an equivalent institution; or
- (c) Qualifications deemed by the Sydney College of Divinity to be equivalent to or higher than those above;

AND have at least four years' full-time or equivalent part-time certified experience in ministry.

In all cases, prior studies should include sufficient preparation to undertake the proposed coursework and research related to Christian Life and Ministry.

C.4.1.2 In exceptional cases, candidates may be admitted on the grounds of academic and/or professional attainments, including publications, in the area of Christian Life and Ministry to which their coursework will be aligned and in which they wish to pursue the research.

C.4.1.3 Notwithstanding the provisions above, the Sydney College of Divinity may require suitability for candidature to be demonstrated by such examination or other work as determined by the Sydney College of Divinity.

C.4.1.4 The Sydney College of Divinity will decline to accept an applicant if it cannot offer supervision in the proposed field of research.

C.4.1.5 Applicants must submit together with their application:

- (i) a *Summary of Research Intentions*, sufficient for the Research Committee to determine the general suitability of the topic and availability of appropriate resources and supervision;
- (ii) a *Certification of Experience in Ministry*.

C.4.1.6 Applicants whose entry qualifications were obtained in an institution where English is not the language of instruction will be required to demonstrate competency in English by an IELTS result of 7.0 in all bands of the test and may be required to attend such English language courses as prescribed by the Sydney College of Divinity.

C.4.1.7 Applicants will be required to show evidence of competence in ancient and/or modern languages, in order to access primary sources and/or significant secondary works relevant to their thesis topic, and competence in any other relevant area of knowledge, such as statistics. Any language or other requirements will be determined after advice from the Research Committee at the time of application and subsequently in consultation with the proposed supervisor.

C.4.1.8 Candidates for the DMin are admitted directly into the coursework component. When this is completed with at least a High Credit average, candidature continues into the research and thesis component on a provisional basis until approval of the formal *Thesis Proposal*, which should be submitted no later than one semester from completion of coursework for a full-time candidate or two semesters for a part-time candidate for approval by the Research Committee in order to continue their candidature. This proposal may not be substantially changed after acceptance without application to the Research Committee.

C.4.1.9 No candidate for the DMin may be concurrently enrolled in any other undergraduate or postgraduate course within the Sydney College of Divinity or any other tertiary institution, except in the case that, on the recommendation of the supervisor, a candidate may be directed to undertake one or more individual units of study on a non-award basis in order to attain a competence emerging as appropriate to the most effective pursuance of the DMin research.

C.4.1.10 Candidates for the program are registered with the Sydney College of Divinity through the Office of the Dean.

C.4.1.11 A candidate for the degree will be designated as full-time or part-time based on time to be given to the coursework and research. Typically, full-time candidature requires an average of thirty hours per week and part-time candidature requires an average of fifteen hours per week. These hours should preferably be achieved through regular weekly commitment, but they may be achieved through varying periods of more and less intensive work. Clear progress is expected in each semester of enrolment.

C.4.1.12 A candidate enrolled in the MPhil may apply for transfer to DMin candidature, following discussion with the Research Director, using the *Application to Transfer to a Different Research Degree*, following satisfactory completion of 20,000 words of the thesis under the direction of the approved principal supervisor and associate supervisor; a record of having met MPhil regulations; and demonstration that the research is of a sufficient scope and depth to sustain a doctoral thesis. The application should be accompanied by a letter of recommendation from the principal supervisor. Applications are determined by the Research Committee. In the event that an application is refused

and the student wishes to appeal the decision, the appeal will be referred to the Dean. In the event that the student remains unsatisfied with the outcome, the student may have recourse to formal grievance procedures available through the Dean, as set out in the *Student Grievance Policy and Procedures*. Period of candidature provisions for the DMin degree apply from the time of transfer. Allowance for time already spent in MPhil candidature will be determined by the Research Committee in relation to the stage already reached in the research, but the remaining period of doctoral candidature will be at least two semesters for full-time candidates and at least four semesters for part-time candidates.

C.4.2 Course Structure

C.4.2.1 (a) All DMin candidates proceed to the award by coursework (20%) and research and thesis (80%).

(b) The coursework component consists of two 18 cpt units, which must be completed with at least a High Credit average. The two units are designed to familiarize students with:

- contemporary theology of ministry at specialist level;
- contemporary scholarship in key areas of ministry at specialist level;
- applied research methodologies;

and to provide students with the tools to develop their *Summary of Research Intentions* into a formal *Thesis Proposal*.

The two units are:

R10001 Pastoral and Practical Theology: Hermeneutics and Methodological Paradigms
R10002 Research Settings in Pastoral and Practical Theology

All candidates begin the coursework at the beginning of the academic year. Full-time candidates do both units in the first semester of enrolment; part-time candidates do R10001 in the first semester and R10002 in the second semester.

(c) If the required result is not achieved in the coursework, the candidate will be informed that he or she may not proceed to the research and thesis stage. If the coursework has been passed the candidate may be offered transfer to a postgraduate coursework program with credit for the two 18 cpt units or, if appropriate, the MPhil (without credit). Period of candidature provisions for the award apply from the time of transfer.

C.4.2.2 Candidates who have achieved the required result continue their candidature with research approved by the Research Committee and submit a thesis embodying the results of the research. The thesis will form an original contribution to research in the area. The thesis is to be 60,000 words maximum, including footnotes/endnotes but excluding bibliography and appendices.

C.4.2.3 A candidate may not submit as the main content of the thesis any material that has previously been submitted for a degree, unless that material has been significantly reworked in the context of the thesis being submitted.

C.4.2.4 Not later than one semester after satisfactory completion of the coursework component for full-time candidates or two semesters for part-time candidates, the candidate will submit a formal *Thesis Proposal* for approval by the Research Committee. Following approval, the thesis topic may not be substantially varied except with the permission of the Research Committee.

C.4.2.5 The Research Committee appoints a principal supervisor and an associate supervisor to oversee the development of the thesis, and may determine any special arrangements for supervision. Normally, the principal supervisor will be a faculty member of the Sydney College of Divinity. In some cases the Sydney College of Divinity may appoint an external supervisor based in another reputable theological college or university. The associate supervisor may likewise be internal or external to the Sydney College of Divinity. In either case the principal supervisor must be research active according to the *Research Active in the SCD Policy*. The associate supervisor may be either an academic, normally identified as research active according to the *Research Active in the SCD Policy*, or a recognized expert professional in a field of ministry.

C.4.2.6 As part of the program for the award of the DMin, upon entering the research and thesis component of the program the candidate is required to participate in the Research Seminars listed for each year of their candidature, and to present a paper at least once a year for full-time candidates and at least once every second year for part-time candidates. Ongoing enrolment in the award is subject to completing these requirements.

C.4.2.7 Candidates in their first year of enrolment must attend a Research Degree Workshop in addition to the Research Seminars, provided that they have not previously attended such a seminar with the Sydney College of Divinity as part of a previous award. Regardless of such previous attendance, they may be required to attend those parts of the Workshop considered relevant to their current research.

C.4.2.8 All thesis proposals involving the gathering of personal information from people by surveys, interviews or case studies will be dealt with according to the policies and procedures of the Research Ethics Committee, which makes a recommendation to the Academic Board in consultation with the Research Committee. Ethics clearance is normally sought at the same time as submission of the formal *Thesis Proposal*. If the need to seek ethics clearance arises subsequently, as the need to gather personal information arises belatedly, the application for ethical clearance should be lodged promptly. Under no circumstances may those elements of the thesis relying on the gathering of personal information proceed before ethical clearance is granted.

C.4.2.9 All candidates are to nominate a 'home library' from amongst the libraries of the Member Institutions of the Sydney College of Divinity. The library will regularly receive a research grant to supplement its collection in the topic area of the candidate.

C.4.3 *Period of Candidature*

C.4.3.1 (a) The period of candidature for the degree is normally be three to four years full-time or six to eight years part-time. The coursework units will be completed with at least a High Credit average before the thesis may be undertaken. The two units will both be taken in the first semester of enrolment in the case of full-time candidature or successively in the first and second semester of enrolment in the case of part-time candidature.

(b) If the required result is not achieved in the coursework, the candidate will be informed that he or she may not proceed to the research and thesis stage. If the coursework has been passed the candidate may be offered transfer to a postgraduate coursework program with credit for the two 18 cpt units or, if appropriate, the MPhil (without credit).

C.4.3.2 In certain circumstances the Research Committee may grant limited extensions of candidature upon application. The normal upper limits for extension are one semester for full-time candidates and two semesters for part-time candidates.

C.4.3.3 For serious reasons the Research Committee may grant a candidate leave of absence from the program. This leave will not normally exceed one semester. The period of leave is not counted in the period of candidature.

C.4.3.4 If the candidate discontinues or does not re-enrol, the candidate is required to apply for re-admission to the DMin program. The Research Committee will process the application and may specify conditions for enrolment.

C.4.3.5 A candidate resuming after an absence will be enrolled for not less than one semester before being permitted to submit a thesis.

C.4.4 *Monitoring of Candidature*

C.4.4.1 Once a semester, and at any other time considered appropriate, the principal supervisor of the thesis will report to the Research Committee on the progress of the candidate using the *Research Degree Progress Reportform*.

C.4.5 *Termination of Candidature*

C.4.5.1 If the *Research Degree Progress Report* describes the candidate's progress as unsatisfactory and there is no advance within a semester, the Research Committee will ask the candidate to show cause why candidature should not be terminated. Unsatisfactory progress occurs when there is no evidence that production of the thesis has been advanced by identifiable further research, constructive meetings of the candidate with the supervisor, or written drafts, and where there are insufficient grounds for special consideration.

C.4.5.2 Any show-cause submission by the candidate will be considered by the Research Committee and the Committee's recommendation will be forwarded to the

Academic Board. The Committee may recommend the termination of candidature, continuation of candidature, or imposition of conditions on continuation of candidature.

C.4.5.3 If the candidate does not show cause, the Research Committee will recommend termination of candidature to the Academic Board.

C.4.5.4 Persons whose candidature has been terminated may have recourse to the appeals procedures set out in the *Handbook* under *General Academic Regulations*. The decision of the Appeals Committee is final.

C.4.6 Examination of Thesis

C.4.6.1 The candidate will submit to the Office of the Dean three copies of a thesis embodying the results of the candidate's research. All copies of the thesis will be bound in temporary form. One copy in electronic form should be submitted to the Research Director, which will be placed in the SCD Institutional Repository. The length of the thesis will conform to the prescribed requirements. The thesis must be written and presented in accordance with the current guidelines for the preparation of a thesis.

C.4.6.2 The thesis must be the candidate's own work, with no hint of plagiarism, must be written in English, and must reach a satisfactory standard of literary presentation.

C.4.6.3 Before a candidate may submit a thesis, the principal supervisor must sign a *Certification of Thesis*, to be submitted with the thesis, stating that the thesis conforms to the requirements of the regulations. If the supervisor does not so certify, the Research Committee will determine whether the thesis is to be submitted after having considered written submissions from the principal supervisor, the associate supervisor and the candidate.

C.4.6.4 The Research Committee appoints three expert examiners, all external to the Sydney College of Divinity, at least two of international standing, and may appoint additional examiners. Examiners will be expected to report in writing two months from the receipt of the thesis. An examiner will normally be replaced if the report is not received within three months.

C.4.6.5 The examiners will report in writing and make a recommendation that the thesis be placed in one of five categories:

- a) that the award be granted
- b) that minor amendments be made to the thesis to the satisfaction of the Research Committee
- c) that major amendments be made to the thesis to the satisfaction of the Research Committee
- d) that a significantly revised thesis be re-submitted for examination
- e) that the award not be granted.

C.4.6.6 In the event of a disagreement arising amongst examiners, the Research Committee may appoint a fourth examiner or may make a recommendation to the Academic Board of the Sydney College of Divinity.

C.4.6.7 The Research Committee may recommend that the candidate undergo an oral or written examination requested by the examiners or initiated by the Research Committee.

C.4.6.8 In the case of **C.4.6.5** (b), (c) or (d), the Research Committee will determine the time to be allowed for completion or re-submission. In both cases, the candidate will re-enrol for the specified period.

C.4.6.9 In the event of a re-submission, the Research Committee may appoint the same examiners or may appoint one or more different examiners. The same examination process will apply except that examiners will be asked to make a recommendation in one of three categories:

- that the award be granted
- that minor amendments be made to the thesis to the satisfaction of the Research Committee
- that the award not be granted.

C.4.7 *Examiners' Reports*

C.4.7.1 Candidates will be given a copy of the examiners' reports at the completion of the examination process. Examiners' names will be included unless a written request to the contrary has been received by the Office of the Dean.

C.4.8 *Submission of the Completed Thesis*

C.4.8.1 When any corrections as determined by the Research Committee in light of the examiners' reports have been completed, two bound copies of the thesis and one electronic copy are to be submitted to the Office of the Dean. The bound copies are to conform to the guidelines for the presentation and binding of theses following examination.

C.4.8.2 One copy of the bound thesis will be deposited in the Sydney College of Divinity library designated by the candidate; the other bound copy remains with the Office of the Dean; and the electronic copy is with the SCD Institutional Repository. The copies will be available for consultation, loan, electronic distribution and photocopying forthwith. In exceptional cases the Research Committee, on application of the candidate, may determine that the thesis will not be available until after the expiry of a period, normally no longer than a year. The candidate holds copyright in the thesis and it is expected that any use made of it will be appropriately acknowledged by the user.

C.4.9 *Saving Clause*

C.4.9.1 Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained herein, the Academic Board of the Sydney College of Divinity may, in any case in which it may deem it appropriate to do so, vary, dispense with or suspend any requirement or prescription by these regulations, and report forthwith to the Council of the Sydney College of Divinity.

D.4.1.4 The Sydney College of Divinity will decline to accept an applicant if it cannot offer supervision in the proposed field of research.

D.4.1.5 Applicants must submit together with their application a *Summary of Research Intentions*, sufficient for the Research Committee to determine the general suitability of the topic and availability of appropriate resources and supervision.

D.4.1.6 Applicants whose entry qualifications were obtained in an institution where English is not the language of instruction will be required to demonstrate competency in English by an IELTS result of 7.0 in all bands of the test and may be required to attend such English language courses as prescribed by the Sydney College of Divinity.

D.4.1.7 Applicants will be required to show evidence of competence in ancient and/or modern languages, in order to access primary sources and/or significant secondary works relevant to their thesis topic, and competence in any other relevant area of knowledge. Any language or other requirements will be determined after advice from the Research Committee at the time of application and subsequently in consultation with the proposed supervisor.

D.4.1.8 Candidates for the PhD are admitted provisionally on the basis of approval of the *Summary of Research Intentions*. Candidates must submit a formal *Thesis Proposal* no later than one semester from admission for a full-time candidate or two semesters for a

part-time candidate for approval by the Research Committee in order to continue their candidature. This proposal may not be substantially changed after acceptance without application to the Research Committee.

D.4.1.9 No candidate for the PhD may be concurrently enrolled in any other undergraduate or postgraduate course within the Sydney College of Divinity or any other tertiary institution, except in the case that, on the recommendation of the supervisor, a candidate may be directed to undertake one or more individual units of study on a non-award basis in order to attain a competence emerging as appropriate to the most effective pursuance of the PhD research.

D.4.1.10 Candidates for the program are registered with the Sydney College of Divinity through the Office of the Dean.

D.4.1.11 A candidate for the degree will be designated as full-time or part-time based on time to be given to the research. Typically, full-time candidature requires an average of thirty hours per week and part-time candidature requires an average of fifteen hours per week. These hours should preferably be achieved through regular weekly commitment, but they may be achieved through varying periods of more and less intensive work. Clear progress is expected in each semester of enrolment.

D.4.1.12 A candidate enrolled in the MPhil may apply for transfer to PhD candidature, using the *Application to Transfer to a Different Research Degree*, following satisfactory completion of 20,000 words of the thesis under the direction of the approved principal supervisor and associate supervisor; a record of having met MPhil regulations; and demonstration that the research is of a sufficient scope and depth to sustain a doctoral thesis. The application should be accompanied by a letter of recommendation from the principal supervisor. Applications are determined by the Research Committee. In the event that an application is refused and the student wishes to appeal the decision, the appeal will be referred to the Dean. In the event that the student remains unsatisfied with the outcome, the student may have recourse to formal grievance procedures available through the Dean, as set out in the *Student Grievance Policy and Procedures*. Period of candidature provisions for the PhD degree apply from the time of transfer. D.4.2.3 A candidate may not submit as the main content of the thesis any material that has previously been submitted for a degree, unless that material has been significantly reworked in the context of the thesis being submitted.

D.4.2.4 Not later than one semester after admission to provisional candidature for full-time candidates and two semesters for part-time candidates, the candidate will submit a formal *Thesis Proposal* for approval by the Research Committee. Following approval, the thesis topic may not be substantially varied except with the permission of the Research Committee.

D.4.2.5 The Research Committee appoints a principal supervisor and an associate supervisor to oversee the development of the thesis, and may determine any special arrangements for supervision. Normally, the principal supervisor will be a faculty member of the Sydney College of Divinity. In some cases the Sydney College of Divinity may appoint an external supervisor based in another reputable theological college or university. The associate supervisor may likewise be internal or external to the Sydney College of Divinity. In either case the principal supervisor must be research active according to the *Research Active in the SCD Policy* and the associate supervisor will normally be research active according to the *Research Active in the SCD Policy*.

D.4.2.6 As part of the program for the award of the PhD the candidate is required to participate in the Research Seminars listed for each year of their candidature, and to present a paper at least once a year for full-time candidates and at least once every second year for part-time candidates. Ongoing enrolment in the award is subject to completing these requirements.

- Conduct themselves with academic integrity and rigour and exercise critical thinking in forming judgments
- Work autonomously and with an open mind
- Understand the distinction between information and argument and be adept in marshalling information as evidence in argument
- Adopt and practise responsible values and attitudes as members of academic, professional and social communities, based in part on their experience as SCD research candidates
- Be able to communicate their thinking coherently and effectively, with appropriate English proficiency, in public debate and printed word
- Have confidence to engage in public discussions of faith and ethics
- Appreciate and act on opportunities for lifelong learning and encourage others to recognize learning opportunities for themselves
- Be willing to assume high-level leadership in their academic, professional and social communities as needed

E.4 ACADEMIC REGULATIONS

The Academic Regulations below must be read in conjunction with *Common Elements for Research Awards*.

E.4.1 Admission to Candidature

E.4.1.1 The Sydney College of Divinity may admit to candidature in the ThD those persons who have attained:

(a) A Bachelor (Hons) degree or equivalent with results at Class II, Division 1, from the Sydney College of Divinity or an equivalent institution; **or**

(b) A Graduate Diploma with a GPA of 3+ and one 18 cpt research unit at Distinction level from the Sydney College of Divinity or an equivalent institution; **or**

(c) Qualifications deemed by the Sydney College of Divinity to be equivalent to or higher than those above.

In all cases, prior studies should include sufficient preparation to undertake the proposed research in a theological discipline.

E.4.1.2 In exceptional cases, candidates may be admitted on the grounds of academic and/or professional attainments, including publications, in the theological discipline in which they wish to pursue the research.

E.4.1.3 Notwithstanding the provisions above, the Sydney College of Divinity may require suitability for candidature to be demonstrated by such examination or other work as determined by the Sydney College of Divinity.

E.4.1.4 The Sydney College of Divinity will decline to accept an applicant if it cannot offer supervision in the proposed field of research.

E.4.1.5 Applicants must submit together with their application a *Summary of Research Intentions*, sufficient for the Research Committee to determine the general suitability of the topic and availability of appropriate resources and supervision.

E.4.1.6 Applicants whose entry qualifications were obtained in an institution where English is not the language of instruction will be required to demonstrate competency in English by an IELTS result of 7.0 in all bands of the test and may be required to attend such English language courses as prescribed by the Sydney College of Divinity.

E.4.1.7 Applicants will be required to show evidence of competence in ancient and/or modern languages, in order to access primary sources and/or significant secondary works relevant to their thesis topic, and competence in any other relevant area of knowledge. Any language or other requirements will be determined after advice from the Research Committee at the time of application and subsequently in consultation with the proposed supervisor.

E.4.1.8 Candidates for the ThD are admitted provisionally on the basis of approval of the *Summary of Research Intentions*. Candidates must submit a formal *Thesis Proposal* no later than one semester from admission for a full-time candidate or two semesters for a

part-time candidate for approval by the Research Committee in order to continue their candidature. This proposal may not be substantially changed after acceptance without application to the Research Committee.

E.4.1.9 No candidate for the ThD may be concurrently enrolled in any other undergraduate or postgraduate course within the Sydney College of Divinity or any other tertiary institution, except in the case that, on the recommendation of the supervisor, a candidate may be directed to undertake one or more individual units of study on a non-award basis in order to attain a competence emerging as appropriate to the most effective pursuance of the ThD research.

E.4.1.10 Candidates for the program are registered with the Sydney College of Divinity through the Office of the Dean.

E.4.1.11 A candidate for the degree will be designated as full-time or part-time based on time to be given to the research. Typically, full-time candidature requires an average of thirty hours per week and part-time candidature requires an average of fifteen hours per week. These hours should preferably be achieved through regular weekly commitment, but they may be achieved through varying periods of more and less intensive work. Clear progress is expected in each semester of enrolment.

E.4.1.12 A candidate enrolled in the MPhil may apply for transfer to ThD candidature, using the *Application to Transfer to a Different Research Degree*, following satisfactory completion of 20,000 words of the thesis under the direction of the approved principal supervisor and associate supervisor; a record of having met MPhil regulations; and demonstration that the research is of a sufficient scope and depth to sustain a doctoral thesis. The application should be accompanied by a letter of recommendation from the principal supervisor. Applications are determined by the Research Committee. In the event that an application is refused and the student wishes to appeal the decision, the appeal will be referred to the Dean. In the event that the student remains unsatisfied with the outcome, the student may have recourse to formal grievance procedures available through the Dean, as set out in the *Student Grievance Policy and Procedures*. Period of candidature provisions for the ThD degree apply from the time of transfer. Allowance for time already spent in MPhil candidature will be determined by the Research Committee in relation to the stage already reached in the research, but the remaining period of doctoral candidature will be at least two semesters for full-time candidates and at least four semesters for part-time candidates.

E.4.2 Course Structure

E.4.2.1 All ThD candidates proceed to the award by research and thesis alone.

E.4.2.2 Candidates pursue a program of advanced study and research approved by the Research Committee and submit a thesis embodying the results of the research. The thesis will form an original contribution to research in the area. The thesis is to be 80,000

words maximum, including footnotes/endnotes but excluding bibliography and appendices.

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E.4.2.4 Not later than one semester after admission to provisional candidature for full-time candidates and two semesters for part-time candidates, the candidate will submit a formal *Thesis Proposal* for approval by the Research Committee. Following approval, the thesis topic may not be substantially varied except with the permission of the Research Committee.

E.4.2.5 The Research Committee appoints a principal supervisor and an associate supervisor to oversee the development of the thesis, and may determine any special arrangements for supervision. Normally, the principal supervisor will be a faculty member of the Sydney College of Divinity. In some cases the College may appoint an external supervisor based in another reputable theological college or university. The associate supervisor may likewise be internal or external to the Sydney College of Divinity. In either case the principal supervisor must be research active according to the *Research Active in the SCD Policy* and the associate supervisor will normally be research active according to the *Research Active in the SCD Policy*.

E.4.2.6 As part of the program for the award of the ThD the candidate is required to participate in the Research Seminars listed for each year of their candidature, and to present a paper at least once a year for full-time candidates and at least once every second year for part-time candidates. Ongoing enrolment in the award is subject to completing these requirements.

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E.4.2.8 All thesis proposals involving the gathering of personal information from people by surveys, interviews or case studies will be dealt with according to the policies and procedures of the Research Ethics Committee, which makes a recommendation to the Academic Board in consultation with the Research Committee. Ethics clearance is normally sought at the same time as submission of the formal *Thesis Proposal*. If the need to seek ethics clearance arises subsequently, as the need to gather personal information arises belatedly, the application for ethical clearance should be lodged promptly. Under no circumstances may those elements of the thesis relying on the gathering of personal information proceed before ethical clearance is granted.

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E.4.3 *Period of Candidature*

E.4.3.1 The period of candidature for the degree is normally be three to four years full-time or six to eight years part-time.

E.4.3.2 In certain circumstances the Research Committee may grant limited extensions of candidature upon application. The normal upper limits for extension are one semester for full-time candidates and two semesters for part-time candidates.

E.4.3.3 For serious reasons the Research Committee may grant a candidate leave of absence from the program. This leave will not normally exceed one semester. The period of leave is not counted in the period of candidature.

E.4.3.4 If the candidate discontinues or does not re-enrol, the candidate is required to apply for re-admission to the ThD program. The Research Committee will process the application and may specify conditions for enrolment.

E.4.3.5 A candidate resuming after an absence will be enrolled for not less than one semester before being permitted to submit a thesis.

E.4.4 *Monitoring of Candidature*

E.4.4.1 Once a semester, and at any other time considered appropriate, the principal supervisor of the thesis will report to the Research Committee on the progress of the candidate using the *Research Degree Progress Reportform*.

E.4.5 *Termination of Candidature*

E.4.5.1 If the *Research Degree Progress Report* describes the candidate's progress as unsatisfactory and there is no advance within a semester, the Research Committee will ask the candidate to show cause why candidature should not be terminated. Unsatisfactory progress occurs when there is no evidence that production of the thesis has been advanced by identifiable further research, constructive meetings of the candidate with the supervisor, or written drafts, and where there are insufficient grounds for special consideration.

E.4.5.2 Any show-cause submission by the candidate will be considered by the Research Committee and the Committee's recommendation will be forwarded to the Academic Board. The Committee may recommend the termination of candidature, continuation of candidature, or imposition of conditions on continuation of candidature.

E.4.5.3 If the candidate does not show cause, the Research Committee will recommend termination of candidature to the Academic Board.

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E.4.6.1 The candidate will submit to the Office of the Dean three copies of a thesis embodying the results of the candidate's research. All copies of the thesis will be bound in temporary form. One copy in electronic form should be submitted to the Research Director, which will be placed in the SCD Institutional Repository. The length of the thesis will conform to the prescribed requirements. The thesis must be written and presented in accordance with the current guidelines for the preparation of a thesis.

E.4.6.2 The thesis must be the candidate's own work, with no hint of plagiarism, must be written in English, and must reach a satisfactory standard of literary presentation.

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E.4.6.5 The examiners will report in writing and make a recommendation that the thesis be placed in one of five categories:

- (a) that the award be granted
- (b) that minor amendments be made to the thesis to the satisfaction of the Research Committee
- (c) that major amendments be made to the thesis to the satisfaction of the Research Committee
- (d) that a significantly revised thesis be re-submitted for examination
- (e) that the award not be granted.

E.4.6.6 In the event of a disagreement arising amongst examiners, the Research Committee may appoint a fourth examiner or may make a recommendation to the Academic Board of the College.

E.4.6.7 The Research Committee may recommend that the candidate undergo an oral or written examination requested by the examiners or initiated by the Research Committee.

E.4.6.8 In the case of **E.4.6.5** (b), (c) or (d), the Research Committee will determine the time to be allowed for completion or re-submission. In both cases, the candidate will re-enrol for the specified period.

E.4.6.9 In the event of a re-submission, the Research Committee may appoint the same examiners or may appoint one or more different examiners. The same examination process will apply except that examiners will be asked to make a recommendation in one of three categories:

- that the award be granted
- that minor amendments be made to the thesis to the satisfaction of the Research Committee
- that the award not be granted.

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E.4.7.1 Candidates will be given a copy of the examiners' reports at the completion of the examination process. Examiners' names will be included unless a written request to the contrary has been received by the Office of the Dean.

E.4.8 *Submission of the Completed Thesis*

E.4.8.1 When any corrections as determined by the Research Committee in light of the examiners' reports have been completed, two bound copies of the thesis and one electronic copy are to be submitted to the Office of the Dean. The bound copies are to conform to the guidelines for the presentation and binding of theses following examination.

E.4.8.2 One copy of the bound thesis will be deposited in the Sydney College of Divinity library designated by the candidate; the other bound copy remains with the Office of the Dean; and the electronic copy in the SCD Institutional Repository. The copies will be available for consultation, loan, electronic distribution and photocopying forthwith. In exceptional cases the Research Committee, on application of the candidate, may determine that the thesis will not be available until after the expiry of a period, normally no longer than a year. The candidate holds copyright in the thesis and it is expected that any use made of it will be appropriately acknowledged by the user.

E.4.9 *Saving Clause*

E.4.9.1 Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained herein, the Academic Board of the Sydney College of Divinity may, in any case in which it may deem it

appropriate to do so, vary, dispense with or suspend any requirement or prescription by these regulations, and report forthwith to the Council of the Sydney College of Divinity.

Tuition Assurance Requirements

Statement of Course Assurance

Sydney College of Divinity (ABN: 39 002 653 036) is a body corporate registered on the Australian Qualifications Framework in the states of New South Wales, Queensland, Western Australia, and Tasmania.

Under the provisions of the *Higher Education Support Act 2003* (HESA) and the associated HEP Guidelines, Sydney College of Divinity (SCD) is required to provide a tuition assurance arrangement for Australian citizens or holders of an Australian permanent humanitarian visa who are enrolled in higher education courses it offers. This requirement is to protect students in the event that SCD ceases to provide a course of study in which a student is enrolled. The meaning of 'ceasing to provide a course of study' is set out in the HEP Guidelines.

In the event that SCD ceases to provide a course of study in which a student is enrolled the student is entitled to either:

Course Assurance Option which is an offer of a place in a similar course of study with the Australian College of Theology (ACT) without any requirement to pay ACT any student contribution or tuition fee for any replacement units

OR

Student Contribution/Tuition Fee Repayment Option which is a refund of his or her up-front payments for any unit of study that the student commences but does not complete because SCD ceases to provide the course of study of which the unit forms part.

SCD has met the tuition assurance requirements of the HESA through its current membership of the Sydney College of Divinity Tuition Assurance Scheme (TAS).

A student may choose either the Course Assurance Option OR the Student Contribution/Tuition Fee Repayment Option.

Course Assurance Option

If a student accepts a place in a course offered by the Australian College of Theology as named above, the Australian College of Theology will offer the student the option of all necessary arrangements being made to ensure the student is able to enrol in a similar course of study with the Australian College of Theology. This offered course will lead to the same or a comparable qualification without any requirement on the part of the student to pay that the Australian College of Theology any student contribution or tuition fee for any replacement units. A student will receive full credit from the Australian College of Theology for any units of study successfully completed at SCD.

The Australian College of Theology may have different contribution amounts or tuition fees to the amounts or fees the student would have paid for units of study that were part of the course of study SCD ceased to provide.

A student is not obliged to enrol in a course of study with the Australian College of Theology under the Course Assurance Option. However, if he/she enrolls with any other provider there is no obligation on that provider to offer full credit transfer for the units of study completed with the SCD or to offer a replacement/s unit free of charge.

Student Contribution/Tuition Fee Repayment Option

If a student chooses the Student Contribution/Tuition Fee Repayment Option, SCD undertakes to pay the student the total of any up-front payments already paid by the student for any units of study the student has commenced but not completed. Students selecting this option will also get SLE or FEE-HELP balance/s re-credited for uncompleted units.
